Interesting sidelight to the "Who will take care of the playgrounds at Memorial Field and Riverside this summer?" discussion last Monday was Council President Winters' constant references to "a girl" who's handled the job at Lupine Way (Memorial Field) last summer and should be employed again this year.

We're sure that the un-named young lady probably did an excellent job last year but the Council President's constant remarks certainly left one wondering why he was so interested in getting her a job.

He even went so far, after Board of Education President Salvesen explained to the Council that the Board had made definite plans for programs and staffs at each playground (see accompanying story) to say - Well, I think they may be able to work her into their program.

Seemed to many like he was more interested in "working her in" than in the children's recreation.

In other Council action, the members voted to allocate fees for another Green Acres program this backed by Councilmen Catalano and Paschenko - after Mayor Maguire reported that Clark had received "tentative" preliminary approval of the applications for state and federal money for Green Acres projects. He wasn't around, however, to answer questions about where the money for survey and land appraisal work would be raised.

In other Council action, after much buck passing - and some complicated maneuvers designed to give each Councilman a chance to "air his views" on raises for policemen without really letting anyone know where he stood - the Council voted to put the question of a \$400 raise for patrolmen in 1967 and another \$400 hike in 1968 on referendum. A proposal to put the salary hike for patrolmen on referendum had been tried at an earlier Council meeting but defeated.

Following residents' questions about how the summer program would work the Council voted to allocate funds to provide recreation at Memorial Field and said that if the Board of Education had planned activities for this area then the resulution could be rescinded.

Board of Education President Robert Salvesen stated during the public portion of the meeting that the Board had definite plans for each area and that staffs had been chosen

At Tuesday evening's Board meeting, Dr. Salvesen announc-ed that letters outlining the specifics of programming and staff for each of the six summer recreation areas had been sent to Mayor William Maguire, the members of the Municipal Council and the Business Administrator.

Under the past operations, the township Recreation committee had supervised the playground on Lupine Way but plans are currently being considered to form a "leasing" agreement whereby the Board of Education would operate the summer programs at all the Playgrounds, leasing those which are owned by the township. Formation of a Commission, outside the Council and the Board, is also under consideration.

However, James R. Powers, Director of Recreation for the Clark Recreation department today announced the schedule for the summer playgrounds. The program will open July 5 and will terminate on August 19. This is the 11

and Lupine Way areas. The staff will consist of teams at at each location.

The grounds in each area will be open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. except at the Abraham Clark center, which will be open from 10'a.m. until 9 p.m., Monday through Fridays.

The planned activities included in the program are: golf, tennis, and archery instruction; football and basketball clinics; softball and basketball leagues for both boys and girls; track and field meets, story telling and rhythmics for the younger children. Many other activities geared to the ages of the children, are planned for the summer.

Instrumental music instruction is offered at the Abraham Clark School and the Frank K. Hehnly School for boys and girls. A new instrumental program for late teenagers and adults will be held at the Abraham Clark School from 7 to 9 p.m. daily.

Recreation for trainable handicapped children will be offered at the Frank K, Hehnly School

School Board Establishes

#### Committee

At a meeting of the Board of Education Tuesday evening, it was reported by Board president Robert Salvesen that a letter had been sent to Mayor William Maguire, members of the Municipal Council and the Business Administrator outlining in detail the specifics of the Board's plans and staff for summer recreation programs at township playgrounds. At that time, the Board voted to adopt a policy provision relating to teacher proposals and grievances. The measure provides for a committee to be established with the superintendent of schools as chairman and three members of the Board of Education, three members of the Teachers' Association, one member from non-certified personnel, and one member of the administrative staff of the township schools completing the committee.

No appointments have yet been made to the committee, said Dr. Karl Kumpf, superintendent of schools, but it is anticipated that the committee will begin operations in the fall. He explained that under the provision passed last night the committee will meet three times a year with the possibility open for calling emergency meetings. Dr. Kumpfnoted that the committee will consider teacher proposals as well as grievances and indicated that they hoped to bring under discussion constructive ideas and suggestions submitted by members of the teaching staff.

In other Board business, Philip Foster, who resigned from his position as Assistant Superintendent for Business Affairs and Board of Education Secretary to become principal of Mildred Terrace School, effective July 1, was thanked by the Board for his work on their behalf.





### "You Only Die Once"

The truth of Abraham Clark's words to the signers of the Declaration of Independence - "You only die once" - was borne out by history.

They were men of means and well educated yet they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well the price they'd pay. What happened to them?

Five signers were captured by the British as traitors and tortured before they died. Twenty had their homes ransacked and burned. Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or the hardship of the war.

Carter Braxton, a wealthy trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British navy. He sold his home to pay his debts and died bankrupt.

Thomas McKean was so hounded by the British ' that he was forced to move his family constantly and to keep in hiding. His possessions were taken and he was reduced to poverty.

British soldiers or vandals looted the properties of William Ellery, George Clymer, Syman Hall, George Walton, Button Gwinnett, Thomas Heyward, Edward Ruttledge and Arthur Middleton.

At the Battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson Jr. noted that the British General Cornwallis had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. Nelson urged General Washington to open fire. The home was destroyed and Nelson died bankrupt.

Francis Lewis had his home and property destroyed. The British jailed his wife and she died within a few months.

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as Patriot. she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and grist mill were destroyed. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home after the war to find his wife dead and his children vanished. A few weeks later he died from exhaustion.
