The Township now has a possible 1071 apartment units, if all applications are granted by the Council and the Courts, he said.

Anthony W. Belluscio, candidate for Freeholder in Union County as a Liberal Democrat, announced today that he would have Jack E. Wiley and Joseph Jacob as his campaign co-managers. The announcement of his co-managers was met with much enthusiasm by the members of the Belluscio campaign committee.

Mr. Belluscio is a resident of Clark Township and presently serves this municipality as its Director of Public Works and Engineering.

Jack E. Wiley is a resident of Plainfield, New Jersey where he resides at 1231 Cameron Avenue with his wife, the former Virginia Hester, and his four children - Jack Jr., 7, Rhonda Michele, 6, Randy, 3, and Jennifer, 2. Mrs. Hejselbak Seeking 4th Ward Council Post

Mrs. Sophie K. Hejselbak of 62 Harding Avenue, Clark, is seeking the Fourth Ward Council seat formerly held by her husband.

A lifelong resident of Clark, Mrs. Hejselbak was educated in the Clark elementary schools, she also graduated from Linden High School where Clark students attended classes until the Regional program was instituted.

After graduating from High School she was employed as a Secretary in the Cranford Municipal Building by the Union County Health Unit #2, which included Clark. This tour of duty was followed by experience in the Personnel Office of Lawrence Engineering Corporation, Linden. She also was employed as bookkeeper at Hyatt Bearings and Robinson's Hardware in Rahway.

In addition to extensive community service including membership in the Clark Volunteer Emergency Squad, Mrs. Hejselbak served five years on the Clark Board of Health when it was organized. It has since disbanded.

During her five years in the Municipal Building she was secretary for three years on the Council Legislative Committee, one year as secretary on the Safety Committee and one year as secretary on the Council Investigating Committee. At present she is secretary to the Clark Youth Employment Service.

A member of the Clark Democratic Club for 27 years, she served as secretary for 10 years, treasurer 5 years and vice president one year and was County Committeewoman for 10 years. At present she serves as secretary of the Clark Democratic County Committee.



She is also a member of the Fourth Ward Democratic Club. Mrs. Hejselbak has been a member of the Clark Fire Auxiliary for many years, American Legion Auxiliary, John L. Ruddy Post Auxiliary and a member of the newly organized Clark Elks Auxiliary of which she is a charter member. She is a member of the N. J. Suba Seeks Democratic 4th Ward Nomination

Albert Sutter, Jr., 48 Liberty Street and Rolf R. Backhaus, 91 Liberty Street, have been appointed co-campaign managers for John A. Suba, candidate for the 4th Ward Democratic seat.

In a statement issued last night they said that the primary contest in the fourth ward is taking shape. Mr. Roy F. Neary instead of exerting himself and using his talents for the best interest of all the Democrats has let the organization support one candidate over the others, in what was to have been an open primary. Councilmen Catalano and Paschenko are supporting a candidate. "Our candidate, Mr. Suba, will have the best support of all - the people", Mr. Suba has challenged each citizen to get out and vote primary, making the choice and decision theirs.

Mr. Suba said that one of the Democrats in a recent news release commented that there is a certain amount of apathy by the public in the coming election. But Mr. Suba says, "This is not so, the citizens are definitely interested in who will represent them on the council, and will make their feelings known at the polls in September." Mr. Suba added, that just because the Republicans in announcing their slate for the primary labeled their candidates "The Good Guys", are they by inference trying to label the Democrats anything but good? Terrence Galloway, Democratic Candidate for First Ward Councilman in Clark, took the township to task this week, charging officials with responsibility in the mail delivery dilemma which has existed for many months. In a prepared statement released to the "Patriot", Mr. Galloway said: "The U. S. Mail is rightly proud of its record of service, but its slogan, 'through rain... snow... sleet...' gets a jolt when faced with the roads in new developments in Clark." "State statutes, the Planning and Enabling Act, local legislation, - all give the Mayor, the Planning Board, and the Council limitless control to see that developers do not create unnecessary problems for the Township or new residents."

"Complaints about roadway conditions in new developments are not new to Town Hall, - rock-size 'gravel', holes, etc. - all have caused sufficient aggravation and hazards to send residents asking for relief." "Until a short time ago, it was 'impossible' to get street lighting in unfinished developments, - but a few determined residents with their attorneys convinced the governing body that it WAS possible, and new developments now have street lighting."

"The Township has the authority, and it is its obligation, to stipulate in its agreements with builders the extent of road construction which will satisfy the Township before any building permits are issued. Why is the Township so easily satisfied? Before looking for help outside Clark, can not the Mayor take a closer look at the agreements he has been approving on the Planning Board for so many years, and eliminate at the source the cause of so many complaints?"

"The Mayor was much concerned about good roads and ratables when he justified the construction - at county expense - of two bridges to open up development in this same area. Where are the good roads? And ratables also bring with them a built-in Township obligation to provide protection, service, consideration, safety. A certificate of occupancy is soon followed by a municipal tax bill for a resident's share of services he often does not get for some time."

"Wake up in Town Hall! Toughen up those agreements! Consider the homeowner for a change! Remember he is the ratable!"

Rutgers Extension Division To Handle A Doubled Enrollment

A completely reorganized Rutgers University Extension Division to handle a doubled enrollment and new areas of community service will become effective immediately, Dr. Ernest E. McMahon, dean of the Extension Division, announced today.

The reorganization affects 50,000 Rutgers Extension students, and in the next two or three years 100,000 adults annually will benefit from services now possible under the newly structured Extension Division, according to Dean McMahon.

The reorganization resulted in part from the establishment of the Bureau of Community Services on April 9, 1965 by the University's Board of Governors "to permit the University more easily and effectively to move into the larger areas of community service."

Dean McMahon was assisted in the Extension Division's reorganization study by William Wachts, management consultant of New York City and a member of the Division's coadjutant staff.

Two major changes are being effected in the streamlining, according to Dr. McMahon. The first will be a departmentalization of services to eliminate any overlapping that may have developed since the beginning of the Extension Division in 1925, and the second will be a new emphasis upon the development of a corps of Extension specialists to work in co-operation with Rutgers' col-

leges, schools, and departments to meet better the rapidly changing educational needs of New Jersey's adults.

Under the reorganization, the Extension Division will consist of three Bureaus - the Bureau of Instruction and Research, the Bureau of Community Services, which was set up in April, 1965, and the Bureau of Administration.

The Extension Centers in Camden, Newark, New Brunswick, and Paterson also are being reorganized to extend their services beyond local areas to regions of the State. The Northern Regional Office will be located on the Newark campus with a branch office in Paterson.

READING EQUIPMENT SPEEDS OPERATION

Equipment that can read and write at the rate of over 650 lines a minute began operation at social security headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland, this week, Ralph W. Jones, social security district manager, said today. The new system, built by IBM will be used to read the quarterly reports of employees earnings made by the Nation's 3-1/2 million industrial employers and to write the information directly on magnetic tape for processing by the Social Security Administration's computers. It is expected to result in annual cash savings of more than \$750,000 a year, Jones said.


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planted last spring, but trees that have been growing for the past two or three years are beginning to succumb to the drought conditions.

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

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

An important notice from the Y.M.C.A.'s in the Central Atlantic Area was sent out this week regarding the coming indoor swimming and diving season. Toni Borton, C.A.A. Swimming and Diving Commissioner, has announced the following rules change in the Swimming and Diving program which, effective immediately, prohibits all varsity swimmers or divers who compete for a secondary school system from competing in the C.A.A. Swimming and Diving championships.

The rule change was introduced by the rules committee and presented to the C.A.A. Committee for ratification in May of this year. Inasmuch as the rule change limits participation, the committee was concerned as to the necessity of such a rule and just what purpose it would serve. Since the inception of the N.J.S.I.A.A. ruling (which prohibits members from participating for another club during the high school season) the Y.M.C.A. has been concerned as to what purpose it was serving in letting boys swim in the C.A.A.'s who, during the season, cannot swim for the "Y". Further, the "Y" was concerned about boys who were competing all year for the "Y" and then at the end of the season were not able to compete due to the varsity high school swimmers being brought in. The caliber of the competition was just too high for these youngsters to compete. The problem seemed quite simple on the surface -- drop the N.J.S.I.A.A. from competing at the end of the season. This then presented another problem, that of the "Independent School System" which permits swimmers to compete all year round without restrictions. In order to make the level of competition equal so that all can compete on the same basis, the Y.M.C.A. is forced into the present legislation. The "Y" will now only serve those boys in the 15-17 age group who are not being served by a varsity school team.

We agree with the Y.M.C.A.'s in this ruling, and hope that some day the N.J.S.I.A.A. will set down and draw up plans for the interest of the athletes and not themselves.
