Clark Patriot Recounts Story Behind Its Name

We felt that in the first anniversary edition of the "Clark Patriot" many of our readers might enjoy knowing some of the work and thought that went into creating a hometown newspaper for Clark. The following article, which appeared in the first issues of the paper, was written by the Associate Publisher, David M. Collins, Jr. We reprint it below to acquaint our new subscribers with the "birth of a newspaper" and to remind those who were with us in the beginning of the pride we shared in its *inception.*

By David M. Collins, Jr. The birth of a newspaper is not unlike the birth of a baby. It enters this world not knowing a soul - and is itself un-known. Its birth represents a great deal of labor and pain but to those intimately associated with the new arrival it is loved before it is born. Its family faces the similar problem of shaping the newborn into a healthy, happy and responsible member of society. There is, however, one important difference. Unlike a baby, a paper must be named BEFORE it is born.

This task is made doubly difficult by the very nature of a newspaper. A paper never narrows the choice of a name by arbitrarily becoming one sex or another. Nor does it have a rich relative after whom it can be named. A paper can be provided with a name based solely on the hopes and aspirations of those who participate in its birth. During our search for a name guidelines soon appeared with the result that some names eliminated themselves. Among those were the names of neigh-

During the first two weeks of the re-opening of the Clark Public Library, crowds of adults and children came in droves to return books, to take out new ones and to pick up and to apply for new library cards, it was reported today. The five-week shutdown made the library's borrowers hungry for library service. The number of books borrowed during the first two weeks of the re-opening showed how hungry they were.

During the first week, 2,200 borrowers took out 2,850 books; during the second week 1,570 borrowers took out 1,945 books. Adults took out as many books as children.

At the beginning of the third week, the trend is still continuing. Over 1,000 books were loaned for home use on Monday, August 15, alone. Normal weekly circulation at this time of the year is around 1,000 a week. The use made of the library during the first two weeks showed how important the library has become in the daily lives of people of the township. Now that the library has

reached its first plateau, the Library Board and the library staff can plan for increased services when the funds and additional personnel permit.
