Right now, there is no regirements that dogs or other pets be kept on leashes, rather than allowed to roam freely. Recent incidents involving small children being bitten by stray dogs prompted action on the matter. We hope this

CLARK LOCAL NO. 125 PATROLMEN'S BENEVOL-ENT ASSOCIATION CLARK, NEW JERSEY

Dear Citizens of Clark: On Wednesday, September 7, 1966, this Delegate attended the funeral of Patrolman Birch, Fort Lee Police Department, who was murdered protecting the law abiding citizens of this State. This was the third funeral I have attended this year for

murdered Police Officers. In 1965, fifty-three (53) Police Officers were murdered and eleven (11) out of every hundred were victims of an attack.

#### Flood Hits Police Referendum As Political Football

"I welcome the opportunity to meet the people of the Fourth Ward and to answer their questions," reported Flood republican an-James didate for Councilman, in accepting the invitation of the Old Clark Civic Association to debate the issues at a special meeting next week. 'The people of the ward have a right to come and ask any questions they have," he said.

Commenting on the platform of the Democrates, Flood said, "The subject of the Police referendum has no place in the platform of any political campaign. The Democrats have done an injustice to the patrolmen. A pay raise for these men has been put before the voter of Clark and

will be determined by them at the Election in November. "I do not question the right of any person to indorse the position of the parrolmen, but trying to make a political football of the right of any man to make a living is wrong."

"I call on every citizen to listen to the facts presented and make up their own minds. The total sum is less than 4 cents per week to each homeowner in town. There are 17 active patrolmen. The increase they are looking for is \$400 per year." he said. "Economic Government

#### Boyle To Work

#### To Keep Third Ward One-family Residential

John F. Boyle, Democratic Candidate for third Ward Councilman, today stated his determination to be a 24 hour per day -- seven day per week representative of the people of his ward if this is what is required of him, "to do the job right." The candidate vowed that he "will settle for nothing less than perfect conditions for the third Ward, and that he feels third Ward residents should expect and accept nothing less in their Ward."

'The Democratic candidate observed that the third Ward is "essentially a one family residential neighborhood, and that it must be kept that way. Yet," Mr. Boyle noted, "the new zoning ordinance, through the device of a special exception use, permits boarding or rooming houses, funeral homes, a public utility installation, a swim club (with all its traffic and congestion) or even a nursing home, right here in the third Ward." This type of zoning carries with it the potential devaluation of third Ward permitted to happen, he said. 'These special uses must be kept out of the 3rd Ward. and I'll be the first one to introduce an amendment to the ordinance eliminating them from the third Ward, Mr. Boyle said.

The Democratic candidate indicated that the third Ward homeowners will be hit harder than any other Ward in town since this is one of the older wards, where many curbs and sidewalks are at least 10 to 15 years old and more likely to deteriorate before those in the newer sections of town, Mr. Boyle said that he felt that with the tax rate in Clark at the level it is, the Township should and must accept the responsibility for these repairs. "Let's give the people something in return for their tax dollar", Mr. Boyle concluded.
