

Clark Lions To Sponsor Essay Contest

The youth of Clark have been given a challenge to develop a plan for world peace by their local Lions Club--a challenge that could earn one of them a \$25,000 education and/or career assistance grant.

The Clark Lions Club, together with Lions Clubs throughout the world, is sponsoring a world-wide essay contest for the world's youth on the most important world subject today-Peace. The contest offers \$50,000 in total awards, includthe \$25,000 first prize, eight semi-final world regional awards of \$1,000 each and travel expenses for the eight winners to Chicago, Illinois in July, 1967. At that time, the first prize winner will be chosen from the eight. Also more than 20,000 local, district and state

awards will be made. "We are hopeful one of our young people will win this world-wide prestige award," President Wenzel Dousa of the Clark Lions Club said in announcing the contest locally today.

The contest is open to young people who will be 14 but less than 22 years of age as of January 15, 1967.

"Our Club's winner will advance to Lions District 16E competition in his (her) effort to qualify for the State contest," Mr. Dousa said.

Contestants should submit their entry in essay form, not to exceed 5,000 words.

"Judging will fall into four categories: 75 per cent of the essay's points will be devoted to content, ten per cent to organization, ten per cent to style and five per cent to mechanics," Mr. Dousa said.

It is hoped local young people will accept the challenge and enter the club's section of the contest. Closing date for the club's contest is December 10,

HUNTING REGULATIONS

Waterfowl and snipe hunting regulations for New Jersey were adopted today by the State Fish and Game Council of the Department of Conservation and Economic Development.

The council followed the recommendations of the State Bureau of Wildlife Management within the framework set by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. A split duck season totaling 50 days, a straight 70-day season on geese and brant and a straight 50-day Wilson's snipe season were chosen. A special sea duck season in the Atlantic Ocean from September 26 through January 10 was also adopted.

The first portion of the duck season will open October 22 and run through October 29. Duck hunting will re-open on November 22 and run through January 2.

Another of the Country's Constitutional Officers is the Surrogate is Judge of the Surrogate's Court, Clerk of the Surrogate's Court and Clerk of the Union County Court, Probate Division.

As Judge of the Surrogate's Court, he or she is responsible under the law, for admitting wills to probate, granting Letters of Guardianship for minors and issuing Letters of Testamentary Trusteeship to trustees named in wills.

The Surrogate issues certificates for the transfer of checking accounts, savings accounts, building and loan shares and credit union deposits.

Where estates of decedents do not exceed \$2,500, under the statutes affidavits may be executed before the Surrogate by a surviving spouse or next of kin. Where minors' estates do not exceed \$100 in realty and \$1000 in personalty, a parent, upon the execution of a consent by the other parent, may obtain and affidavit instead of a Letter of

Guardianship. As Clerk of the Union County Court, Probate Division, the Surrogate audits accounts of fiduciaries, prepares calendars for the Court and appears in Court every Friday, reviews complaints and petitions before filing, files complaints foradoptions and files and records documents in connection with the County Court proceedings. A docket number is assigned to each estate and indexes and dockets are kept up to date for the benefit of attorneys, title

Section 16. Civil Service.

16-1. All permanent full-time and part-time employees are covered by Civil Service, a privilege extended by the people of the Township of Clark by referendum, and, without question, the greatest measure of security afforded the employee. Civil Service prevents demotion or discharge without cause and established certain minimum standards such as sick leave. It is a protection afforded to comparatively few in private business and, as such, elicits the highest degree of responsibility to the governmental unit which is the employer.

16-2. Any provision in the ordinance which is inconsistent with the Civil Service Statutes or Rules and Regulations promulgated thereunder is hereby declared null and void and there shall be substituted for it, without formal section by the Mayor and Township Council, whatever provision of Civil Service applies.

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
