It's that time of year again. The Clark budget will be voted upon in February — so make plans now to find out the details of what you'll be deciding on.

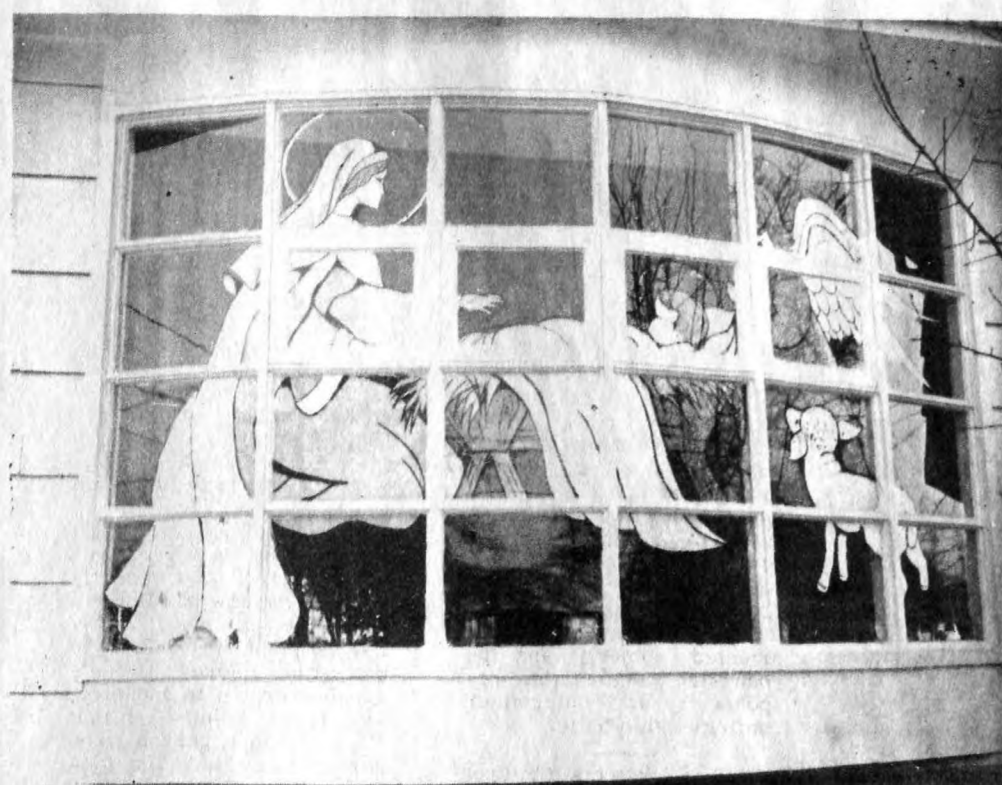
The Board of Education will present its budget for the 1967-68 school year at a public meeting on January 12, at 8 p.m. at the Charles H. Brewer Cafeteria.

Help Wanted On Tax Forms? Here It Is!

The Elizabeth office of the Internal Revenue Service at 32 West Scott Place is ready to assist taxpayers to prepare their 1966 Federal income tax returns.

Albert I. Krupnick, Representative of District Director Joseph M. Shotz, announced today that pre-identified tax forms and instruction booklets have been mailed to all area taxpayers.

Mr. Krupnick asks that each taxpayer save the booklet and tax form until he is ready to prepare his return.

Most taxpayers will be able to complete their returns with the instructions on the tax form and in the booklet. Those with more complicated problems will find their answers in the "blue book," "Your Federal Income Tax," which may be purchased for 50¢ in the local office.

Mr. Krupnick explained that additional direct telephone lines have been installed and that trained assistants are on duty from 8:15 a.m. until 4:45 p.m. each business day. The Elizabeth direct dial number for income tax assistance is 354-4300.

Andrew Hsiao
Guest Preacher
For Lutherans

The Lutheran Church Women of Zion Lutheran Church will sponsor their annual Mission Sunday on January 15 and have as their guest speaker, Andrew Hsiao, who

will speak at both the 8 and 11 a.m. services. Mr. Hsiao came from the mainland of China to Hong Kong at the end of 1948 as a refugee student. He graduated from the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Hong Kong in 1952 and studied in the United States between 1954 and 1958. Between 1958 and 1965 he served as instructor in the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Hong Kong, he was Editor-in-Chief of the Lutheran Literature Society (Hong Kong and Taiwan) and Director of Christian Education in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Hong Kong. His major work in those seven years was, however, the planning and editing of the "Good Tidings Sunday School Material", the first indigenous Sunday School curriculum ever produced in the Chinese language. Mr. Hsiao came over to the United States again in July, 1965 under the sponsorship of the Board of World Missions of the Lutheran Church in America. He is now studying at New York University for a Ph. D. degree.

As soon as Mr. Hsiao completes his studies he will return to Hong Kong to teach Christian education in the Lutheran Theological Seminary there. His wife and three children are with him in New York City.

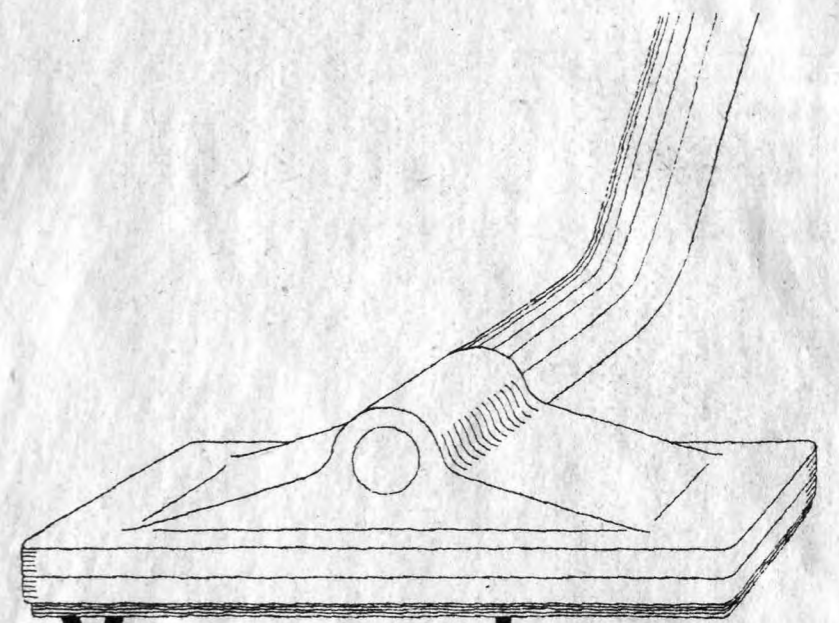

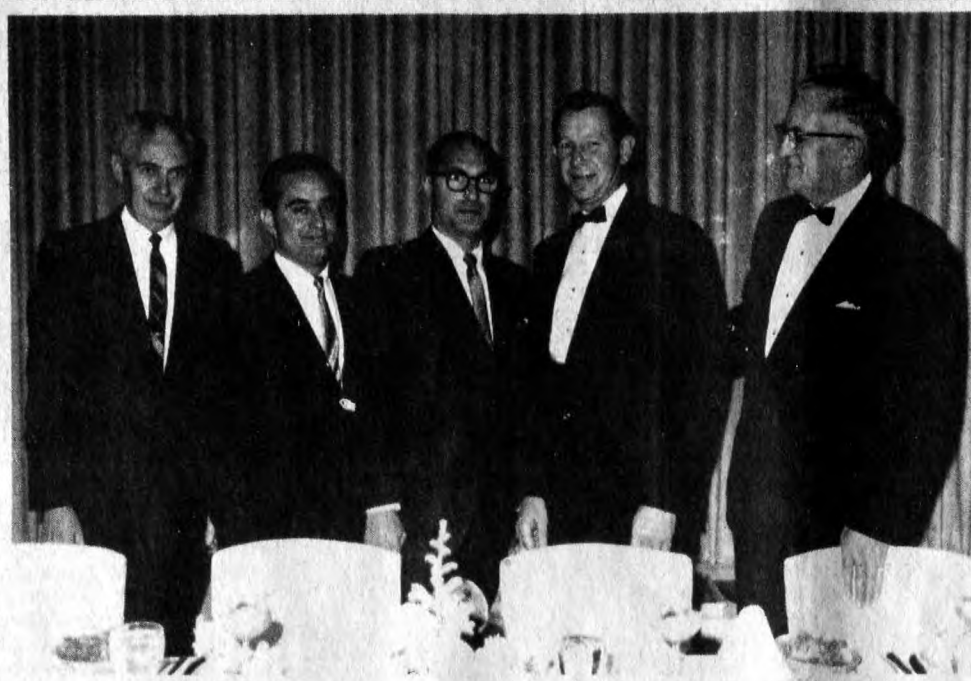
Joseph M. Feinberg, former Lt. Gov. of Kiwanis was toastmaster and Lt. Gov. Richard Bueschel was the installing officer.

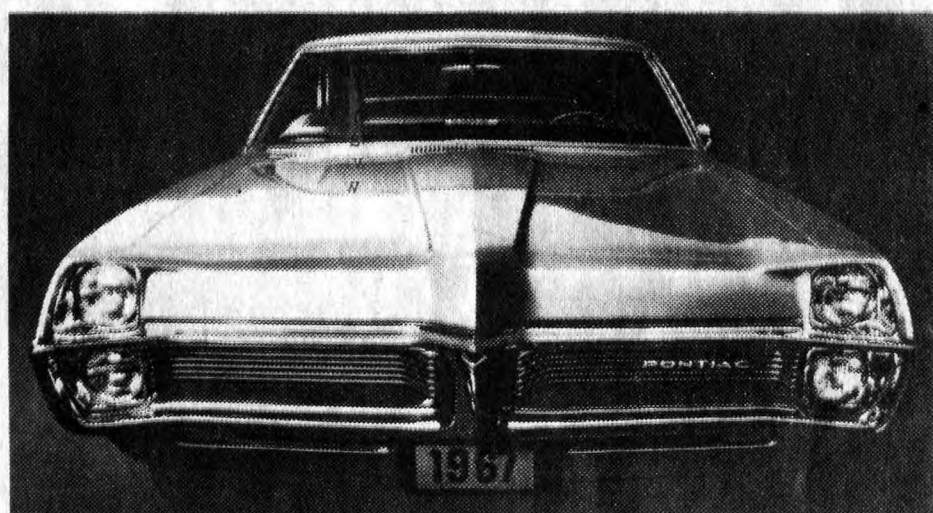

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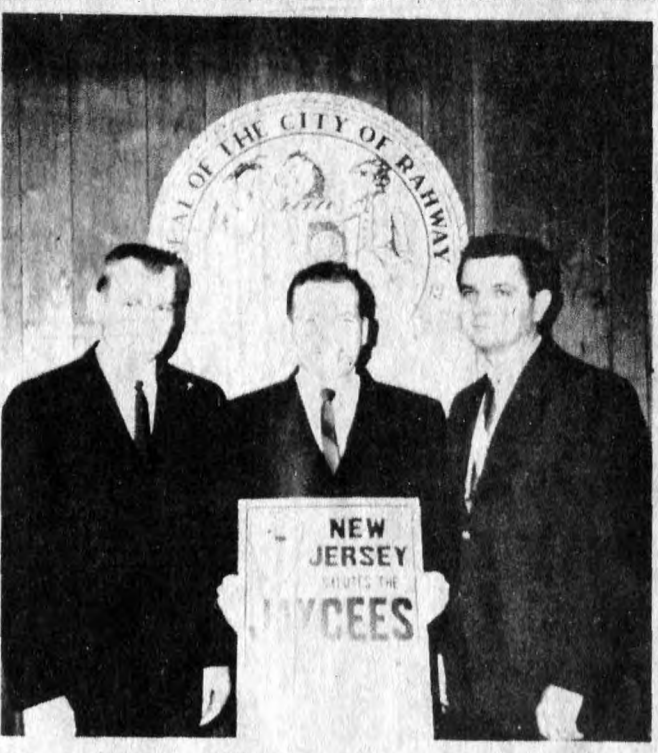
