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The Quill...

Clark still doesn't have its own Magistrate and we hear that the political maneuvering which has stalled the appointment is forcing Mayor Maguire to look outside of Clark for an attorney to fill the bench. This is indeed a sorry state of affairs. It's wrong that the township doesn't have its own judge to provide justice. It's disgraceful that the city fathers have reached a point where they have turned down several well-qualified men from each political party. But it will be a shame if the political bickering forces the Mayor to nominate a man to the bench who does not live in this community. It is a well-founded and widely accepted premise which requires policemen to reside in the community they serve. As a matter of fact, it's state law - supported by both political parties. We think it's even more important that the man who must rule on breaches of the law be a resident. He must be thoroughly familiar with each and every facet of the township, its people, and their habits. Only a man who lives here can know Clark well enough to meet out justice to the full measure of equity. Only a man who lives here can make himself as readily available as necessary to perform his duties properly. We urge the Council to consider these things Monday night and we hope Mayor Maguire will look into the qualifications of every attorney who lives in Clark before looking to a neighboring town for the man who will judge our laws, those who must enforce them, and our people.

We congratulate the township civic, social and service organizations which have endorsed the Green Acres program. We think this is something which would benefit the township for years to come... and need not cost us a dime. There are no restrictions on the funds given for "open spaces - parks and recreation". The land can be left in its original state if that's what the residents want. We urge the Council to consider the application very carefully - and to approve it. The question of additional sites is many-faceted and other areas of the town may well be developed later under this program.

We are mindful, though, of the many readers who asked us why the application must include the Bartell Place site now that the nursing home has been approved for that land. This will mean the loss of approximately \$20,000 to \$25,000 in taxes each year. Perhaps the town might be better served if this area was removed from the application.

With all the talk of Master Plans - and the importance of recreation and open spaces - we wonder if the comments we hear are true about the Planning Board's consideration of private homes for an area recommended for open spaces...

After the ball was over: We were invited to the Governor's Inaugural Ball Tuesday evening and were pleased to note that humor isn't dead among the few Republicans now sitting in the Legislature. Assembly Minority Leader Frank Mc Dermott, of Westfield, may be credited with the "comment of the evening": Amid thousands of guests in the huge army, with the orchestra playing campaign-theme "Hey, Look me over", and looking at Governor Hughes standing far above the crowds on a large balcony, flanked by a dozen Colonial N. J.-attired men, Mc Dermott, who won by only ten votes, remarked: "Just think, only 450,000 votes and that could have been Dumont!"

We commented on and admired the more than two dozen glittering chandeliers, which were dazzling in their brilliance, - and were a little disappointed to find out they were plastic.

Conspicuous by their absence at the ball were newly-elected Assemblyman Robert Henderson and Democratic County Chairman James Kinneally of Rahway.

And then - they played "Hail to the Chief" for the Governor. Although this march is rightly reserved for the President of the United States most times - we want to assure LBJ that the Governor was given only a 19 gun salute.

But the real "show-stealer" was Betty Hughes, the Governor's wife, who welcomed the guests... told them that the caterers had been working since 8 that morning... and even promised to try to help out if things weren't right during dinner. And you got the feeling that she would have too.

First Fatality Since '58 Here Kills Driver

CLARK - The first fatal automobile accident in the township since November 28, 1958, resulted in the death of Dennis Hill, 21, of 51 Roosevelt Ave., Carteret.

Hill died in Rahway Hospital Sunday evening apparently of injuries incurred when his car was involved in a three-car accident earlier that evening at Broadway and Liberty St. Sgt. Anthony T. Smar stated that he was detailed to the scene at 8:53 p.m. Sunday and when he arrived there were two cars on Broadway facing south and a third auto on Liberty headed in a southerly direction.

Hill was identified as the driver of the 1957 Ford located on Liberty Street. Three passengers in the auto were: Renee Harris, 16, and Deborah Harris, 16, cousins, both of 226 W. Morris Avenue, Linden, and Dennis Tardy, 16, of 26 Warrent Street, Carteret. Einar J. Tyvella, 18, of 73 Emerald Place, was identified as the driver of a '59 Ford and Charles L. Nagle, 30, of Hiran Trailer Camp, Avenel, was listed as the driver of a '62 Chrysler.

Organizations Voice Approval For Green Acres Project

CLARK - Local civic, service and social organizations have announced this week that they approve the proposed "Green Acres" project for the township.

Mayor William Maguire said today that the application for the federal and state funds for open spaces and recreation has been endorsed by every civic organization in the township. He added that through resolution or petition signatures he had received the support of the Riverside Civic Association, the Southwest Civic Association, the Kiwanis, the Rotary Club, the Jaycees, the Lions Club, the First Aid Squad, the Fire Department, and members of the Board of Education.

The Mayor, who has appeared at numerous public meetings recently to explain the "Green Acres" project and to ask for residents' support, said that he aimed for "quality rather than quantity" in building support.

At the Riverside Civic association meeting Monday evening, a resident asked "What steps must be taken to have Council fulfill the voice and request of the people they represent and were elected by, rather than their own personal opinions?" The Mayor answered by indicating the petition he had brought to the meeting.

Scouts Recruit Members

CLARK - Sea Scout Ship Thunderbird, No. 44, sponsored by the Osceola Presbyterian Church in Clark is conducting a recruiting drive for new members.

This Sea Scout Ship has a 36' Sport Fisherman boat with twin 8 cylinder Chrysler Crown engines. It is equipped with a galley and head and is capable of sleeping a crew of eight. Sirens Will Alert Students Of 'No School'

CLARK - It has been announced by Public Safety Director Charles Grunder that the Air Raid Sirens (CD) will be used to herald the emergency warning for the closing of Clark Schools.

This will replace the Fire signal which has been used in the past. When the schools are closed the police department receives hundreds of telephone calls, the Director said, and this will free the policeman on duty from answering the calls.

This signal will be used for all Clark public and parochial grade schools.

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

Contributions of Negroes To World Civilization

EDITOR'S NOTE: This article was written in response to a number of questions concerning the Negroes' contribution to world civilization.

I should like to begin by saying that contrary to the slanders of some writers who have tried to picture the Negroes as hordes of wild savages without influence upon the cultural advancement of man-kind, Negroes have played a very prominent part in the development of world civilization.

This is particularly true in North Africa. They were especially influential in Egypt, a country which was largely Negro. As early as 2000 B.C. the Negro Ranahesi sat upon the Egyptian Throne. Dr. John Hope Franklin says, "The blacks from Nubia had helped to construct the great sphinxes, pyramids, and public buildings of Egypt. They had helped to perfect the political organization of the country."

Dr. DuBois says, "We conclude, therefore, that the Egy-

tians are Negroid and not only that but, by tradition, they believed themselves descended not from the whites or yellow, but from the black peoples of the south."

Herodotus, the Greek historian says that the Egyptians of his time had dark skin and woolly hair.

Ethiopia (Abyssinia), a Negro land, was for centuries a place of culture in the world. About 741 B.C. Piankhi, an Ethiopian emperor, over-ran Egypt and made it a dependency of his country. At this time northern Europe was in the lower stages of barbarism. It is said that Greek art received a decisive impulse from African civilization and centuries later African culture exerted a profound influence upon the intellectual development of Spain, Portugal and Italy. It has often been asserted that "Negroes are responsible for European civilization, as modern Europe really derives her civilization from Rome, Rome borrowed hers from Greece and the Greek civilization rested on the arts and science of Negro Egypt. Dr. J. H. Lawson says, "The culture that we call European owes as much to Africa as to Asia."

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
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Rahway Wrestlers Win, Take Conference Lead
