With Council President Thomas Winter's recent appointment as coordinator of various contracts on the new laundry at Runnell's Hospital - things may liven up on the Clark political scene.

Mr. Winters, who was appointed to the job "for \$200 a week" rather than at a yearly salary, said that he couldn't estimate how long the job would last but possibly "until the end of the year."

When asked about persistent rumors that he'd been given the job to keep his name out of Clark's November election - Mr. Winters denied that this was the reason he'd been appointed. But he also declined to state whether he'd run for office in Clark. Although he said that he had 300 signatures on petitions to run as a Democrat or as an Independent, Mr. Winters said "You're not declared until you've got those petitions through the window."

"You never know", he said, and emphasized that although he'd never said he wouldn't run, he "didn't want to have to answer" for charges brought on the Democrats by the recent conviction of five Clark men.

I'd have to see who the party is running", he said. "You have to be careful" about that, he said, "and I don't believe the party backing is of utmost importance."

The people vote the man, he said.

But he wasn't saying for sure whether they'd be able to vote for him or not.

Dr. Albert Eugene Meder, Jr., Vice Provost and Dean of the University at Rutgers, the State University, will deliver the commencement address to approximately 375 graduating seniors at the Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School, Wednesday evening at 7 p.m.

Dr. Meder will be introduced by Robert E. Hough, principal of Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School. Dr. Meder, a resident of Westfield, received his A.B. from Columbia in 1922; his A.M. from Columbia in 1923; an honorary L.L.D. from Fairleigh Dickinson in 1956; and an honorary L.H.D. from Bloomfield in 1961. He was awarded the Rutgers University medal for distinguished service in 1934.

Dr. Meder came to Rutgers in 1926 as instructor in mathematics. He became assistant professor in 1929, associate professor in 1932 and full professor in 1943.

## Lions Donate Old Glasses

Members of the Clark Lions Club and Auxiliary recently delivered a station wagon load of used eyeglasses, frames, lenses, cases, and jewelry to New Eyes for the Needy of Short Hills, N.J. The Club's project was begun last year with collection boxes placed in the three Clark banks and the Public Library, and came to a climax at the end of May when containers were distributed to all the houses of worship in town.

According to Mrs. Emil Pabst of the Short Hills staff, the delivery was one of the largest received from a single organization. The work of New Eyes, which provides eyeglasses for those who cannot afford them, is entirely dependent upon such collections since no funds are solicited. While conducting a brief tour of the facilities for the Lions group which was headed by William H. Automated **Checks** For **Clark State Bank** 

The Clark State Bank has announced plans to automate its checking account bookkeeping system. Executive Vice President Victor W. Clark said the changeover to accounting by computer would take place this summer. All checks of Clark State customers will be processed on an IBM 1401 computer.

Mr. Clark said that letters explaining the new system are being sent this month to all customers of the bank. He added that the automation of checking account bookkeeping will mean faster service for all customers with regular, convenience and commercial checking accounts.

The system automatically posts checks presented for payment, up-dates account records and produces computer-printed statements for mailing to customers.

Mr. Clark described the new system as "the first step in a dramatic new direction. The conversion to an automated system reflects Clark State Bank's determination to continue providing the latest and best services for its customers."

Residents of Clark Township:

A continuous war on crime is being waged throughout our nation and our Township is no exception. Between you and the criminal element stands a thin Blue Line of men dedicated to the protection of your life and property, Law and Order.

In these times of public indifference and disrespect for Law and Order it is becoming more and more difficult to do our job.

The Police pay is low, the hours are long, the hazards great. It is difficult to attract the high calibre of men we need because of the low pay. Crime in the suburbs has increased; crimes committed against children are greater than ever before. In spite of all these drawbacks the Policemen of Clark continue to serve you on a twenty-four hour a day basis.

Each year our work load increases - yet in the past two years the Patrolmen of your Township have received no substantial salary increase. Therefore, we are asking the residents of Clark to grant us a pay raise on referendum in the November elections.

A petition to put us on referendum was started on June 4 and by next Saturday we hope to have over 3,000 supporters - support which is necessary to obtain the referendum.

We are asking for an \$800 increase over a two year period to raise the top pay for Patrolman from \$7,050 to \$7,850 - \$400 for 1967 and \$400 for 1968 and to adjust all pay grades in between. This will cost the taxpayer less than 3¢ a week.
