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The Quill...

As we go to press Governor Hughes has lost the votes needed for passage of his income tax, which is now before the New Jersey Senate.

The measure has reached the Senate principally because of the support the Governor received from Assemblymen Henderson, Gavan and Higgins - of Union County - all of whom voted in favor of the income tax. It passed by one vote in the Assembly.

It is difficult for us to understand how these men could support a tax which the great majority of the people do not want. To our knowledge, only one organization in the state has come out in favor of an income tax - and every poll, including the one taken by the Clark Patriot has shown that most of the people want unnecessary spending cut first. And then, if a broad-based tax is necessary - they would prefer a sales tax or lottery.

For the measure's defeat in the Senate much credit must go to Minority Leader Frank McDermott and Assemblyman Nick La Corte, both also from Union County, who led the debate in opposition to the proposed tax. They also co-sponsored a bill which would give the people the right to decide through referendum the kind of tax that is to be levied. For better or for worse, since Assemblymen Henderson, Gavan and Higgins have been called "the men most responsible for passing the income tax in the Assembly" - Assemblymen McDermott and La Corte must be called "the men most responsible for pressure brought on the Senate" to defeat this bill.

We were pleased to report last week that the efforts of the citizens of Valley Road to restrict traffic on the street were successful. We were also pleased at the number of township politicians who travelled to Trenton to aid these taxpayers. And we were amused at the number of politicians who are now trying to take credit for the success in the state capital.

Here's another one for you gentlemen - the Westfield Avenue businessmen have repeatedly asked about the water and debris which floats along the Avenue toward the sewer near Madison Hill Road. They claim that the incline of the street drags paper, cans and other garbage along the curbs with rain water - and leaves deposits of this debris along the street. This is not only an eyesore on one of Clark's busiest roads - but a health hazard to the many residents who walk along Westfield Avenue each day.

The street is a county road - under the control of the board of freeholders. Why not take this up with the freeholders now? We wish you as much success in Elizabeth as you had in Trenton.

It's ironic that a town where most of the political conversation invariably ends with a discussion of legal fees (township attorney), court decisions (Hejselbak etc. conviction), and the pending case of Business Administrator vs. Council President - should be without its own Magistrate.

Clark has been without its own Magistrate for more than 5 months. The situation should not be allowed to continue because of petty political tricks. We ask the Council to accept its responsibility and confirm the appointment of one of the many nominations submitted by the Mayor. Monday evening's Council meeting provides an excellent opportunity for the appointment. We urge the Council to act.

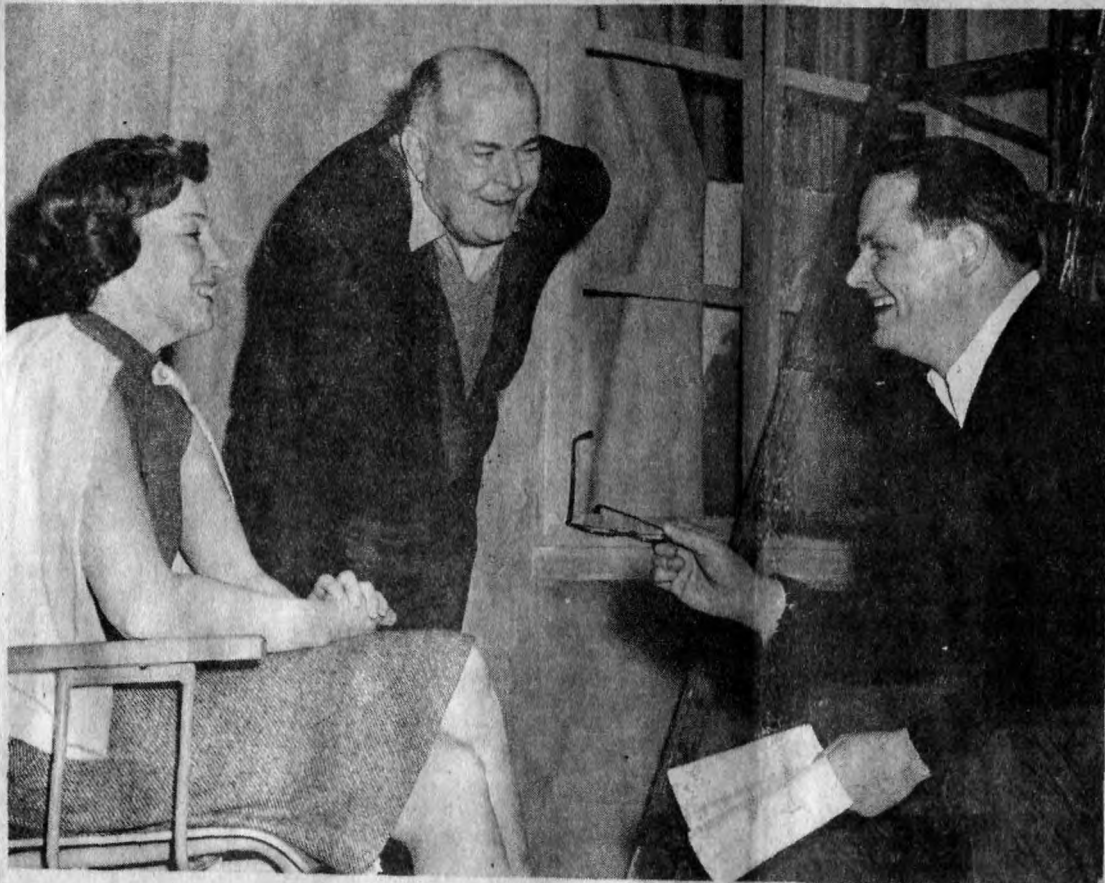

Now that Councilman Hejselbak has refused to resign his seat as a Councilman in spite of the fact that he was convicted of an offense involving moral turpitude, and his removal is entangled in legal technicalities - for those readers who agree with us that he should no longer serve we quote the Faulkner Act of the state of New Jersey:

"Any elective officer shall be subject to removal from office for cause connected with his office . . . upon the filing of a recall petition and the affirmative vote of a majority of those voting on the question of removal at any general, regular municipal or special election.

"A recall petition shall demand the removal of a designated incumbent, shall be signed by qualified voters equal in number to at least twenty-five per centum (25%) of the registered voters of the municipality, and shall be filed with the municipal clerk.

If the official does not resign "the municipal clerk shall order and fix a date for holding a recall election not less than sixty nor more than ninety days from the filing of the petition."

Clark Post Office Will Offer Applications For Medicare

Postmaster Warren T. Moulton of Rahway announced today that application blanks for supplemental Medicare benefits are available at the General Delivery window of the Rahway, Clark, and Colonia Post Offices.

The application blanks are being made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 3.1 million senior citizens before a March 31 deadline imposed by the Medicare law.

President Johnson has proclaimed March as "National Medicare Enrollment Month." He urged all federal agencies and all citizens to cooperate in enrolling senior citizens in the program.

Initially, some two and one-half million application blanks were distributed to nearly 34,000 main post offices throughout the 50 states. Additional forms are available as needed.

Through direct mailings and other means, the Social Security Administration has had contact with 16 of the 19.1 million citizens who will be 65 or over on July 1. Of the 16 million who replied, less than one million said they did not want to sign up for the supplemental program.

The supplemental program costs \$3 a month and provides doctor bill and other benefits. Everyone 65 and over is eligible for the basic hospital benefits under Medicare.

A copy of the application blank is displayed on the lobby bulletin board of each Post Office.

Senior citizens who reached 65 before 1966 face a two year delay if they do not sign up by March 31. The application forms are preaddressed to the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland.

CLARK DRUGS URGES POISON PREVENTION

In conjunction with Poison Prevention Week, Clark Drugs is now offering a liquid to induce vomiting as an antidote for poisons.

The pharmacy, which will also provide a checklist of poison antidotes upon request, is cooperating in the national observance of Poison Prevention Week in an attempt to "help reduce accidental poisonings in New Jersey. It is estimated that there are about 14,000 accidental poisonings occurring yearly in New Jersey," it was reported.

Specialists in Poison Control report that although less than 100 of these poisonings have been fatal, many could have been prevented.

The observance is endorsed by the New Jersey Pharmaceutical Association, the New Jersey Hospital Association, the Safety Council and the State Department of Health.

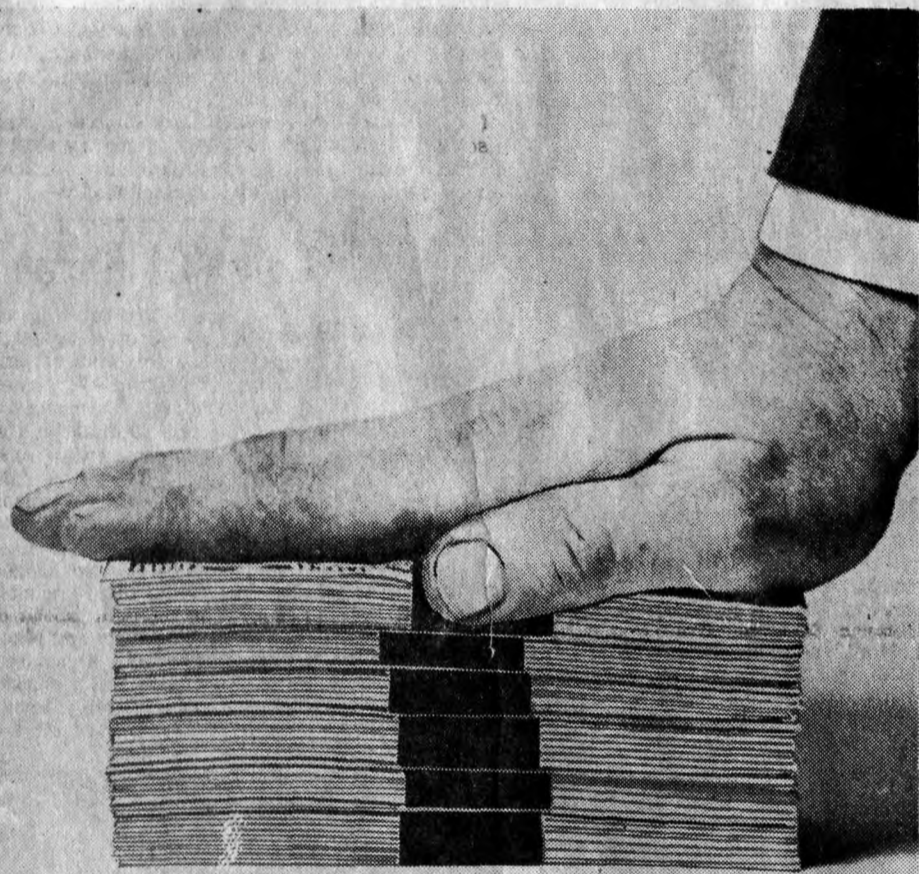

Miss Diedzic spent a day studying the equipment and techniques used at the research center. The Sloan-Kettering Institute is the largest cancer research center in the United States and deals with almost all known types of diseases.

Miss Diedzic told of the latest research methods being used to study cancer. "Fractionation Scheme of Cigarette Smoke Condensate" is one example. This method determines the molecular and elemental components of cigarette smoke.

Also discussed was the use of radiography for the study of cancerous cells. This method permits the tracing of cells through the developmental stages.

This was a very interesting and enlightening discussion about a deadly disease, Miss Diedzic said. "This was certainly a worthwhile and informative trip," she added.

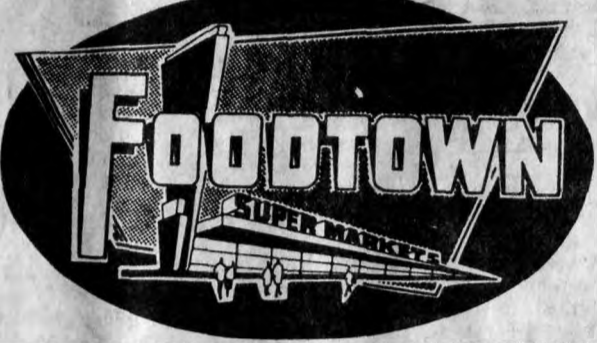

Dental Hygiene Clinic Held At Rahway Jr. High

The second annual dental hygiene clinic was held at the Rahway Junior High School on Wednesday under the direction of Dr. Irving Klein, a Rahway dentist and Nicholas Delmonaco, physical education instructor at the Junior High School.

The main purpose of the program is to educate students in the proper care of the teeth.
