Yes Virginia...
There Is A Santa Claus

In 1897 the "New York Sun" was one of the nation's most influential and important newspapers. In an age untouched by radio, television and space-age communications, the newspaper was of singular importance to its readers. In September of that year, an eight-year-old New York girl needed some information right away. She turned to the most reliable source of facts she knew - and wrote a "letter to the editor" of the Sun.

The editorial answer which appeared on September 21, 1897 has become both one of the country's most famous editorials - and a tribute to the "love and generosity and devotion" of Christmas.

At the request of many of our readers, we are pleased to reprint the editorial below:

"We take pleasure in answering at once and thus prominently the communication below, expressing at the same time our great gratification that its faithful author is numbered among the friends of The Sun:

"Dear Editor: I am eight years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says 'if you see it in The Sun it's so.' Please tell me the truth; is there a Santa Claus?"

"Virginia O'Hanlon,
114 West Ninety-fifth Street."

"Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the scepticism of a sceptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

"Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to our life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus. It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance, to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

"Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas eve to catch Santa Claus but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders there are unseen and unseeable in the world.

"You may tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

"No Santa Claus! Thank God! he lives and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood."

A. L. Johnson Bel Canto To Be Honored By Music Educators

The Bel Canto, top choral group at Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School, Clark has been honored by being chosen a performing group at the Music Educators National Conference, Eastern Division Convention, in Boston, February 10-13, 1967.

The group achieved this honor by presenting a tape-recorded program last spring for audition. Before the final selection was made, The Bel Canto went through three separate screenings.

One of only two choral groups chosen from New Jersey, the Bel Canto will sing at the Conference Breakfast on Sunday morning, February 12. This breakfast is one of the high spots of the Conference.

The Bel Canto consists of 29 members. The group was originally known as the Ensemble at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School before 1956. With the opening of the Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School at Clark in 1956, the group transferring became the Bel Canto. Besides directing the Concert Choir, the Belle Tones, and the Beginning Chorus, Miss Midkiff is advisor to the National Honor Society and a member of the Principal's Advisory Council. Her outstanding presentations are well known throughout this area.

Miss Midkiff is a graduate of Trenton State College (B.S.) and holds a Masters in Music Education degree from the University of Colorado. She formerly taught in South Bound Brook, Pennington, Plainfield, and Had-donfield.

Formerly third - vice-president of the New Jersey Music Educators Association, Miss Midkiff is a member of all local, state and national professional organizations.

Miss Midkiff lives at 2050 Princeton Avenue, Fanwood. She has traveled all through the United States and in Canada in her musical endeavors.

Lehigh Valley To Confine Operations To Daylight Hours

Mayor William J. Maguire announced yesterday that he has concluded an arrangement with the Lehigh Valley Railroad to confine drilling operations to the New Departure Hyatt Division Plant and the U.S. Gypsum factory to daylight hours.

Residents of Georgia and Carolina Streets, which adjoin the railroad's main line have complained of excessive noise resulting from freight movement into the two plants during the late night and early morning hours.

As the result of several conferences with Robert Heath of the Hyatt plant staff; S.S. Mantz, U.S. Gypsum's works manager and W. J. Nocitra, assistant superintendent of transportation for the railroad, the whole drilling operation out of the South Plainfield yards was rescheduled so that most of the

work in Clark is completed in mid-afternoon. The new schedule went into effect November 28.

Officials of both plants have expressed satisfaction with the new arrangement since internal operations can be handled by their daytime crews.

"On the basis of this two-week period, I am quite confident that this nuisance to the residents of Georgia and Carolina Streets has been terminated and that their families will no longer be disturbed late at night."

"I deeply appreciate the co-operation shown us by Lehigh Valley Railroad officials and by Mr. C. Fred Crow Hyatt's plant manager and Mr. Mantz of the Gypsum Company in arranging this new schedule."

"I am sure that the people will regard this as a genuinely worthwhile Christmas present," the mayor said.

ALIENS MUST REPORT ADDRESSES IN JANUARY

Dominick F. Rinaldi of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service reported this week that the period within which aliens must report their address is almost at hand.

The month of January has been set for the address reporting period. All aliens in the United States, with few exceptions must report their address during that period. Aliens not required to make this report are diplomats and those accredited to certain international organizations. In addition, aliens who are not in the United States during January must report their address to the Service within 10 days after their return.

Mr. Rinaldi said that forms with which to make the report will be available to all post offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January. Mr. Rinaldi urges all aliens to comply with the reporting requirements, as willful failure to do so may lead to serious consequences.


Chicago Fire

CHRISTMAS CUT-OUT COOKIES
5 cups sifted enriched flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
2 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 tablespoons milk

Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs, vanilla and milk; beat well. Stir in dry ingredients. Chill dough. Roll 1/4" thick on lightly floured bread. Cut in desired shapes (stars, Santas, animals, etc.), place 2" apart on greased cookie sheet. Decorate with colored sugar, chocolate bits, nutmeats and currants. Bake at 375° F. for ten minutes. Frosting decorations may be put on after baking. Yield, approximately five dozen cookies.

2 cups sifted cake flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. nutmeg
1/4 tsp. cloves
1/2 cup shortening

Ruth Burns Defeats Army Gets To Husband In Viet

Ruth Ann Burns is a feminine, fragile - looking, blonde Douglass College student. But when she made up her mind to visit her husband Carl, a helicopter pilot with the U.S. forces in Vietnam, not even the Army could stop her.

Soon after her marriage in September, 1965, Mrs. Burns decided that she was going to spend their first anniversary with her husband, despite the fact that wives of servicemen are not allowed in Vietnam. Her husband, a 1964 Rutgers graduate, had been shot down three times and had been awarded the Purple Heart and the Air Medal for his Vietnam service, but she knew it was unlikely he could get home for their anniversary.

"I just made my mind up that I was going to get over there," Mrs. Burns explains with quiet determination. "I knew that the best way would be to go over as a journalist, so I set out to get press accreditation."

Mrs. Burns had completed three years of college work with a major in journalism. On the strength of this she got a job on the Daily Home News in this city as a reporter and feature writer and proceeded to turn out as much copy as she could.

"Once I had a respectable batch of articles with my by-line, I began writing to many other newspapers and news services, asking them to send me to Vietnam as a war correspondent. I finally worked out an arrangement with the North American Newspaper Alliance and got agreements to accept articles from six newspapers and various women's magazines," she says.

"After my request for official accreditation was submitted, I learned there were some people in the Pentagon who were more than a bit unhappy about an Army dependent visiting Viet Nam, and right up to the time I stepped off the plane I wasn't sure how things would work out," she says.

"Even though I was in Viet Nam for only two and a half weeks, I was able to see more than many journalists do in a much longer time because my husband had set up a carefully planned series of interviews for me," Mrs. Burns explains.

She became convinced that most Americans are not receiving a clear picture of what is happening there, because of inadequate reporting both of the efforts to build up the country despite the war and of the very high morale of American troops.

While in Vietnam Mrs. Burns interviewed village chiefs, peasants, medical men, shopkeepers and many New Jersey soldiers. She was in a crowd into which a Viet Cong terrorist threw a grenade and the helicopter in which she traveled came under frequent ground fire, but she escaped all of these episodes unhurt.

An article by Mrs. Burns on her Vietnam adventures will appear in the December 18 issue of Parade, a nationwide Sunday newspaper supplement, accompanied by pictures of her and her husband. She has reported observations of the Viet Nam scene for each of the newspapers which sponsored her.

Mrs. Burns, who is now living with her parents at 4 Erwin Terrace, East Brunswick, while completing the requirements for her college degree, earned more than enough from her reporting efforts to pay the complete costs of her Vietnam trip.

She is also doing her honors project at the Rutgers School of Journalism on the problems of reporting news of the Vietnam war.

One of the articles she did for the New Brunswick

Home News, on a shopping trip into the native markets of Vietnam, recently won a \$100 award from the William Randolph Hearst Foundation in a monthly competition open to students in journalism schools throughout the U.S. This is the first time a Rutgers student has won this award. A matching prize of \$100 will come to the School of Journalism.

"I would like to have stayed in Vietnam and done more writing," Mrs. Burns says, "but Carl felt that he could not pilot a helicopter and also worry about my safety. Perhaps when he has finished his tour of duty we will both go back to Vietnam as a reporting team."

KNOW YOUR UNION COUNTY GOVERNMENT

Weights and Measures

The Union County Department of Weights and Measures was established in 1911, the County officials at that time recognizing the importance of the sound economical operation of the home and also as a protection to the merchant. A factor which holds true for both housewife and seller today as the cost of living continues to spiral upward.

When established in 1911 the Department consisted of one employee. Today there is a superintendent of Weights and five assistants who police the County for unfair practices and for testing of all Weights and Measures equipment.

The inspectors during the year ending December 31, 1965, reweighed and found accurate 278,230 packages. About 1,983 others were ordered off-sale. The department made 4,349 calls to places of business during the year, and tested 41,122 pieces of equipment. Of these 40,348 were found correct and given a blue and gold seal. The department men adjusted and approved 416 others, 358 items were condemned, ordered repaired or replaced.

Packaged merchandise is weighed on a scale that has been tested. Meats, poultry, fruits and vegetables are checked to see that prices and weights are plainly marked and are correct. Dairy products are also weighed.

The inspectors allow a tolerance of only 1/8th of an ounce on a pound of butter. They check more than 200 oil trucks each year with the aid of a 100-gallon measuring unit. A five gallon unit is used to check gasoline pumps at service stations,

and a tolerance of seven cubic inches is allowed on service station gasoline pumps. Dairies, coal yards, road stands, manufacturing plants and junk yards are visited periodically by the inspectors.

A special service includes checking individually-owned scales if requested by the owners. It might be a good idea for every housewife to have her own small scale to test some of her purchases and if she finds an error to notify the County Weights and Measures Department.

There are 75 supermarkets in Union County and they are visited four or more times a year by the Superintendent and his staff on a general check. These markets are also checked on seasonal items during holidays, plus anytime there is a complaint or suspicion of illegal practices.

Elizabeth and Linden are the only municipalities in the County which have their own Weights and Measures Departments. This leaves the County department as the watchdog for the other 19 municipalities.

The Superintendent has said that consumers can help to protect themselves in several ways. He advises them to look for the Department's blue and gold seal decal on all approved equipment, to buy by weight whenever possible, to observe the zero and load conditions of the weighing instructions and to object to any shortage in the amount.




