


MISS DOROTHEA DEININGER

IN MEMORIAM

"Her smile—her look—her way of speaking gently" are but a few of the qualities which endeared Miss Dorothea Deininger to us all. Through her quiet charm and infinite patience she became not only our teacher but also our friend. Those of us who were in any of her English classes realize that her success as a teacher was due to her intense interest in both the subject and her students. As we entered her classroom, each of us was impressed by the friendly atmosphere and the spontaneous respect she received from everyone. Under her guidance we worked earnestly and willingly. Above all we felt a sense of accomplishment after completing the varied projects which she had planned for us. Her patience and the help she gave us made us feel that, individually, we were important to her. Her conscientiousness and willingness to work were exemplified by everything she undertook, as indicated by her position as a faculty advisor to the Monad.

Miss Deininger, a native of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, was a graduate of Ursinus College. She received her Master of Arts degree at the University of Pennsylvania. She was an active member of the Bloomtield chapter of the American Association of University Women and in the year before her death served as fellowship chairman. A member of the Westminster Presbyterian Church, Miss Deininger sang with, and was at one time president of the church choir. Prior to her seven years of teaching English at Belleville High School, she taught for three yars at Pennsgrove Regional High School.

It was natural for Miss Deininger to choose to teach English because her major interest was England and English culture. She was able to fullfill her ambition to visit England when she flew there two years ago. During the four weeks she was there, she toured England and Scotland, taking many beautiful colored pictures which she later showed to her students.

Our loss has been great for in losing Miss Deininger we have lost a teacher, a good friend, and the influence of a truly fine person. Those of us who have actually been acquainted with Miss Deininger will certainly never forget her or the effect that she has had on our lives. Therefore, we the Class of 1952, dedicate these two pages to the memory of Miss Dorothea Deininger, whose life was tragically short, but to us all she will live in our memories as one who has lived her life to its fullest.



We worked up a great deal of enthusiasm over the project, and with the whole studio crew working together soon rounded out the fund started years ago by the senior classes. We proudly installed our very own electric organ!


Before taking time off to schedule our third year of telecasting we tuned the Student Council elections in on our screens, and our monitors selected Joseph Marbach

worked extra hard and we carried away top honors for a job well done. Before the Spotlight made its debut in January, we focused our cameras on the organization of an Executive Committee in the Student Council which brought greater efficiency to our entire studio.

Besides transmitting what turned out to be the most heart-breaking basketball game we ever had witnessed, we telecasted a special musical revue featuring our coiorful and talented Band and Twirling Squad as they performed under the expert direction of Mr. Mattick on the gym floor at Seton Hall. This year two trophies shared our screen—the Essex County runner-up and the State Sectional trophy.

No sooner had these colorful images faded from our screens, than we feverishly started to work moving our equipment into place at the Meadowbrook to bring to our audience our most dazzling production yet. With Ray Anthony's band to supply the music, our Junior Prom was a real hit.

The cameras, re-installed in our studio, we again fitted the Student Council elections into our busy schedule. This time we trained our lights on George Plosa and Lynn Dickinson whom the Council elected to direct its policies as president and treasurer respectively. More of our troupe won distinction as they were tapped for the Honor Society; and as the hands of our studio clock crept closer to our quitting time, our crews were kept even busier telecasting our last few productions. The Dinner Dance, Rye Beach Trip, and finally Commencement brought our service at studio WBHS-TV to a colorful close.


















"Meet the Press"










GOLF


Spotlight" BASEBALL
