We are "wearin' 'o the Green" today because it is Saint Patrick's Day,

We want to join with all of our Irish 'riends in their great celebration today. But even more importantly, we want to emphasize that we believe that this is not only a day which recognizes the contributions made by the Irish. In a very real sense it is a day which honors all national origins.

Saint Patrick's Day belongs to the Irish but today every Italian is a little more Italian-every Pole is a little more Polish-every German is a little more German.

An for this reason, we are all just a little more American.

We'd like a few answers ourselves-but town hall officials seem somewhat reluctant to provide them. In response to resuests from many residents we've been attempting to find out how much money Township Attorney Johnstone was paid last year. We understand that it is in the neighborhood of \$40,000-far above what was allocated in the budget. We understand that Municipal Attorneys in neighboring communities do submit estimates of the legal fees involved in certain cases-as being requested now in Clark. We understand that the fees being paid to the Clark Attorney are almost double the fees charged by other Municipal Altorneys.

If we could just get some figures on his payment we'd be able to tell you.

The "Clark Patriot" has carefully refused to comment on the guilt or innocense of the five township officials who were convicted last week. We recognize the strength of a merspaper and carefully avoided "trial by press." But the men have been found guilty by a jury of their peers. Although we realize that a convintion is not final until after an appeal, we feel that now we must speak.

The trial is over. Until the jury returns its verdict -the men are "innocent until proven guilty." The "burden of proof" rested on the people to prove the charges they had leveled against these men. Now the jury has returned a verdict of guilty. The burden of proof shifts. Now the five men must prove to society that they were not guilty. Until this is done, we feel that the law of the township must be obeyed. We feel that it is incumbent upon Councilman Hejselbak to resign-not take a leave of absence-from the Council. The law is clear: "Any person convicted of a crime or oense involving moral turpitude . . , while in office shall' forfeit his ojce." We feel that a resignation now would be in both the best interests of the Councilman and of Clark.

Many of America's most famous Irishmen came to this country to escape the starvation and devastation of the great potato famine. The ancestors of many Rah-

way and Clark residents arrived in America as a result of this infomous famine - and the ancestors of many residents of all nationalities helped the Irish in that time of need,

Rahway area farmers sent part of their home-grown produce to relieve the widespread hunger. Rahway area residents sent much of their own clothing and some of their money to the Irish citizens. Rahway area churches organized drives and collected the food, clothing, farm implements, money and medical supplies which were sent by ship from Newark.

The following is an actual account from the February 25, 1847 edition of the NEW JER-SEY ADVOCATE, the fore-runner of the RAHWAY NEWS-RECORD.

The Horrors In Ireland are even greater than our previous reports. It is now reported that there are 350,000 families over and above the ordinary laborers and farmers now destitute in Ireland, requiring at a calculation of 201. per family, 7,000,0001. for their yearly maintenance.

The Relief Committee of the City of Newark, in accordance with the generally expressed wish of the Inhabitants of the State of New Jersey, that a ship should be provided for the purpose of conveying the contributions of the state to the suffering population of Ireland give notice, to their fellow citizens of the state that a suitable ship is about being provided for that purpose, and every exertion will be made to send ber with the least possible de-

As we go to press it appears that Governor Hughes may have lost those votes which had been reported ready to impose upon the people of the state an income tax. The outcome of the filibuster in Trenton, confusion on the Assembly floor, and reported attempts to propose a referendum have delayed the income tax from slipping through. It had appeared that the well-greased wheels of political experiency were racing along toward the establishment of a tax which many voices in the state have protested. No better example of the "power of the people" is evident today. Letters by the thousands, have poured into the offices of state Assemblymen and Senators. Phone call followed phone call to question the need for a broad-based tax. Many polls similar to the one conducted by this paper, demanded that the people have a say in deciding how they be taxed.

The Irish are known for their wisdom, - their wit, their pride, - their strength, - their courage, and above all, - their faith in God. All of this comes from their devotion to their Heritage. Their constant desire is to look for the best in this Heritage and apply it to their lives so that in some small way they will contribute to the continuance of this Heritage.

Being Irish is really a state of mind. - A state of mind which reflects faith, courage, and confidence. These things are intangible, but they flow directly from an awareness of our Heritage. The fact that the birthright of St. Patrick is claimed by at least six countries bothers not the Irish, for to them he is the symbol of our Irish Heritage.

A few weeks ago I was given a story which I think is apropos. It demonstrates the undaunted spirit of the Irish. \* \* \*

In the Young Irish Disorders in Ireland in 1848, nine men were captured, tried and convicted of treason against Her Majesty, Victoria, the Queen. They were sentenced to death. Passionate protests, not only in Ireland, but from all over the world, forced Queen Victoria to commute the death sentence. She decreed that all be transported to, and exiled for life in far off, wild Australia.

In 1874 word reached the astonished Victoria that the Sir Charles Duffy who had been elected Prime Minister of Australia, was the same Charles Duffy who had been exiled at her command 26 years before.

On the Queen's demand for information regarding the remaining exiled convicts, an investigation followed. The study of records and their whereabouts revealed this:

Thomas Francis Meagher, Governor of Montana. Terence McManus, Brigadier General United States Army.

Patrick Donahue, Brigadier General United States Army. Richard O'Gorman, Governor General of Newfoundland. Morris Lyene, Attorney General of Australia, in which

office Michael Ireland succeeded him. Thomas McGee, Minister of Parliament, Montreal, Min-

ister of Agriculture and President of the Council, Dominion of Canada.

John Mitchell, prominent New York policitian and father of the celebrated Mayor of New York, John Purroy Mitchell.

The story of these nine men has been repeated thousands of times over. The history of our country, the refuge of oppressed people from all over the world, is the history of our Irish Heritage. From John Carroll, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence to John Fitzgerald Kennedy, we see demonstrated our part in the building of the greatest nation in the world.

We can only pray that we, the Young Irish, accept this inheritance and continue in the spirit of our Heritage.

The above guest editorial is a portion of a speech presented by Richard Lawlor, who was named "Young Irishman of the Year." The address was given to the annual Friendly Sons of Saint Patrick last year.





# **Teachers Will Study Test Results** At Workshop Scheduled For April 5

The second all day Institute and Workshop for teachers in the Rahway Public School System was approved by the Board of Education last night on recommendations of Superintendent of Schools Richard M. Nash. There will be no classes for students on April 5, but all teachers will report for the institute which will be led by school administrators, super-visors and a group of consultants.

The application of skills in English and Reading as they relate to each subject matter area will be considered at the Senior High School workshop with members of the English faculty serving as the leaders. Teachers in the elementary schools and the Junior High School will spend the day in considering ways and means of extending strengths and overcoming weaknesses revealed in batteries of achievement tests




