And then, out comes the Governor's message on the "achievements of this session of the Legislature". 

Beware Of Beetles - Warning!

The anti-beetle campaign is not being sponsored by irate parents against the English singing Beetles who soon will be returning to America. It is a novel sales promotion twist being used by the Morey LaRue Laundry Company to generate inquiries about the garment storage service available to dry cleaning customers in the firm's 117 sales outlets.

In commenting on Morey LaRue's all-out crusade against the "beetles and their buddies" Mahlon M. Scott, vice president and general manager, commented:

"After being so mercifully exposed to the frantic musical antics of the Beatles and their imitators, we felt that New Jersey mothers would definitely be in a frame of mind to react favorably to any message which urged them to beware of the beetles - and their buddies."

Morey LaRue's anti-beetles storage service advertisements read, in part, as follows:

"We can't offer New Jersey adults any protection against the English singing Beetles and their buddies - except, perhaps, suggesting ear muffs or cotton in the ears. However, we do have the answer for the coming summer invasion by that other kind of beetles - and their buddies. The answer - Morey LaRue's refrigerated storage vaults for your winter household items and garments."

Mr. Scott points out that his firm already has distributed more than 75,000 anti-beetle buttons, badges and bottle caps - mainly to adults.

A spirited exchange of views and opinions on "SCAVENGER SERVICES IN CLARK" marked the discussion sponsored by the Clark Taxpayers Association, Inc. at the recent annual meeting held at Brewer School.

Complaints centered chiefly

The residents expect the scavenger ordinance to be enforced, - and inasmuch as they are subject to penalties for non-compliance, they feel that the scavengers likewise should be obliged to respect the conditions under which they obtained a license to operate in the Township or else have the license suspended or revoked, they said.

Suggestions as to municipal operation or municipal bid contract were received with very little enthusiasm, with specific disadvantages noted for each method, it was reported.

The Clark Taxpayers Association, Inc. prepared a Resolution to be sent to the Mayor and Council embodying the many worthwhile suggestions made at the meeting.

In other business, Wilfred Gillford, 272 Madison Hill Rd., Clark was elected a three-year Trustee.

Terrence Galloway of 400 Madison Hill Road resigned as a Trustee and Secretary. He has declared as a candidate for 1st Ward Councilman in the coming election, and the Association's Constitution and By-Laws do not permit an elected official or a candidate for elective office to serve as a trustee or Officer.
