Many thanks -- to the members of the Abraham Clark Council, No. 73, of the Daughters of America, who have contributed an American flag to the new Library. The flag will stand proudly in the lobby of the library as a symbol of their interest and patriotism.

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The decision's been made. The members of the Clark Volunteer Emergency Squad have decided to retain the land for which they now have a 99 year lease, for building on Raritan Road.

Following meetings with township officials regarding the possibility of changing the site of the proposed new squad house from the Raritan Road location to Broadway, near Walnut and Valley Road, the members announced this week that they have decided to build on the Raritan Road site. (It is expected that a firehouse will be built on the Broadway property in the future.)

Architect's sketches for the Emergency Squad building call for a structure about 120 ft. long and 60 ft. deep, with adequate area for parking facilities. When the building is completed, it is expected that a portion of the remaining land will be turned back to the township and a clear title to the remaining property will be given to the squad.

They've "got a lot of building to do" on that squad house -- so why not support the members wholeheartedly during their fund drive? They are on call 24 hours a day -- 7 days a week for you -- don't you have a minute to contribute?

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"I can't thank everyone enough" -- said Mrs. Nicholas Kachur, in speaking for herself and her husband following last Saturday's turnout of blood donors for their young son, "Nickie". But most of all, she was speaking for "Nickie", her two-year-old son who is a victim of hemophilia. All in all, 554 Clark area residents showed up to donate their blood and 514 were accepted as donors.

In addition to the many donors who took time out to help "Nickie" -- the Salvation Army provided coffee for volunteers and many area registered nurses assisted in the project.

Makes you glad there are so many generous people.

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And generosity was very evident in Clark Halloween collection for UNICEF this year. With the totals now in, the witches and goblins did pretty well for their neighbors across the sea.

The Hebrew School children of Temple Beth O'r, ages 6 thru 13, have collected \$364 for UNICEF. The top collectors were: Edward Krouk with \$26 and Ann Shain with \$25. The children enjoyed this worthwhile project and it is hoped more children of the community will join in next year.

They all deserve a big hand for their efforts.

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And apparently some other Clark youngsters (we hesitate to call them juvenile delinquents because this kind of thing isn't a habit) deserve "the back of a hand" for their misconduct that same Halloween night.


In one neighborhood, these youths chose one house to smear with rotten eggs and to write "Jew" all over the family car.

## Clark Students Launch Green Pennant Program

A student centered traffic safety program is being launched this week in the elementary schools in Clark, according to Dr. Karl Kumpf, Superintendent of Schools. Called the Green Pennant Safety Program, it will be sponsored by the New Departure-Hyatt Bearings Division of the General Motors Corporation in cooperation with local school and law enforcement officials.

The program, sponsored throughout the country by General Motors and now in operation in more than 400 communities encompassing thousands of school children, is aimed at preventing student-caused accidents involving a motor vehicle such as an automobile, bicycle, motorcycle, bus, truck, motor scooter, etc. Clark becomes the third community within New Jersey's Union County to introduce the program.

Under rules governing the program the green pennant flies daily on the school flagstaff under the American flag until the last day prior to summer vacation, except when an accident which police officials designate as one caused by the student of a given school calls for removal of the pennant. It is then placed inside that school for a period of the next 30 days. Identity of the responsible student is not made known to any fellow students. A school completing an accident-free year receives a "Perfect Safety Award" certificate for prominent display in the school. The program is in effect 24 hours a day, seven days a week during the school calendar. It is suspended during the summer months.

C. Frederick Crow, manager of New Jersey Operations for New Departure-Hyatt, noted that in cities and towns where the green pennants fly traffic accidents involving school pupils have

been reduced substantially and that young people have developed a greater awareness for safety.

Green pennants were raised at the Abraham Clark, Charles Brewer, Frank K. Hehly, Valley Road and Mildred Terrace Schools on November 1, 1966. Details of the presentations were worked out by Safety Officer Roy George, who has been assigned the duties of coordinating the safety program with the school administrators.

## Realtors Plan Winter Events

The Cranford-Clark-Garwood Board of Realtors held their regular meeting on November 10 and plans for forthcoming events were completed.

Members of the Board will attend a convention held for the New Jersey State Realtors in Atlantic City on December 7-10, it was reported today by William Fisher of Alden Realty Associates, Inc., Clark, who is president of the local Board.

A "tremendous attendance" is expected at the convention for the Fiftieth Anniversary, he said. Headquarters will be at the Chalfonte Haddon-Hall hotel. Plans have been completed for the Cranford-Clark-Garwood Board to hold their installation of officers, Christmas party and dinner meeting at the Town and Country in Union on December 15, Mr. Fisher said.

## Southwest Civic Assn. Meets Monday


William Jones, president of Southwest Civic Association has announced that the group will meet Monday evening at 8 p.m. at Hehly School.

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### Junior High Offers Extended Programs In Social Studies

The Rahway Junior High School Social Studies program attempts to provide varied experiences for the student to become more aware of his own culture and environment and its relationship to the world wide community in which he must live.

The present curriculum of the Junior High School provides instruction in World Geography in grade seven, World History I in grade eight and World History II in grade nine.

The major purpose of the World Geography program is to acquaint the student with basic geographic concepts in order to broaden

the student's understanding of global relationships, and prepare him for future progress in the various social studies programs offered in the school system.

The World Geography program is further intended to accomplish the following objectives:

To prepare the student for full intelligent participation in today's changing world; to help students understand how science, inventions and technology have given new values to certain resources, and lessen man's dependence on certain other resources; to enable the student to develop and utilize effectively certain geographical skills in the solution of problems; to cultivate in the student the ability to use the method of critical thinking in the solution of social problems in the community, both, local and international; to help students understand the relationship of geography to the life and culture of people in different areas; and to help students understand the kinds of resources that are essential in an industrial civilization as contrasted with an agricultural civilization.

The World History program seeks to examine how, when, where and why world cultures developed and the contributions that they have made to the world. It is hoped that the student will become more aware of his own culture and its relationship to other cultures in the world.

There are many objectives that the World History program seeks to fulfill. They might be briefly stated as follows: provide a better understanding of the development, influence, and contributions of other civilizations and cultures; study what man has learned and how he has applied his knowledge to a changing world; enable the student to understand his cultural heritage in relation to the rest of the world; develop tolerance for the attitudes, interests, ideas, values, and opinions of other peoples and cultures; and develop the act of critical thinking through the absorbing, analyzing, interpreting, evaluating and transmitting of relevant information.

The World History program is unique in that it is divided into two parts. Part one is offered at grade eight and part two at grade nine. This arrangement provides an opportunity to explore in greater depth those factors that have had a significant impact on our present way of life. It is hoped that the students will gain

a more meaningful understanding of their culture and tradition and will be motivated to pursue additional independent study of past history.

In order to fulfill the objectives of the social studies program competent teachers are necessary. The members of the Junior High school social studies department have proven their competency in helping students to develop an increased awareness of the past and the present. They have demonstrated their willingness to remain professionally competent by enrolling in graduate studies and working towards advanced degrees. Professional meetings and workshops held at various colleges in the state of New Jersey have been well attended by members of this department.

Education, generally, is experiencing with many new innovations in methods and techniques of instruction.


In keeping with these changes, the Junior High school social studies program is placing increased emphasis on visual aids and student-centered learning experiences as opposed to textbook-centered methods. It is hoped that increased learning will occur with long lasting and beneficial results to the students of Rahway.



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

### Private Eye Williams Nabbing Plaudits as Rifles' TD Weapon

When Joe Williams was a youngster attending school in Rahway, he had almost everything a teen-ager would want except a lot of money-good grades, a fistful of college scholarship offers and enough athletic talent to indicate he could make it professionally in either baseball or football. Williams chose Iowa and concentrated on a major in

criminology and football, chiefly because spring grid practices ruled out baseball, the sport he still feels is his best. The road to the top in football appeared shorter with the American Football League, then in its formative stages.

Now it's 1966 - and Williams has neither his college degree nor his major league contract. He's a private eye for a Toronto firm of investigators, a job at which he works hard and which pays relatively well, but which he does not really enjoy. "I'm not a snooper."

And he's playing football in a minor league, the Continental, where, albeit, he is the outstanding running back as a member of the Toronto Rifles. You might expect Williams to be bitter, to look for excuses, to blame others for the fact that his pot of gold is still as far away as it was a decade ago. But such is not the case. In fact, at age 25, Williams is still confident of realizing both goals in football and probationary work with boys-and such determination could be a reminder to a lot of youngsters who today are where he was in 1956.

Quite a Few Bumps in Road. Williams admits the road to the top isn't quite as smooth as it sometimes looks, despite the flowery picture painted of those who rocket to instant stardom. For the present, this season anyway, Williams is content to gain experience and, he hopes, retain his Continental rushing championship, improve his season record of 1,088 yards set last year and regain the game mark he lost a few weeks ago to teammate Bob Blakley (Minnesota). Blakley dashed for 225 yards during the Rifles' 36-30 overtime win against Montreal's Beavers. Joe's best was 195 in a match last season. Williams is now a permanent resident of Toronto and for most of the last five years, his home has been in Canada.

He came north first as a disillusioned dropout from Iowa, flunked out because of all things, though he had chosen Iowa as his school, he couldn't pass a course in the history of Iowa. "I'd known Bud Grant (Winnipeg Blue Bomber coach) for several years and I wasn't eligible for the NFL or AFL till my class graduated," he explained. "So I went to Winnipeg." After a season, he was traded to the Ottawa Rough Riders, but was released by Coach Frank Clair (Miami, O.) "because he said I was too small. I never could figure that out. We had two backs smaller than me." Williams is 5-10, 205.

Following his rejection by Clair, the unhappy Williams headed home to Rahway and wasn't answering his phone even when Ralph Sazio (William and Mary) phoned on behalf of the Canadian League's perennial Eastern champs, the Hamilton Tiger-Cats. Joe Acquired an Agent. When Williams did answer, it was a call from J. I. Albrecht, then G.M. of the Quebec Rifles, a Montreal-based team in the semi-pro United League, where he signed a contract not only with the team, but with Albrecht as his manager, for a percentage of salary. "A lot of the fellows did the same thing," he noted. "We didn't know what we were getting into and it seemed like a good deal. We thought he might be able to help us move up." As it turned out, Williams led the league with 17 touchdowns and was a prime commodity when the Rifles shifted to the new league and a Toronto site. The logical question would seem to be why, after such a fine season, and with Albrecht then scouting for the San Francisco 49ers, he failed to take advantage of the fact his contract didn't contain an option clause, and make his move instead of going to Toronto? And further, why, after becoming the CFL's top ground gainer in its first season, he signed yet another contract with the Rifles this season, instead of playing out his option to become free and have a chance at higher company in 1967? After all, if he failed, he could still come back. The Rifles would welcome him with open arms.

Better Opportunity in Canada. "I was thinking of going back to school and I liked it in Canada," he said. "I had a sales job with a scrap metal company. I felt if the Continental moved ahead, I could advance with it." Williams, a Negro, noted, "I think I have a better opportunity in Canada. There is more chance of being accepted for a good job on ability rather than being turned down because I'm colored." Joe has that genuine flair which all too many players lack. He is a flamboyant runner, capable of going all the way on every play. It would seem that Joe Williams' days in a minor league are numbered, but in the meantime, he's one of the few genuine superstars the new league has developed in its first season and a half.
