


Taxpayers Discuss Scavengers





Parents Protest Pupil Transfers At Open Meeting

Vigorous protests against the proposed transfer of students between several elementary schools of the city for the purpose of equalizing class loads, providing space for an additional kindergarten class at Franklin School and to extend the educational opportunities of students at no additional cost to the taxpayers, were expressed by a group of more than seventy-five parents at a meeting scheduled by Superintendent of Schools Richard M. Nash at Roosevelt School Tuesday

Arguments against the proposed transfers included safety of children, the emotional impact of leaving the group which they had adjusted to, long distance for students to walk, and hardships on parents with children who because of physical conditions needed to be closer to home and in a posi-tion to go home for the lunch

The proposed transfers would affect second grade students in Roosevelt or Madison School; third graders at Washington and Grover Cleveland Schools and sixth grade students in Franklin School. Superintendent Nash had made tentative recommendations for the transfers between schools including the removal of a sixth grade from Franklin School to Madison to provide the needed classroom to house an additional kindergarten class.

Several members of the Board of Education sat in on the open meeting and heard the comments of parents. Final disposition of the matter legally falls on the shoulders of the Board who are empowered to assign both personnel and students. It is expected that final action on recommendations of the Superintendent will be taken at the July meeting.


