The traffic at the Valley Road-Broadway intersection these days makes liability insurance really necessary. Why not invite some of our state officials to Clark for a day - and then drive through the intersection about 5 p.m. Maybe that would speed things up a bit.

In answer to many questions we want to assure our readers that we want to publish stories about club meetings, activities and projects. Some weeks ago we began a "Community Coming Events" listing - for which groups could pay \$2 for a listing and insert any information they wished. We did this for two reasons: 1. Many groups wanted some way to advertise activities in the Clark and Rahway papers where the most people would read about them - but they didn't want to spend much money. 2. In these listings the club could advertise whatever information they wished. In a news story there are certain things which cannot be carried. And it will be a day when the stories of the cherry tree and silver dollar are told to our young. Clark State Bank Announces 4% Rate

Keeping in line with the current increase in savings account interest rates by large metropolitan area financial institutions, the Board of Directors of Clark State Bank this week announced an increase to 4 per cent on savings accounts and 4-1/4 per cent on \$1,000 time certificates of deposit. According to Victor W. Clark, executive vice president, the increase will be retroactive

to savings depositors for the interest period beginning Dec. 1, 1965.

Clark State Bank, with offices on Raritan Road and on Westfield Avenue, Clark, is only the fourth bank in the Clark area to increase the interest rate. Clark pointed out, "A recent survey," the executive vice president noted, "showed a need for increasing the interest rate to the maximum permissible for commercial banks."

"The increase," Clark said, "is in keeping with the policy of Clark State Bank to offer all the advantages of a large metropolitan financial institution, while remaining independent so as to create the closest possible relationship with depositors."

CLARK - Since the National Honor Society of Arthur L. At their first board meeting in their new board room, the trustees of the Temple Beth Or scheduled plans for the dedication of the new building. The ceremonies are tentatively scheduled for the weekend of May 13, it was announced.

A Dedication Journal is in process of preparation, under the chairmanship of Lester Kastner, and should be ready for distribution at the Dedication Ceremonies.

At a special Council meeting Friday evening the Municipal Council introduced a \$1,194,609 budget by a 4-3 vote with the Democratic members voting in favor of the proposal.

Although the budget is up \$98,800 the tax levy for the homeowners has been reduced by more than one-fourth. The proposed tax levy for 1966 is \$361,700.

The tax rate was estimated at \$5.46 on 50 per cent valuation which is an increase over last year.

The increase was attributed to the rising school costs because the municipal government share has been reduced, it was reported.

In introducing the budget in its present form \$45,000 has been cut from the requests sent to the Council by Mayor William Maguire. Republican councilmen, all of whom voted against the budget as proposed, have indicated that a statement outlining their objections will be forthcoming.

The final passage of the proposed budget is slated for the March Council meeting.

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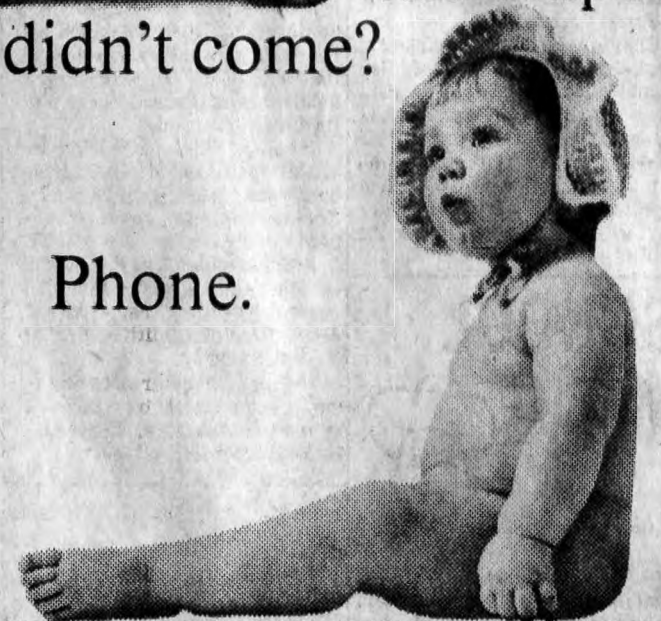

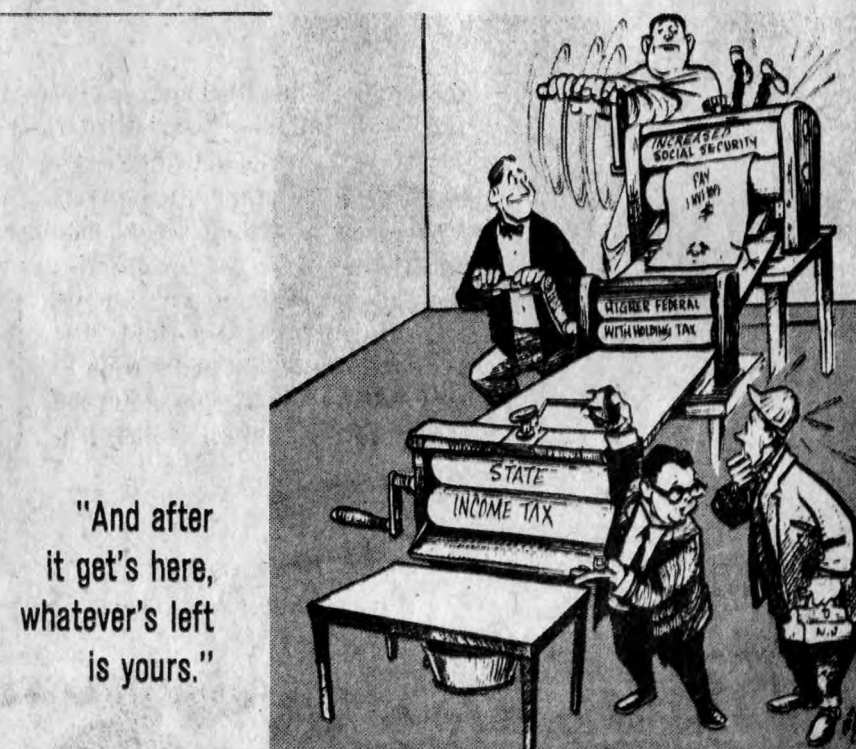

McLaughlin to contact the State Board and request that legislation be introduced to put all retired state, county and municipal employees on the same footing as retired Federal Civil Service employees. "All retired Federal Civil Service employees, as well as those of some of the largest states and cities, now get automatic cost-of-living pension increases, tied to the cost of living index that is published monthly by the U.S. Department of Commerce.

The following was suggested to be included in his proposal for legislation:

1. An early increase of at least 10 per cent in all state pensions.

2. An escalation clause that would tie all state pensions to the cost of living index and so make future increases automatic if living costs continue to rise. (Federal Civil Service pensioners have been getting such increases for some years past.)

Heart Fund Volunteers To Begin Drive Sunday

The month-long 1966 Heart Fund campaign will reach its high point on Sunday, February 20, when Heart Sunday volunteers commence a canvass of residences in Rahway and Clark. It was announced today by William Wanko and John Corey, Rahway chairmen, and Mr. and Mrs. John Voynick, Clark chairmen. It is anticipated that all residential visits will be completed and that kits will be turned in not later than February 28.

The residential canvass will augment the total already collected in the February campaign, which is being conducted to support and expand research, education and community service programs of the Union County Heart Association. It is part of the American Heart Association, the only national voluntary health agency devoted exclusively to combating diseases of the heart and blood vessels.

During the last year for which vital statistics are available these diseases were responsible for 1813 of 3487 deaths in Union County, while in the nation they account for approximately 54 per cent of all deaths each year.

Each Heart volunteer will call at the homes of between 50 and 100 neighbors, distributing helpful information about the heart diseases and receiving contributions for the Heart Fund, the chairmen said.

Emphasizing the uniqueness of the Heart Cause, Wanko and Corey pointed out that Heart Fund contributions go to fight a vast complex of diseases, among them heart attack, stroke, hardening of the arteries, high blood pressure, rheumatic fever and inborn heart defects.

They urged Rahway and Clark residents to be generous when the Heart Sunday volunteer calls.

In case of inclement weather, the Heart Sunday canvass will be postponed until February 27.

SECTION 1. CHAPTER V—OFFICE OF THE TOWNSHIP CLERK, Section 1-5-7. Fees be and the same is hereby

amended to read as follows: 1-5-7. Fees. The Township Clerk shall charge and receive for the use of the Township such fees for transcripts and certificates as shall be authorized by resolution of the Council.

SECTION 2. CHAPTER VII—DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION, HEALTH AND WELFARE, Section 1-7-2. Organization. The department shall consist of divisions of administration, health and welfare and plumbing inspection.

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


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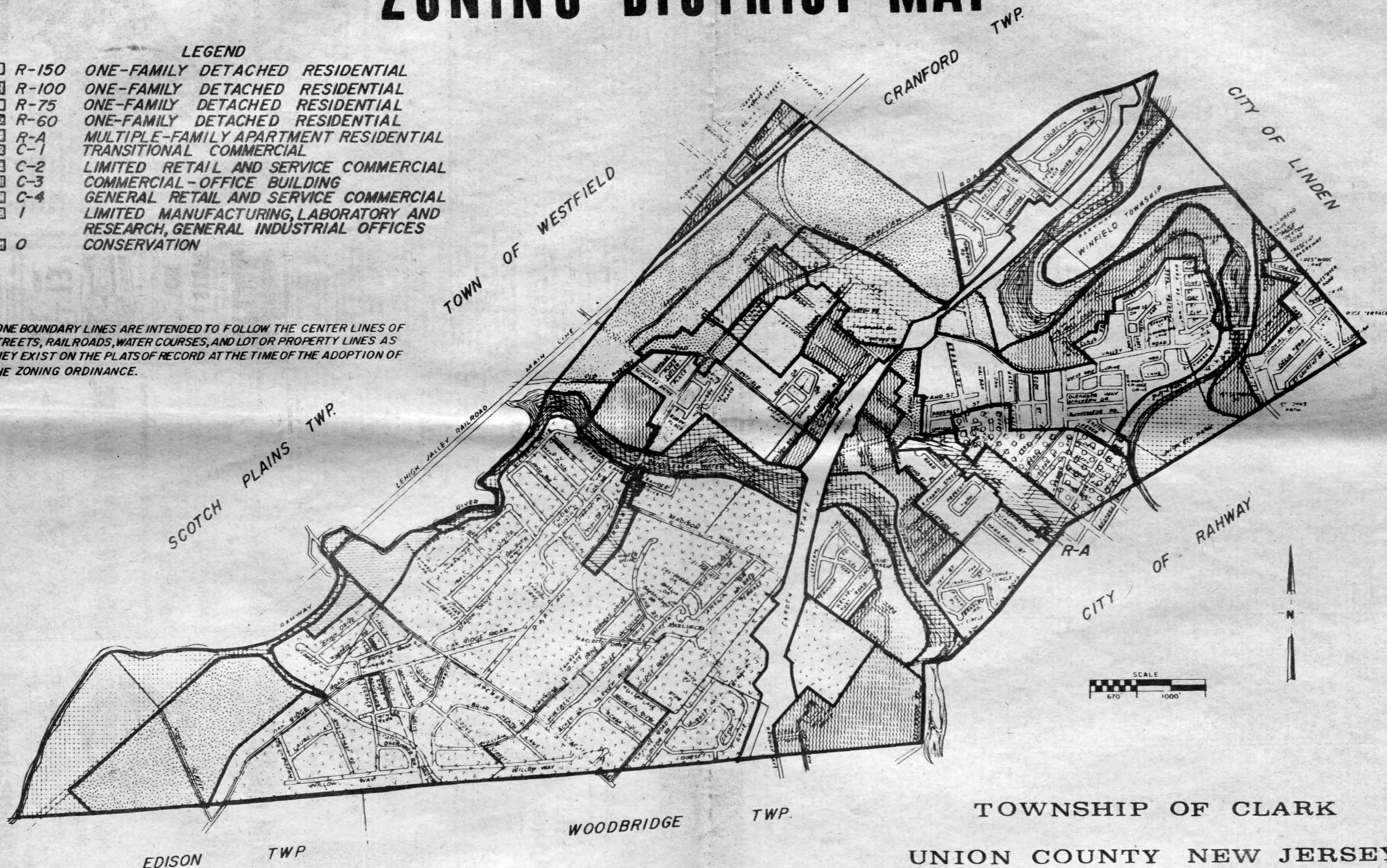
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ZONING DISTRICT MAP
