The new library's ready - and will officially re-open Monday although lots of Clark residents seem to have gotten a peek at the new facilities from the many favorable comments we've heard.

Although definite dedication ceremony details have not been formally announced yet, many Clark residents will want to take the time to stop in this week to get a tour of the newest township landmark.

In its new home at 303 Westfield Avenue, the library will resume summer hours - that's daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday thru Friday . . . 7 to 9 p.m. Monday and Thursday evenings . . . and closed all day Saturday.

And now's the time to return those overdue books - the library's grand opening gift to residents will be a no-fine period for the first two weeks.

Do come.

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Although the motion to put the Clark patrolmen's request for a \$400 raise in 1967 and another in 1968 was passed at the last meeting, Council Monday evening voted on the move to grant the patrolmen a \$500 raise effective December 1. With many members of the PBA forming a vanguard in the front of the council chambers, Council split its vote evenly down the middle to defeat the measure. Councilmen Winters, Hill and Paschenko, all Democrats, voted for the measure while Republican councilmen Getchis, Johnson and Yarusavage voted against it claiming that the matter had been presented to Council in an improper manner and that Council had just authorized a \$2,500 study of salaries for all township employees, so the policemen should be considered in this study.

PBA state delegate Al Yerseovich reports that "with our backs to the wall now" the policemen will seek to gain support for their raise referendum throughout the township between now and November. He said that the patrolmen have gathered more than 2,000 signatures in support of their request and that a representative will address any Clark organization to discuss the salary request and answer questions.

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It's no wonder many township residents expressed their disgust with the childish antics they have to endure at Municipal Council meetings. Personal disputes between council members and departmental directors force the public to listen to wise cracks and side comments for almost four hours while areas of public concern are shoved aside for petty partisan politics . . . the Mayor and the Council President snicker and grimace at each other in what could hardly be considered conduct befitting the two highest positions of public trust among our elective officers . . . public requests for information or assistance are tossed aside with pointed comments about that being somebody else's job - and somebody else is almost never at the Municipal Council meeting.

It is a shame to be shared by all the residents of Clark that our Municipal Council meetings have sunk to the level they now maintain. America's proudest heritage is steeped in our traditions of the "town meeting" - where government was only as big as the interest and the concern and the dignity of the individuals of the community - and where the voice of the people spoke with responsibility and was answered with integrity.

Only when the people of Clark begin to care about the future they are molding here will they begin to get the answers they seek and the information which is rightfully theirs - rather than lengthy partisan descriptions of motions which assign street names

## Suba Enters Fourth Ward Council Race

Into what is already a slightly crowded political ring, another Democratic hat was tossed this week for the Fourth Ward Councilman-at-large seat. John A. Suba of 94 Liberty Street has announced his candidacy for the post in the forthcoming primary.

In his statement, issued today, Mr. Suba said that he "acknowledges that the primary contest will be a hard fought campaign, but very healthy politically. The democrats have the opportunity to pick the right man for the position." Mr. Suba "challenges the people of Clark not to abuse their political freedom by not voting, but to use it, because the choice is theirs as to the one who will represent them in November."

Therefore, one of the highlights of the campaign, Mr. Suba said, will be to stress to the voters the importance of getting out and voting in the primary, both democrat and republican alike, and especially the independent who does not vote any but the general election. "The independent must share in the responsibility of choosing a candidate. With this mandate by the people, it will bring to the council an esprit de corps and a COOPERATIVE by-partisan type of administration that the people WANT AND ARE ENTITLED TO, BUT which has been lacking on the part of some councilmen, whose only concern has been promoting themselves, rather than the welfare of the community," Mr. Suba said.

"New tax rates are needed to meet the steadily increasing costs of our city government," and he feels this can be done without imposing the burden of additional taxes on the home owner. He also endorses the salary increase for the policemen that must be put to the people in the form of a referendum, and "admonishes everybody not to forget other city employees who justly de-

serve a fair and equitable salary increase."

Mr. Suba is employed as sales manager for the Elizabeth Industrial Supply Co. of Perth Amboy. He is a veteran of World War II, has been active in fraternal organizations; is past master of Washington Lodge #33 F & AM; is past president of Zion Lutheran Church of Newark, which is currently engaged in a building program to erect a new church on Raritan Road in Clark, and is a member of the executive building committee and plans and construction committee of the church. He is a member of the Elizabeth Rotary Club, and has been a board member of Local Board #43, Selective Service, for the past five years.

Mr. Suba is married and father of three daughters. He stated that he feels he must involve himself in the growth of his community, and as an active businessman feels he can bring to the governing body a good sound business sense and years of experience and exposure to various endeavors of responsibility.

## Clark Republicans Reveal United Slate For Posts Of Four Ward Councilmen

"Four Good Guys" - all wearing white hats, of course - galloped into Clark's political ring today to wrest control of the Township Council from the Democrats in the November 8th election.

Mayor William J. Maguire announced today that two newcomers, Edward Lystash and James Flood, will be the Republican designees in the Third and Fourth Wards, joining incumbents Robert M. Johnson of the Second Ward and Edward P. Getchis of the First Ward on a Republican ticket that "will wage an all-out battle to swing the Council into the Republican column."

"Because of the actions of certain former Democratic members of the governing body, Clark has undeservedly been given 'a bad name'," Mayor Maguire said in announcing the ticket. "None of us are in the position of having to clean up Clark's bad name, because none of us has ever brought shame

to this community. But we are going to win this election so that the people of Clark will have honest and efficient government and rid the community of the politically-ridden circus that has passed for government here under Democratic control.

"We are convinced that these four Council candidates will be elected in November, based not only upon the widespread support that has been voiced by Republicans, but by the unbelievable numbers of Democrats and independent votes who have taken the trouble to call me directly to pledge me their support for the Republican ticket," the mayor stated.

Mr. Lystash, who is 43, lives with his wife and their two children at #2 Maple Street; is a U. S. Navy veteran and is employed by the Union County Department of Public Works.

The new councilmanic candidate, a native of Elizabeth, has been a resident of Clark

for 14 years. After his discharge from the Navy after World War II, he was employed as a tool and die maker at General Motors' Linden Plant. In 1949 he transferred to the Esso refinery in Linden as a pipefitter, remaining there until he was engaged as a foreman by the Schoonover Company, Inc., of Mountainside, electrical contractors. He joined the County Public Works Department in 1962.

He holds membership in Civil Service Council No. 8, the Clark Republican Club, the New Jersey Association for Retarded Children, the Holy Name Society of St. John's Church, of which he and his family are communicants, and served as a member of the building campaign committee of the Catholic Archdiocese of Newark.

Mr. Lystash is a former president of the Oakwood Manor Civic Association and a former treasurer of the El-Li Athletic Club of Linden.

Mr. Flood, who is 29, is State Vice-President of the New Jersey Jaycees; was president of the Clark unit last year and is a member of the Clark Shade Tree Commission, and Mrs. Flood have six children. They make their home at 75 Liberty Street. An electronic engineer, he is a department head for Weston Instruments Inc. of Newark.

Mr. Flood is a parishioner of St. John's Church. He is a director of the Rahway-Clark chapter of the American Red Cross and a member of the Clark Central Civic Council. He served as a member of the Citizen's Budget Review Committee earlier this year. He is a member of the United States Jaycees and also holds membership in the Junior Chamber International.

"Both of these men, long-time Clark residents devoted to their community, will make valuable additions to the Republican representation on Council, complementing the three veterans, Ed Getchis, Bob Johnson and Councilman-at-large Bernard Yarusavage," Mayor Maguire said. "More than that, they will make ideal councilmen in that they will represent Clark as a whole and not be the instruments of the special interest groups and the political cabal that has produced nothing but discredit, obstructionism and delay to the forward-looking program the Republican Party has attempted to inaugurate for Clark's betterment," he added.

Councilman Getchis, who is completing his first term on Council, is president of the Clark Lumber and Supply Co.,

and of the Clark Enterprises, Inc., a building firm. He and Mrs. Getchis and their three sons make their home at 43 Lefferts Lane.

A former president and treasurer of the Southwest Civic Association, he continues his interest in that organization, serving as a member of its executive board and chairman of its committee on the Township Committee. He was a member of the Clark Planning Board's Advisory Committee and is a charter member and treasurer of the Clark Elks Lodge. He also holds membership in the Clark Kiwanis Club.

Councilman Johnson, who saw service with the U. S. Air Force in the South Pacific during World War II, lives with Mrs. Johnson and their son, Dana, 19, at 131 Walnut Avenue. A second son, Robert, Jr., 23, is a patient at Valley Forge Army Hospital, recovering from injuries sustained while a member of the American Occupation Forces in Germany. The Johnson's daughter, Rita, is married to Police Sergeant Donald Ficke. The Ficke's have two daughters.

Mr. Johnson is also completing his first term as a member of Council. He is treasurer of the Clark Kiwanis Club, a past president of the Clark Republican Club, a charter member of the Clark Elks and a former director of the Clark-Rahway Red Cross Chapter. He served last year as chairman of Council's recreation committee.


The Second Ward Councilman is international sales manager for the American Host & Derrick Company.

"The re-election of Councilmen Getchis and Johnson and the election of Mr. Lystash and Mr. Flood are vital to Clark's future," Mayor Maguire said. "As Mayor and as the leader of the Republican Party I am looking for men on Council of their stature, I am looking for men who can reason through a problem on its merits and not have their decision blighted by the cheap political thinking that has permeated Council as it has been constituted. I am looking for a co-operative Council, not a rubber stamp Council - and these four men - plus Councilman Yarusavage - are anything but rubber stamps.

"Council, as constituted in the immediate past, has been an impediment. I think it apparent to everyone that it is high time to change the formula - and elect the 'Four Good Guys', the Mayor concluded.

## Galloway Pledges Meetings With Residents Of Ward

Pledging that if elected he would hold regular meetings with the residents of the First Ward to discuss mutual problems and suggestions for the ward, the only declared Democratic Council candidate in the First Ward today questioned the "representation" the residents of that Ward are receiving.



"Debatable ratables" are no substitute in the 1st Ward for the loss of the natural beauty, quiet, and spaciousness that attracted homeowners to Clark. How is the loss figured in assessment of a home in a residential area devalued by the intrusion of industry?" asked declared First Ward Democratic council candidate Terrence Galloway today.

"The 1st Ward desperately needs someone on Council who will TRULY REPRESENT THE PEOPLE, who will consider their oft-repeated wishes, who will keep them advised of matters under discussion before the point of no-return decision has been reached," Mr. Galloway said.

"The recently-adopted metes and bounds description implementing the zoning ordinance shows that no buffer zone has been left between industry and R-150 homes in the Featherbed Lane-Old Raritan Road area. Are those homeowners being informed as to plans for truck routes through Clark to accommodate industrial builders in Scotch Plains?"

"Are the homeowners on Raritan Road and Thomas Drive aware that an error in the metes and bounds description could conceivably in the near future result in the extension of the commercial zone up to the Oak

## Clark Bank Announces Earnings

The net operating earnings of the Clark State Bank for the six months ending June 30, 1966, increased by 82 per cent over the comparable period in 1965, Executive Vice President Victor W. Clark announced today. Mr. Clark said net operating earnings were \$58,364.97 or 51 cents per share, compared to \$31,583.30 or 28 cents per share during the first half of 1965.

Deposits increased to \$13,578,420.06 from \$11,914,463.51 in June, 1965. Total resources rose to \$16,177,688.95 from the \$14,306,310.62 reported in the first half of last year. Loans and mortgages went up to \$10,370,177.44 from \$8,508,002.98 in the first six months of 1965.

Clark also pointed out that the Clark State Bank made preparations in the first half of 1966 to automate its checking account bookkeeping operations. He said the changeover will take effect with the August statements.

The bank executive also said the "climate for continued growth has never been better. Clark State Bank is favorably situated in a flourishing area of great growth potential and that all signs pointed toward significant gains in all facets of banking during the remaining months of 1966 and beyond."





**Water Trees,  
 During Drought  
 Cass Urges**

All trees in the township must be watered regularly to save them against the prolonged drought, C. Wyllys Cass, chairman of the Clark Shade Tree Commission urged today.

He noted that trees should be watered "to a depth of 18 inches once a week." However, if this can't be done, Mr. Cass declared, "my appeal is that residents give trees a couple of buckets of water a week."

Mr. Cass pointed out that "The watering will have to continue until there is sufficient rainfall." This applies to both trees planted by the commission near residents' homes and those planted by the residents, themselves.

Discussing the seriousness of the drought and its dire effect on trees in Clark, Mr. Cass stated that "Due to the prolonged drought this year -- an extension of the drought that has been with us during the past five years -- a toll is being taken of township trees.

"Not merely trees that were planted last spring, but trees that have been growing for the past two or three years are beginning to succumb to the drought conditions.

"Leaves of trees are shriveling up. Some trees are showing signs of sun-scald -- noticeable by the edges of leaves turning brown.

"Some of our Norway Maples are being affected by sun-scald, our Linden trees are showing signs of wilting and some Hawthorne trees have died," the chairman stated.
