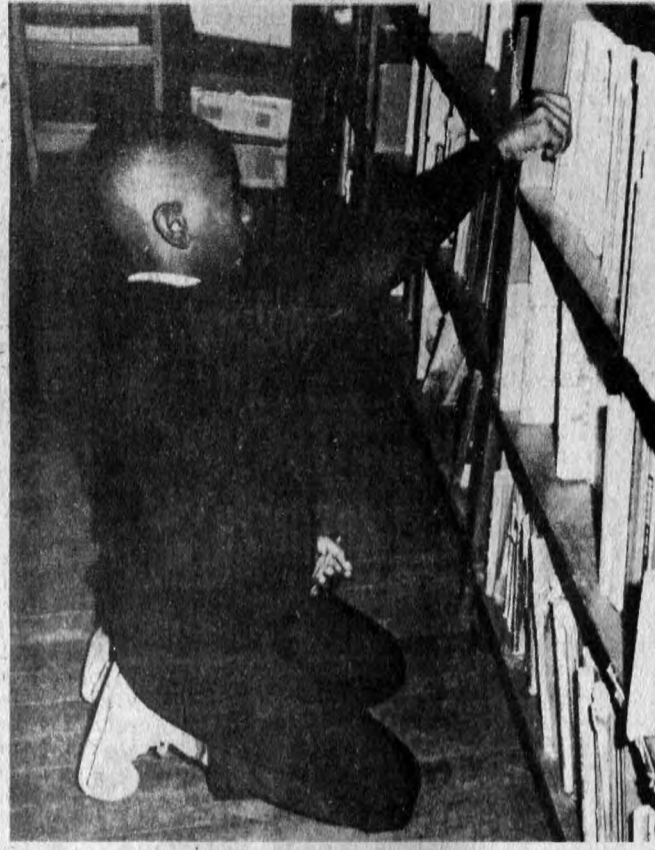
The Committee's objective, according to Mrs. Ratajczak, is to develop a closer working relationship between students and books and library operations.

Under Title II of the Elementary and Secondary Educational Act of 1965, funds have been provided for library resources which meet the specific needs of the culturally or intellectually deprived student.

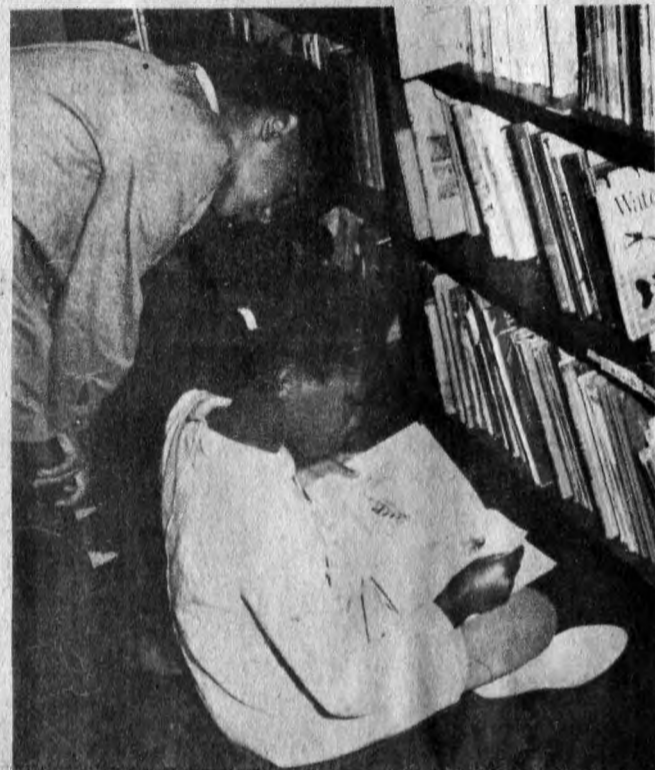
Books, periodicals and printed materials added to Grover Cleveland School under Title II, provide instructional materials in the fields of science, math, art, social studies, music and Language Arts. Also, new reference encyclopedias and other resource materials have been added.

The total number of library books purchased in the past year, including federal fund purchases and regular budgeted items, constitutes a twenty percent increase in the number of volumes. This increase has provided a greater variety of reading material to meet the interest and needs of the children.

The Rahway Public Library, in an effort to promote books and reading, also provides the school with 130 volumes each month. Ten books per classroom

Dear Sir:

On Tuesday, November 8, 1966, the people of Clark will be given the opportunity to vote on the Parolmen's salary referendum.

As a former Magistrate of the Township of Clark and as the attorney for the Clark P.B.A., I have had the occasion to not only represent the patrolmen but also to witness them in the performance of their duties. We in Clark have been blessed with a young dedicated police force which has been well administered and has kept our town relatively free of crime. The present compensation being paid to our men in blue is little above the standards recommended by the federal government. We have had one request for a leave of absence by one patrolman and a second request is now in the process as it is almost impossible for these men to provide a decent standard of living for themselves and their families based upon their present salaries.

We have all been reading of the turmoil existing in the neighboring Towns of Linden and Rahway in their respective Police Departments and we can only hope that the public will come out in force and support this referendum by voting "yes" so that we as residents might continue to attract a high calibre of policemen for the protection of our property and families. I again urge that every registered voter in Clark vote "yes" on this referendum. The cost to the taxpayer will be 3 cents per family per day or \$1.5 per year which is little enough for our peace of mind.

Reapportionment? You Will Decide

New Jersey voters will be asked to render a decision of far-reaching import November 8, Election Day. Besides selecting a United States Senator, 15 Congressmen, and myriad county and local officials,

they must either accept or reject a constitutional proposal dealing with representation in the State Legislature. (If the voters approve, Union County will then be represented in Trenton by three State Senators, who will each be elected at-large in the county, and six Assemblymen, two each to be elected from three Assembly districts which will be formed within the county.) Not since 1844 have the people of the state had an opportunity to pass on this central question in democratic government.

The 1947 Constitutional Convention produced a modern constitution to replace the one of 1844, but that convention was barred by law from altering the legislative article. So, until last year, the State Legislature operated under a system of representation that made sense in the early 19th century when the state's population numbered less than a half-million, and the people lived predominantly on the farm and in small towns.

Although the lower house, the General Assembly, was apportioned on the basis of population, the Senate was not. Each of the 21 counties, regardless of population, was represented by one senator. Thus, by 1960, Cape May County, containing 48,555 inhabitants, had a voice in the Senate equal to that of Essex County with its 923,545 residents -- a vote in Cape May was about nineteen times more powerful in electing a State Senator than a vote in Essex.

Since each man's vote should be worth the same, regardless of place of residence, the system was blatantly inequitable. The legislative majority actually represented a clear minority of the population.

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
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
