It doesn't set right to see residents sit in council chambers for hours waiting to ask a question that they want taken care of - and then be told that the problem isn't council's concern - or that council doesn't have the facts.

It might solve a lot of problems all around.

Tolls . . . tolls . . . Can you escape them? If you travel to the shore this summer, go shopping in surrounding communities, or use the Garden State Parkway to get to work - you may find it a lot more expensive now. The Democratic majority in the Assembly voted to permit the location of toll booths along the portion of the Parkway which runs through Union County. This stretch of highway, which was built with federal funds accumulated from the tax dollars residents had already spent, has been toll-free so far. And the surrounding communities have strongly made it known that they'd like it to remain so.

Good luck to the Republican freeholders - Osborne, Tiller and Ulrich - who have announced plans to take legal action to stop the tolls.

It's that time of year again - when the weather is hot and the livin' is not so easy.

We agree with the readers who've called to complain about the unsightly mess caused by air conditioners on stores and other places of business when the excess water drips on sidewalks, runs along the street and attracts candy wrappers, papers, and other litter.

Hyatt To Expand Plant In Clark

Additional manufacturing space of 222,300 square feet at the Clark plant of New Departure-Hyatt Bearings Division. General Motors Corporation, is expected to be ready for oc-cupancy during the early Fall of next year, Warren E. Milner, general manager of the ball and roller bearing manu-

facturing firm, said this week.

Mr. Milner told a luncheon
group of Clark Township officials, headed by Mayor William J. Maguire, that work on
the addition was started last
week and that Marcello Mezzullo, Inc., of Portchester, N.Y. is the general contractor.

Upon completion of the project, some of the roller bearing operations, now being performed at the company's Harrison plant, will be transferred to Clark, Mr. Milner said. Eventually, all of the current Harrison operations will be phased out, as was explained at the time General Motors announced the consolidation of Hvatt Bearings and New Departure Divisions last year.

New Departure-Hyatt manufacturing plants are also located in Connecticut and Sandusky, Ohio. Its divisional headquarters are at Sandusky.

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
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Fishing Derby Attracts 250 To Milton Lake

trivalent vaccine at 6 to 8 week intervals." "A single dose of trivalent vaccine is recommended on en-

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
