What's this we hear - about the paychecks for town hall employees? We understand that checks for Municipal employees are made out more than a week in advance - and are actually given to employees with pay included for a day they haven't even worked yet!

Sound confusing? It sure is. Reports have it that the paychecks received by Clark municipal employees today (June 2) were made out last week and pay the employees through tomorrow (June 3).

What happens if the person is sick - or takes time off - in between when the check is made out and when he's paid. What happens when he is paid for Friday but doesn't show up? Does the town get credit?

Certainly seems like a strange book-keeping system.

Residents who've complained about the added traffic on the Lehigh Valley tracks recently have reason to rejoice - the traffic jam has ended.

With the Elizabethport bridge out of service after being hit by a freighter recently, the Interstate Commerce Commission officials switched trains on the Central Railroad of N. J., the Reading, and the Baltimore & Ohio R. R. to the tracks of the Lehigh Valley R. R. - and hence, the added traffic through Clark. The damage has been corrected - the trains are back on their own tracks - and the matter should be settled.

Neighbors . . . members of Clark civic associations . . . officers in Clark service clubs . . . a young boy almost his age . . . strangers he's never met. All these and more have been turning their interests and energies to relieve the burden of some of the medical expenses incurred by a young Clark boy.

Eric Trinker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fritz Trinker of Hillside Avenue, is the victim of a rare blood disease - but that and other illnesses which have kept him almost bedridden since November - have failed to get the best of him. Eric, who was hospitalized in Rahway last November and then transferred to New York Hospital, has suffered two strokes, gone through the chicken pox and fought off a bout of bronchitis since he first became ill with the blood disease. But, he keeps working to get well - has recovered the use of his right side - and hopes to return to classes in the second grade at Valley Road School. He's being helped by his parents and his six-year-old sister, Heidi, but many other Clark residents have joined in the fight.

Under the direction of Jaycee past president James Flood, the Eric Trinker Fund has been established to help defray medical expenses. David Reilly, a young neighbor was one of the first workers for the Fund and contributed \$63 which was donated by friends and neighbors.

But a lot more is needed - and a benefit softball game will be sponsored soon by the Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions Clubs and the Jaycees.

The top athletes, twirlers, cheerleaders, and members of the band and color guard - 110 in number - were honored last week at the Tenth Annual All Sports Awards Dinner, sponsored by the Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School Booster Club.

Principal speaker for the evening was Dr. Melvin R. Schmid, head soccer coach and an associate professor at Trenton State College.

Serving again as Master of Ceremonies was the high school's Director of Athletics and baseball coach Louis Peragallo, who filled the spot he first stepped into at the inauguration of the dinner ten years ago.

The invocation was delivered by the Rev. Robert T. Marshall, rector of the Christian Missionary Alliance Church, Clark.

The awards for the outstanding girl and boy athletes went to Linda Noyes, of Garwood and to Jack Howie of 326 Parkway Drive, Clark, an all around athlete who won the District Tournament Wrestling Championship for the Crusaders this year and placed second in the Regional Tournament and third in the State A.A.U. Championship. They were each awarded a trophy. Making the presentation was John Brown, Coordinator of Athletics of the Regional District.

The winners of the awards for achieving the highest scholastic averages were both from Clark this year. Andrea Richardson of 70 Nassau Street and Richard Mattern of 69 Hutchins Street were each presented with watches for this achievement. Louis De Rosa, Assistant Principal, made the presentation.

The new V. F. W. Football Trophy was presented by Commander Henry Tragonski of Clark Post #7363 to Coach "Red" Kellin of the Crusaders as the winner of the traditional football game between Clark and Rahway. The trophy will be kept by the school that wins three consecutive games. Last year, Johnson High School retained a trophy after winning three consecutive games.

Among the honored guests were Mayor William J. Maguire and Garwood's Mayor, Edward S. Tripka. Dr. Warren M. Davis, superintendent of the Regional District No. 1, was also present and spoke briefly, noting that he, too, had attended all ten of the annual dinners. Where Are Your Children Now??

Dear Parents: Do you know where your children are right now? How about last night? Each year a great deal of the taxpayer's money, including my own, has to be spent for repair work throughout the city because of malicious damage to public property caused by some of our children.

The Recreation Department tries to provide a suitable program for our children. How can we do this when doors are pulled off storage facilities; toilets are blown apart with fireworks; roofs torn to bits; storage sheds damaged by fire, and equipment is constantly being stolen after the grounds are closed for the evening?

There are two pictures that accompany this letter.

The playground shed shown in the picture was painted by the city maintenance department on the Tuesday after the playgrounds opened last season. That evening it was completely "repainted" by some children in the area who felt that destruction of city property was a recreational activity.

I am pleading with all our residents to develop some sort of civic pride in our community. One way to do so is to make it known that we are not going to stand for any more destruction to city property; and that we are not going to turn away when damage is being done.

I have only touched on the subject of destruction to our thirteen (13) playgrounds, but the problem also extends to the tremendous amount of damage being done to personal property, such as homes and automobiles. Our local police department, which tries so hard to do a good job, has its hands tied because of the residents "not wanting to get involved".

I am pleading again with you, fellow citizens and taxpayers of the city of Rahway. Help us to continue to give our children a suitable summer recreation program. We can only do so if our facilities are protected by you.

We need your help in this matter which seems to be growing year by year. Only a glowing interest and civic pride on your part will help correct it.

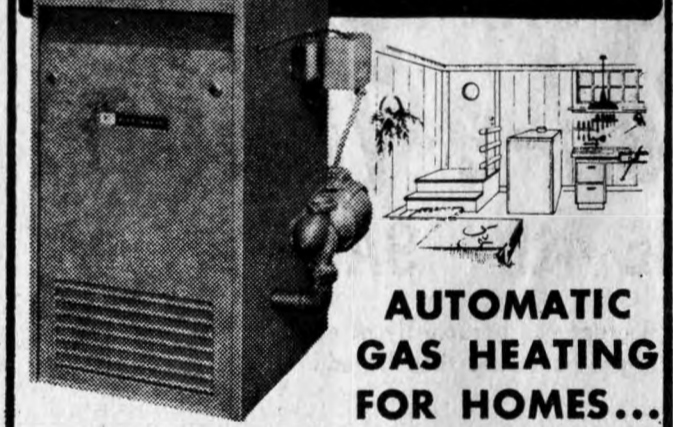

WHAT MY HOMETOWN MEANS TO ME

I live in Rahway, and yet to me it has two faces, both different, both of the same town. It is the place of my birth, the place I know, the place I love. It is, for me, the one place in the world where I can walk

down the street and the trees say hello to me. I know every crack in the sidewalk, and can recall a thousand experiences at every corner. I can remember the woods that now are housing projects, and the dirt streets that aren't dirt any more. I am proud of this town because I am part of it, because it is my town; it is here that I have my friends, and here that I find a place to call home. I suppose almost everyone can say those things about his hometown, but what comes next, the other side is something unique and quite different. A town is reflected in the eyes of her people, and when only ten per cent of those people vote in a school board election, then disinterest finds its way into our second rate educational system. It manifests itself in inept public leadership and fum-

bled projects like the "wall." It is a symptom of a deeper sickness, a cold, stifling, and indifferent apathy that works its way into every area of our life.

This, in large measure, is what my hometown means to me. It is my home and I do love it, but I would be foolish indeed if I confused pride in my city with civic blindness. At any rate, I'm proud to say I'm from Rahway. I want to stay here to work and help my town prosper, and make its future my own.

FEE INCREASED

State Bank To Open New Branch

State Banking and Insurance Commissioner Charles R. Howell has approved the application of the State Bank of Rahway, to establish a branch at 892 St. Georges Ave., Rahway.

This will be the first branch for the Union County Financial Institution, which has assets of about \$16.5 million.

There were no objections to the application, although one bank did claim that present banking facilities in the area were adequate. There are no banking facilities in the projected trade area, which covers one and one-third square miles entirely within Rahway. Estimated population of the trade area is 15,000 persons.

The branch will be operated in leased quarters in a neighborhood shopping center. A walk-up and drive-in window will be provided and ample parking space will be available.

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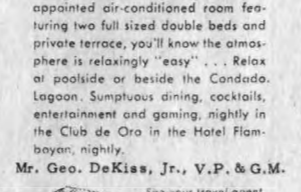
