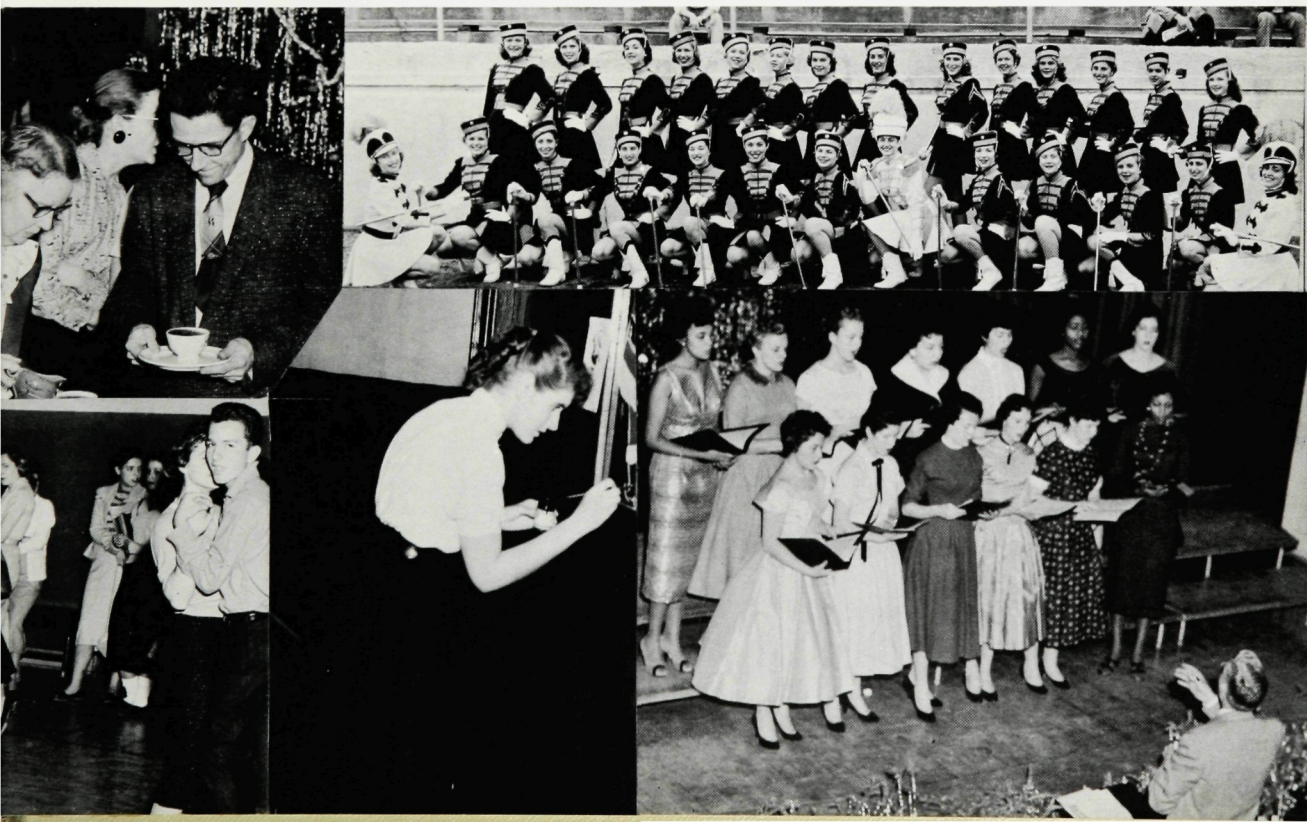
The National Honor Society began to hold its secret councils and everyone was on edge.

Credit should go to the many senior girls and boys who helped with the sets, props, lights, costumes, make-up, and all the other jobs that must be done to make a finished production.

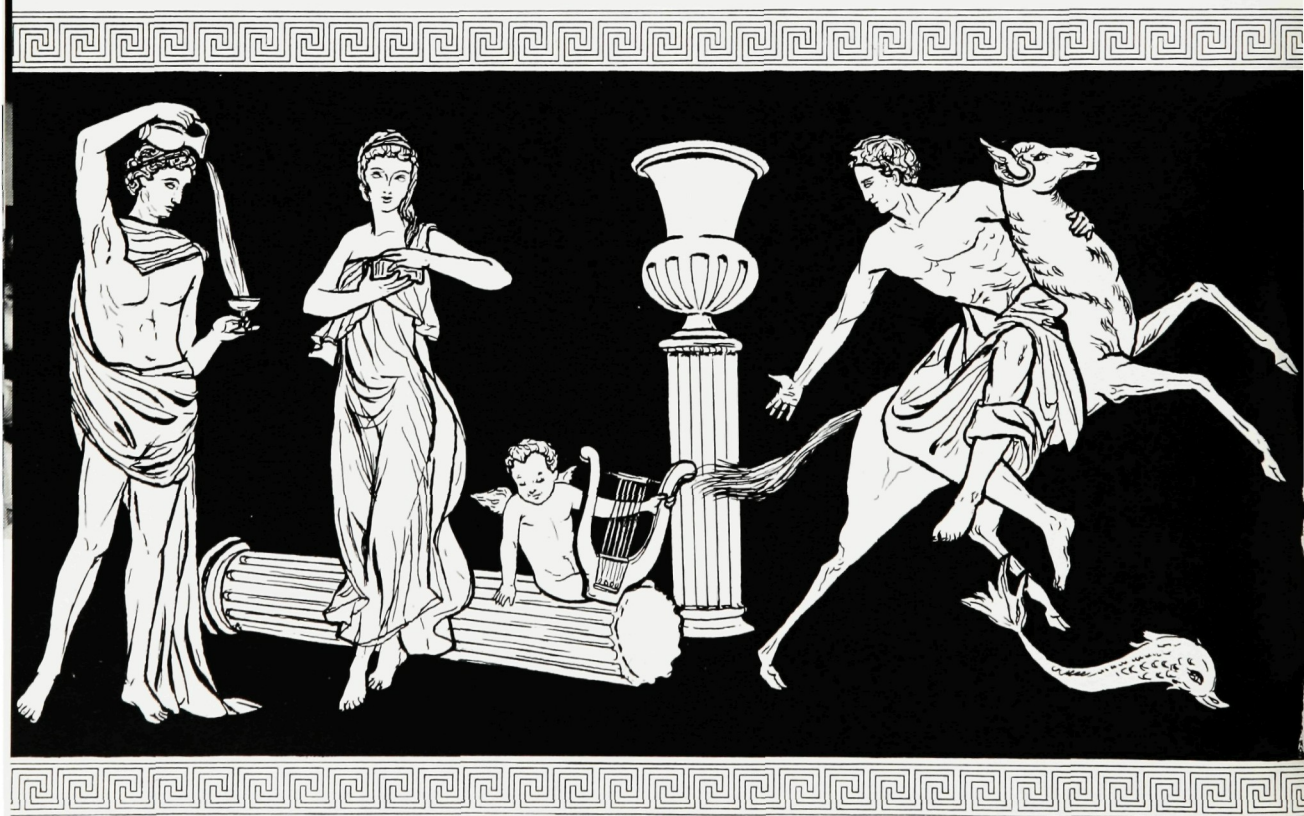

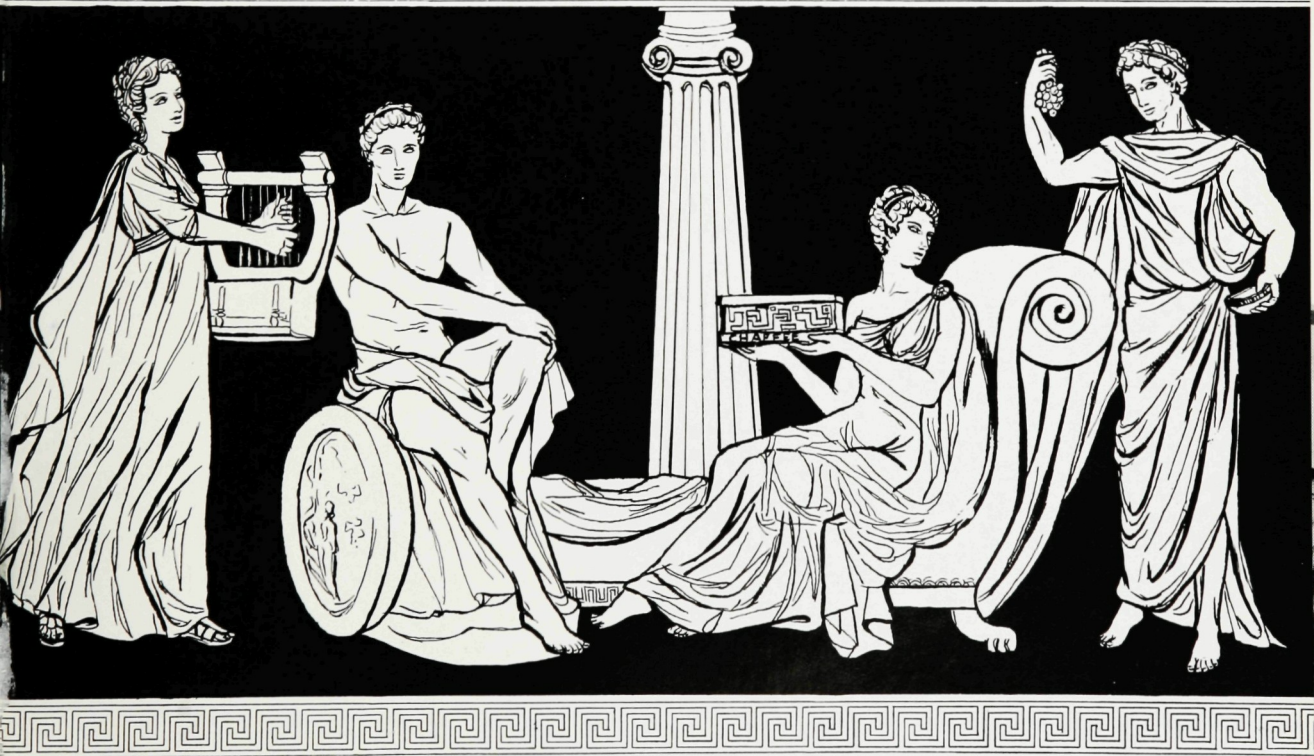

FRESHMAN SENATE

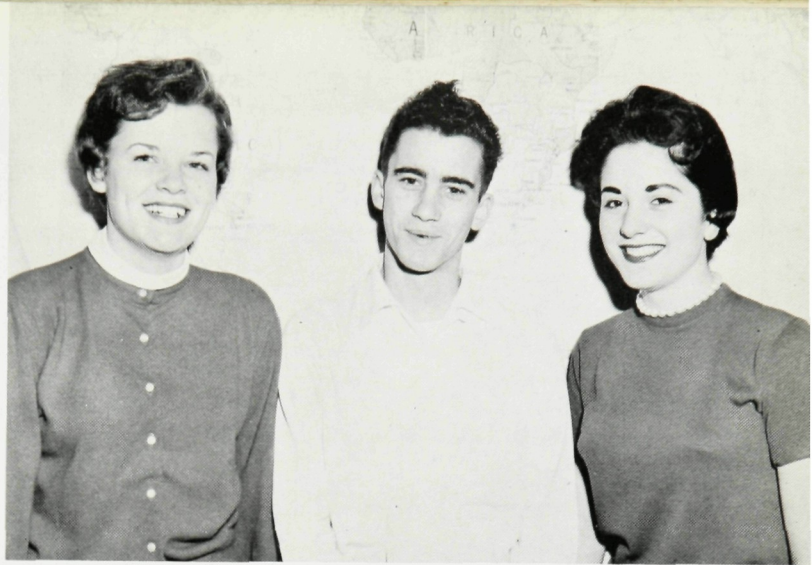

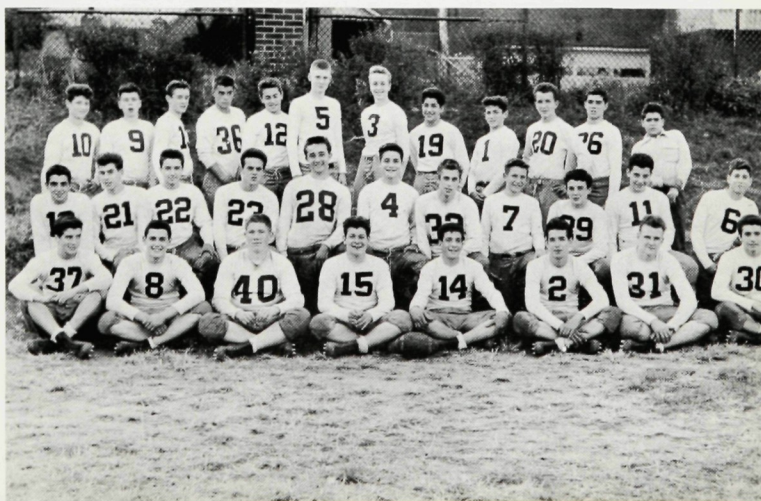

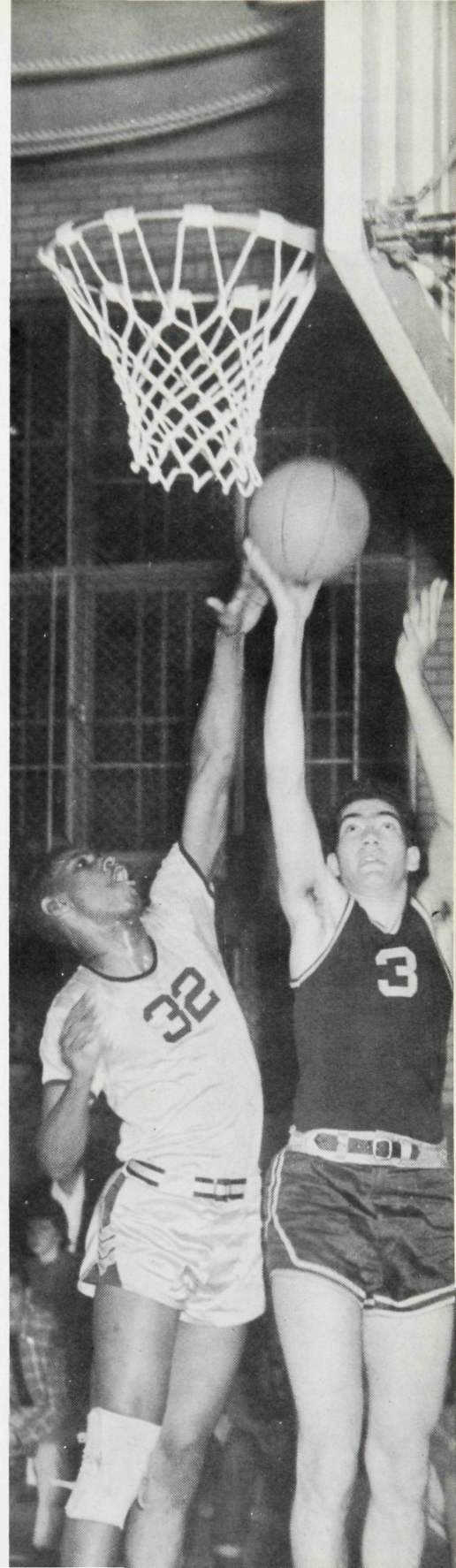

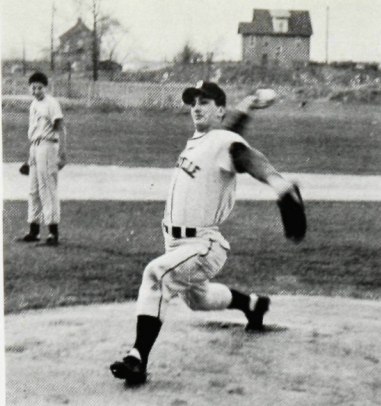
BASKETBALL

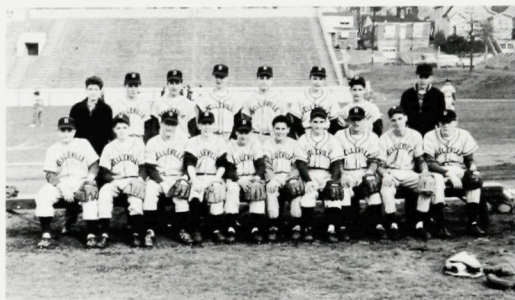
Joe Tortorello is about to unleash a fast ball during a warm-up session at the Stadium.

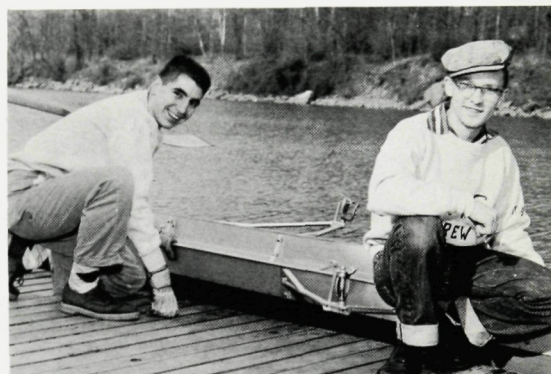

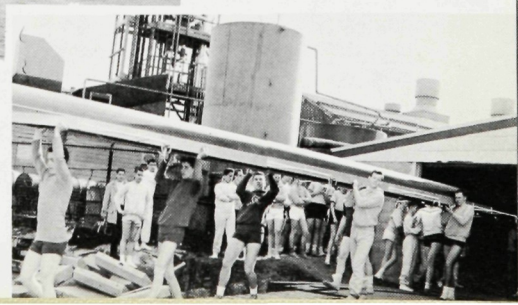
