Clark Lions To Sponsor Essay Contest

The youth of Clark have been given a challenge to develop a plan for world peace by their local Lions Club--a challenge that could earn one of them a \$25,000 education and/or career assistance grant.

The Clark Lions Club, together with Lions Clubs throughout the world, is sponsoring a world-wide essay contest for the world's youth on the most important world subject today--Peace. The contest offers \$60,000 in total awards, including the \$25,000 first prize, eight semi-final world regional awards of \$1,000 each and travel expenses for the eight winners to Chicago, Illinois in July, 1967. At that time, the first prize winner will be chosen from the eight. Also more than 20,000 local, district and state awards will be made.

"We are hopeful one of our young people will win this world-wide prestige award," President Wenzel Dousa of the Clark Lions Club said in announcing the contest locally today.

The contest is open to young people who will be 14 but less than 22 years of age as of January 15, 1967.

"Our Club's winner will advance to Lions District 16E competition in his (her) effort to qualify for the State contest," Mr. Dousa said.

Contestants should submit their entry in essay form, not to exceed 5,000 words.

"Judging will fall into four categories: 75 per cent of the essay's points will be devoted to content, ten per cent to organization, ten per cent to style and five per cent to mechanics," Mr. Dousa said.

It is hoped local young people will accept the challenge and enter the club's section of the contest. Closing date for the club's contest is December 10, 1966.

Students wishing to enter the contest should contact Mr. Dousa, 59 Brant Avenue, Clark, 381-2897 or any member of the Clark Lions Club.

With primary contests for Councilman in two wards, Dr. Joseph P. Cillo emerged as the winner in the Democratic race in the first ward and Thomas A. Kaczmarek was the winner in a three-way in the fourth ward. The four Republican candidates for Council were unopposed.

On the state scene, Clark voters chose to cast 297 Republican votes for United States Senator Clifford P. Case and 652 votes for top-running Warren Wilentz on the Democratic ticket. In other races for the Senate seat, Clarence Coggins rated 62 votes, Jerry C. Burmeister received 16 votes; John J. Winberry got 39 votes and David Frost got 91 ballots.

Congresswoman Florence P. Dwyer received 366 Republican votes while her Democratic opponent Robert F. Allen, scored 654 votes.

Clark's hometown freeholder candidate, Anthony W. Beluscio, won 289 Democratic votes from Clark voters. The other freeholder candidates, on the Democratic slate, received John F. Cirelli, 561; Harold C. Hoffman, 585; Richard W. Kochanski, 608; George B. Liddy, 96; Anthony E. Conte, 152; and John F. Blewett, 121.

In the race for the Republican spots, with all three unopposed, Walter E. Ulrich received 370; Harry V. Osborne, 367; Edward H. Tiller, 369.

In the Democratic Council race: First Ward, Joseph P. Cillo, totaled 161 and received; first district--49, second district--60, third district--52; First Ward, Terrence Galloway, totaled 118 and received: first district--34, second district--34, third district--50.

HUNTING REGULATIONS

Loring Banfield, Clark Director of the Union County Regional Adult School advises that the last registration date for the Fall Semester will be September 19, from 7:30 to 9 p.m. at the Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School in Clark.

Mr. Banfield stated that the 57 courses currently offered

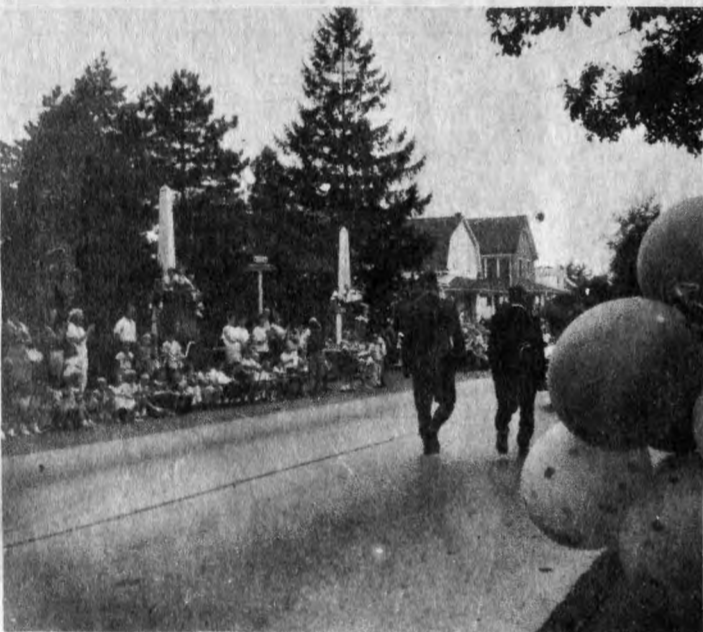
Waterfowl and snipe hunting regulations for New Jersey were adopted today by the State Fish and Game Council of the Department of Conservation and Economic Development.

The council followed the recommendations of the State Bureau of Wildlife Management within the framework set by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. A split duck season totaling 50 days, a straight 70-day season on geese and brant and a straight 50-day Wilson's snipe season were chosen. A special sea duck season in the Atlantic Ocean from September 26 through January 10 was also adopted.

The first portion of the duck season will open October 22 and run through October 29. Duck hunting will re-open on November 22 and run through January 2.



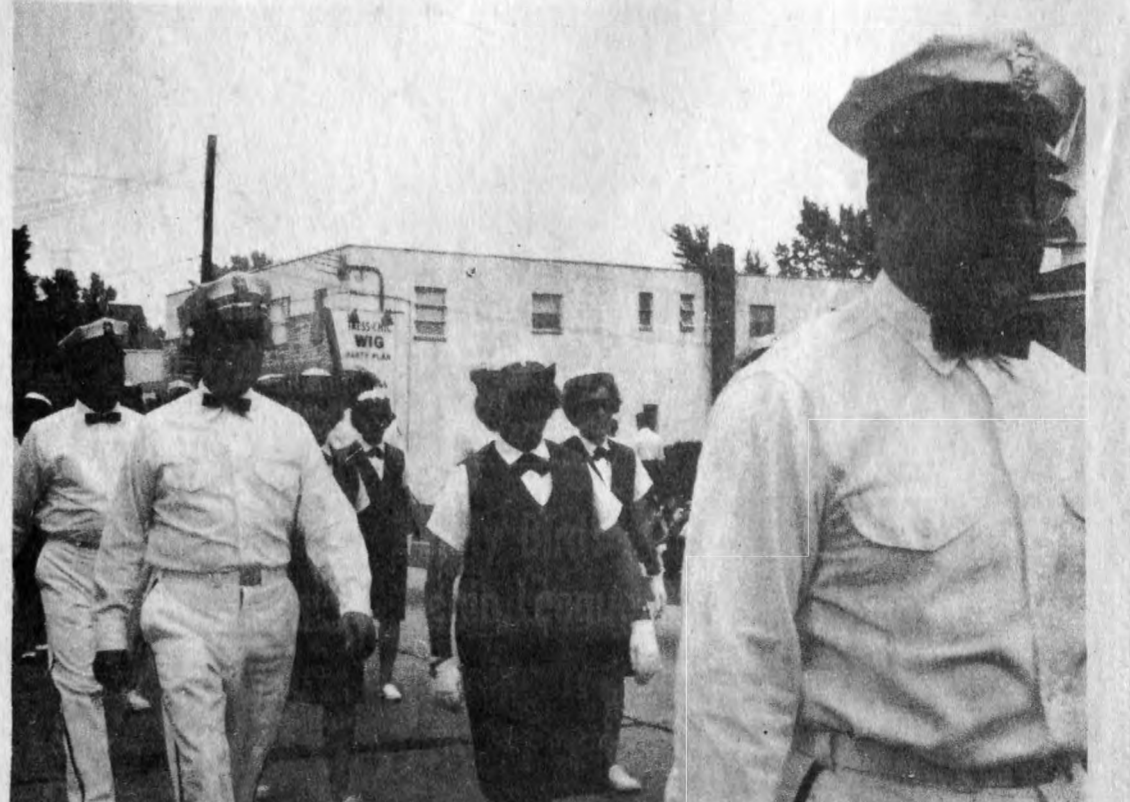

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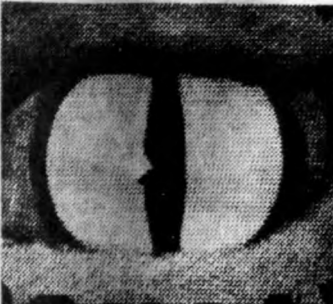

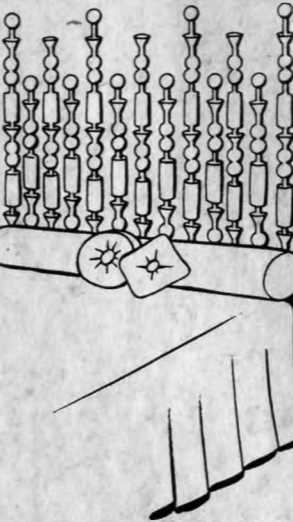

At 56, he is tanned and fit, handsome and greying, and has retained just a trace of a European accent which lends his conversation an interesting "continental" quality.

Mr. Petro was born in Hungary. His father was taken prisoner by the Russians in 1915 during World War I. So when young Zolton was about ten, his mother made plans to come to this country with her two sons to make her home with relatives here.

"When one day in 1920 my brother and I were playing in the yard when a man with whiskers walked up," Mr. Petro tells. "We ran to get our mother who ran up to the man, hugged and kissed him and said, 'Children, this is your father.'"

The mother and sons went ahead with their plans to come to this country and arrived here in 1921 when Zolton was 11. Their father joined them six months later. The change of a new life in Rahway where they settled, was not easy for the family. The language barrier, the economic adjustment and "a bit of abuse from kids our age" were the

hardest parts, Mr. Petro remembers. Although he is reluctant to discuss it, Mrs. Petro says the Petro family is a titled one in Hungary.

Zolton met his wife in Rahway at the hospital during a visit to his mother. The future Mrs. Petro was a nurse. "The first words she said to me were, 'Off the bed! Off the bed! Visitors are not allowed to sit on patients' beds!'" he says.

Working, becoming more proficient in his trade, and studying, Mr. Petro stayed in Rahway until 1951 when he joined Keller Aluminum at the Miami plant. He assisted in the opening of four other Keller plants throughout the United States and came to the Waynesboro plant in 1959.

Rahway, N. J., Miami, Fla., and Waynesboro, Ga., are a long way from Hungary, and the Petros would like to return for a visit one day. "I have a picture of my hometown in my mind and I remember certain things about the schools and the people there, I'd like to go back someday to see how accurate my mind picture is," Mr. Petro says.

"But, for right now, I like Waynesboro, I'm enjoying my rest, and they say there are fish in that lake," he said with a grin at his wife and a stretch in his easy chair.

through Thursdays, 9 A.M. to 9 P.M. and Fridays, 9 A.M. to 6 P.M. Since the Arts Center is interested in encouraging an appreciation of art, and stressing its educational value rather than any competitive aspect, it has adopted a policy of eliminating judges and prizes at its exhibits for members. The Trailside Museum Arts Center, which is dedicated to the encouragement of realistic art, is now one of the largest art groups in the area. Started in January of this year, it already boasts 296 members, representing all but two towns in Union County, as well as many other areas. Summer outdoor classes, held at the Deserted Village, drew a record enrollment of 223 students, filling all classes to capacity. One of the historic buildings, loaned to the Arts Center by the Union County Park Commission, enabled classes to meet "rain or shine". 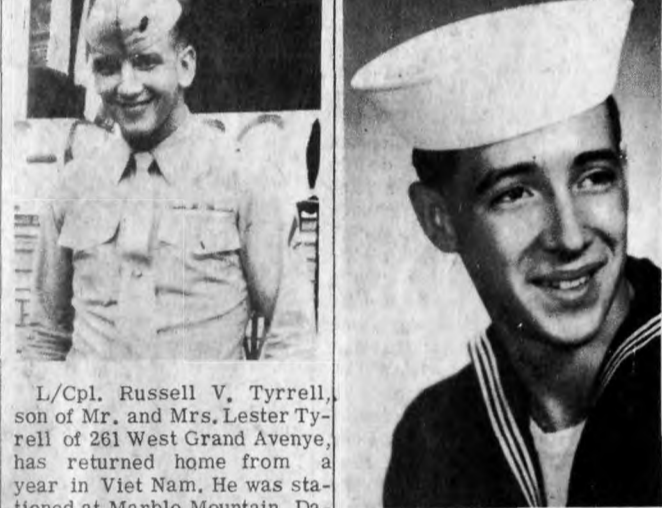
