Burger Appoints Managers

Richard Burger, Second Ward Democratic Candidate for Council, announced at an organization meeting the appointment of Stanley Fink of 203 Gibson Blvd. as his general campaign manager.

Mr. Burger also announced his selection of Raymond Leonard of 15 Poplar Terrace as first District manager and James Whalen of 913 Raritan Rd. as his second District manager. In appointing district managers, Mr. Burger explained that this is a little unusual, but because of the size of the Second Ward this delegation of responsibilities would increase the coordination and efficiency of the whole campaign. Stanley Fink, an attorney, with offices located on Raritan Rd. has the responsibility of overseeing Burger's entire operation.

Mr. Burger also reported that his home visitation program is progressing excellently. He said that most of the peo-

ple have welcomed him with enthusiasm and have offered him their support. Most of the people in the Second Ward know him personally because of his fight for the development of Riverside Park and for the defeat of the apartment project on Raritan Rd.

"In fighting for these worthwhile causes," Mr. Burger said, "I worked for the benefit of all the people and I fully intend to work for all the people in the same manner when elected."

The people of the second Ward are in dire need of full representation from Council. "It seems ironic to me," the candidate said, "that the second Ward has all the industry, the apartments,

Grant City and its congestion; that we were forced to accept in the name of good tax rates, but receive very little of the tax money in return, for needed improvements. The tax figures are not readily available but it is obvious we are not getting our share. The fact that the people in the Riverside area had to take matters into their own hands to develop a play area for their children is proof enough of this," he said.

Republicans To Fight Toll

Clark Councilmen Candidates Edward P. Getchis, Robert M. Johnson, Edward Lystash and James Flood opened the second phase of their "POSITIVE ACTION" Campaign by fighting against more tolls on the Garden State Parkway with the aid of petitions signed by local residents who are strongly opposed to HR 17300.

Getchis, Johnson, Lystash and Flood will canvass the First, Second, Third and Fourth Wards respectively in a door-to-door quest for signatures of citizens to fight HR 17300 introduced by Democrat Congressman James Howard. The petitions will be sent to Congresswoman Florence P. Dwyer and U.S. Senators Clifford P. Case and Harrison A. Williams, they said.

The Republican candidates volunteered to conduct this project in the public interest, at the regular meeting of the Second Ward Republican Club on October 3 at the home of Councilman and Mrs. Johnson.

Response to the initial action of the Candidates in seeking an Independent Post Office for Clark has been most successful, Councilman Edward Getchis reported.

Farmer Stresses

Candidates' Qualifications;

Headquarters To Open Oct. 10th

John J. Farmer, Democratic Municipal Chairman in Clark, announced today that each democratic council candidate pledged a maximum effort to win in the forthcoming election on November 8. Mr. Farmer felt that it would be a long, hard fight, because no one is assured of getting elected, he said.

He stated that there was one main problem facing the Party, that being the unfortunate conviction of some former office holders.

He stated that although he was confident of their innocence, as the appellate courts will eventually decide, unfortunately, this decision would not be forthcoming prior to

the election. He claimed the opposition is slanting their campaign in this direction and "as distasteful as this might be, there is nothing that can be done to prevent them from running this type of campaign."

He pointed out that all four democratic candidates for office - Joseph Cillo, Richard Burger, John Boyle and Thomas Kaczmarek, who are being offered to the public are men of integrity and dedicated to their principles. "All four candidates were leaders in their community . . . in civic, business and professional endeavors. None of these men was ever associated with the former group. They are offering themselves to the public despite the knowledge that attempts would be made to associate them with past events," he said.

Mr. Farmer urged everyone in Clark to attend the grand opening of Democratic Headquarters at 21 Brant Avenue on October 10, at 8 p.m. Each candidate will be present and anxious to talk to every citizen who chooses to attend.

Armed Forces

Airman Apprentice Leif H. Erikson, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Erikson of 29 Gibson Boulevard, Clark, has completed the Aviation Mechanical Fundamentals School at the Naval Air Technical Training

Center in Memphis, Tenn. The four-week course introduces students to mathematics, physics and the principles of electricity. Subjects stressed include atomic theory, static and dynamic electricity, magnetic theory and the construction of aircraft batteries. Cillo Names Higgins

Doctor Joseph Cillo, Democratic Candidate for Councilman in the First Ward, today announced that he was "pleased to appoint" John P. Higgins, former Clark Magistrate, as his campaign manager.

Dr. Cillo stated that Higgins was extremely qualified in government affairs, having served as Town Attorney for eight years, as Clerk of the Board of Chosen Freeholders in Union County and as Clark's local Magistrate for three years. He also served as attorney to the Zoning Board in Clark but resigned because of the pressures of his practice. He has managed many municipal campaigns as well as county campaigns.

Mr. Higgins stated that "he was happy to be associated with Doctor Cillo in the forthcoming campaign." He said "he thought the residents of Clark should have a chance to elect a professional man and one who would be vocal about the rape of the First Ward." Mr. Higgins

claimed that "the present incumbent has been a silent representative and that the ward can not afford this type of Councilman" and that "this same good guy was part of an industrial group who voted for the change of zone of the Oak Ridge Golf Course to industrial use." Mr. Higgins claimed the Ward should be kept residential and this constant encroachment upon homes of industrial and commercial use is changing what was once a prime area into "a hodge-podge of nothingness typical of what we as residents of this ward have received for the last four years."

Mr. Higgins claimed that Doctor Cillo was a definite underdog in the campaign but when the residents heard the issues and had the opportunity to analyze "the present incumbent's silence, lack of foresight and aggressiveness", they would come out and vote for Doctor Cillo. He urged all residents to keep abreast of the events and to actively participate in municipal affairs.

Hyatt Plant Marks Milestone

New Departure-Hyatt Bearings Division of General Motors Corporation recently marked a significant production milestone when the 50,000th car set of tapered roller bearings for railroad freight car application came off its Clark plant assembly line.

Coinciding with observance of the production accomplishment was a company announcement that its freight car bearing manufacturing facilities are being increased by 50 per cent.

Commenting on the expansion plans, Warren E. Milner, New Departure-Hyatt general manager, stated that, "rapidly increasing customer requirements have kept existing manufacturing facilities operating at full capacity for many months."

Based on current orders and the long range market outlook, present production capabilities are being expanded to build 21,000 car sets per year, the general manager said.

Mr. Milner pointed that aggressive railroad management resulting in a broad modernization program, has served as a major factor in increasing bearing requirements. He noted that the modernization, involving both conventional and specialized type cars, has provided faster shipments and increased reliability. Specialized cars include piggy back, refrigerator, 90-ton hopper, cushion draft and special tank cars. Roller bearings have become standard components in practically all these cars, Mr. Milner said.

Application Forms For A Firearms "Purchaser's ID card" are Available AT BRENNERS

The new "gun bill", which went into effect August 2, provides certain requirements in an effort to control the sale of firearms to persons 18 years or older. The bill prohibits the sale of firearms ONLY to anyone who:

1. Has ever been convicted or any crime...
2. Is addicted to narcotics, or is a habitual user of goof-balls or pep pills...
3. Is confined for a mental disorder to a hospital, mental institution or sanitarium...
4. Is a habitual drunkard...
5. Suffers from physical or mental defects which make it unsafe for him to handle firearms unless he provides a certificate from a medical doctor or psychiatrist licensed in N.J. or other proof that he is no longer suffering from that disability...
6. Where the issuance would not be in the interest of the public health, safety or welfare.

If you want to buy a firearm you must do the following things:

Rifle and Shotguns You must obtain a firearms "purchaser's identification card" from the town's Chief of Police or from the State Police. At that time you will be fingerprinted and must pay \$2.00. The identification card must be obtained only once in lifetime, and you may purchase as many rifles or shotguns as you desire unless you become an unsafe risk as listed above.

Application forms for the "purchaser's identification card" are available at CHARLIE BRENNER'S SPORTSHOP, 1534 IRVING ST., RAHWAY.

Pistols and Revolvers You must obtain a "permit to purchase". You must also have a "permit to carry". The "permit to purchase" is gotten from the town's Chief of Police and the "permit to carry" is issued by the judge of the county court. The fee for the "permit to purchase" is \$2.00 and is only good for 90 days and the purchase of one pistol. The "permit to carry" costs \$3.00 and must be renewed each Jan. 1st.

Antique Firearms Antiques which are incapable of being fired or discharged or which do not fire fixed ammunition, or those manufactured before 1898 for which cartridge ammunition is not commercially available may be bought or sold without restriction.

Mark It URGENT-- Save Your Family

Hold a family fire drill during Fire Prevention Week.

This is the urgent request of Anthony J. Malanga, Captain Fire Prevention Bureau. The request is marked URGENT, he says, because it may very well save the lives of you and your family.

"Experience definitely shows that a family which has planned ahead for a fire emergency is usually able to make a safe escape when fire actually strikes," the Captain said. "National Fire Protection Association studies show that the majority of lives taken by home fires each year have been needlessly lost because of failure to pre-plan and rehearse."

Planning ahead is essential to protect your family, for fire spreads so rapidly there is no time to figure out what to do. Make sure everyone, including the children, knows exactly what your home life safety plan is.

Then hold family fire drills regularly, so everyone in your home will react almost automatically to a fire emergency.

Here are pointers to help you plan:

1. Carefully figure out at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms. Allow for blocking stairways and halls by fire.
2. Particularly for nighttime fires, remember that closed bedroom doors will hold back flame and smoke, allow extra time for escape.
3. For upper floor escape, use any available porch and garage roofs, ladders, or trees as ways down to safety. Be sure exit windows work easily, and that they are low and large enough to get through.
4. Pick an outside assembly point where the family will meet, and be sure everyone understands the rule "once out--stay out."
5. Know how to call the fire department, and do this quickly when the house is clear of people.
