No Attorney Yet For Adjustment Bd.; **Special Meetings Set**

At Monday's meeting of the Clark Board of Adjustment, the members of the Board acted without advice of a Board attorney, in the vacancy created by the recent resignation of Board attorney John Higgins. In commenting on special

meetings of the Board, which have been scheduled for the next two weeks, Board President John Allaire stated today that he does not know yet whether an attorney will be appointed. Mr. Allaire stated that Stanley Fink of 203 Gibson Boulevard has approached him in regard to being appointed to the position. As yet, no other applicants have been presented to him, Mr. Allaire said.

In discussing the position, Mr. Allaire explained that the attorney's appointment is presently considered a Civil Service appointment. It has not been clarified,

however, whether the applicants for the position must have taken the exam prior to appointment.

Riverside Ass'n. Hears Johnson **On Town Council**

At the Riverside Park Civic Association's regular monthly meeting at Osceola Church, evening, Councilman Monday Robert Johnson discussed the function of the town Council and its meaning to residents.

A question and answer period followed.
