

## Hyatt Plant Marks Milestone

New Departure-Hyatt Bear-ings Division of General Motors Corporation recently marked a significant production milestone when the 50,000th car set of tapered roller bearings for rall-road freight car application came off its Clark plant assem-

came off its Clark plant assem-bly line. Coinciding with observance of the production accomplish-ment was a company announce-ment that its freight car bearing manufacturing facilities are be-ing increased by 50 per cent. Commenting on the expan-sion plans, Warren E. Milner, New Departure-Hyatt general manager, stated that, "rapidly increasing customer require-ments have kept existing manu-facturing facilities operating at

facturing facilities operating at full capacity for many months." Based on current orders and the long range market outlook, present production capabilities are being expanded to build 21, 000 car sets per year, the gen-

eral manager said. Mr. Milner pointed that ag-gressive railroad management resulting in a broad modernization program, has served as a major factor in increasing bearing requirements. He noted that the modernization, involving both conventional and special-ized type cars, has provided faster shipments and increased re-liability. Specialized cars include piggy-back, refrigerator, 90-ton hopper, cusho n draft and spe-cial tank cars. Roller bearings have become standard compo nents in practically all these cars, Mr. Milner said.
