Led by Joe Dente, president; Sarah Daniels, vice-president; and John Mineo, secretary-treasurer we stepped into the next square on the checkerboard of life at B.H.S. Even with Mr. Grossman trying to help us win the magazine campaign prize,

Howie Irving, secretary; and Ruth Cassidy, treasurer. Just as in Alice's Wonderland, events happened quickly and seemingly all at once. We were rich freshmen after the magazine campaign had ended. amazed freshmen after Twirp Week, and just a little annoyed at the "slithy" snowstorm that we needed the Sophomore Hop to provide us with the funds to continue our adventures. Mr. Grossman and Mr. Zuckerman were like Tweedledee and Tweedledum the way they battled for the possession of The Panda. As the "upper-lower classmen," we were noticed by representatives in sports, clubs and other activities around the school.

"The time has come," the walrus said, "To talk of many things."

Upperclassmen at last, we had members of our class in leading places: Bev Campbell was Student Council secretary, Joe Dente was the vice-president, and Nicholas La Para was assistant editor of the **Spotlight**.
