No authorized official would release the figures in his name.

In December, Mayor William Maguire strongly emphasized that during the past six years, the township legal costs had averaged \$24,507 — but no specific mention was made of the 1966 figure.

Now Councilman Kaczmarek reports that the average is \$30,400 for a six-year average with a big jump to the 1966 total of \$61,387. During the past year, he received \$400 a day when in court.

There are few who'd deny that the present township attorney has done an excellent job in defending the township in its many legal battles — but it's still a matter of money.

Council Acts To Ease Parkway Circle Traffic; Moves For Own P.O.

With a spirit of cooperation reflected in their evening of 7 - 0 votes, the Clark Council had one of its smoothest and shortest - 45 minutes -- meetings Monday evening.

Highlights of the evening were actions taken to try to ease the traffic congestion at the Parkway Circle and to try to have an independent Post Office established for the township.

The Council moved to send requests to the Freeholders and the Garden State Parkway asking that they undertake engineering studies to permit some action on changing the traffic pattern.

We may have many O'Briens in Clark -- but Lawrence O'Brien, Postmaster General, will be one

of the most important to Clark residents now. Council moved to ask the Postmaster General and his staff to establish a Post Office for Clark. Township officers will now file our application for the independent set-up for mail delivery.

In other actions, Council introduced an ordinance to raise the patrolmen's salaries from \$5,450 to \$5,850 minimum and from \$7,050 to \$7,450 maximum. This is in line with the mandate delivered by the voters last fall.

Council also introduced ordinances to provide an animal restriction code for township canines; a traffic ordinance which provides certain "no parking" areas, and limits parking time and

light traffic streets; and a measure which requires contractors to install a 2" sub - base intermediate course road base before receiving final planning board approval for construction.

The Council also moved to appoint Ralph Iozzi to the Board of Adjustment to fill the seat left vacant by the appointment of Ernest Lebowitz as Township Prosecutor.

They also moved to appoint as required by the state, two alternates to the Board of Adjustment, who will attend caucuses and may vote if members are absent.

The Council also moved to increase from four residents to six, the members of the Planning Board, each of which is appointed by the Mayor.

Nine-Man Advisory Board

Council President Victor Catalano announced during Monday evening's Council meeting that he had appointed a nine-man advisory board to work with him in helping with many of the township problems. Councilman Catalano said that he feels there are many areas where an advisory board will be a worthwhile assistance in "doing some of the leg work" in studying projects which will be brought before Council.

The Council president especially noted three areas

in which he intends to work with the newly-formed group: the pool and civic center which will be used for a community recreation project. He said that land sites must be examined and residents canvassed to find out how much interest and support there is for the project among members of the community. He added, that he hoped the program could be undertaken on a "no cost to the township" basis. The other areas he intends to work with the advisory group on are: traffic at Central

Avenue and Raritan Road and Zoning restrictions and provisions.

Councilman Thomas Kaczmarek, who had pledged during his campaign for the Fourth Ward Council seat that he would look into the fees paid for township legal fees. Today, he made good on the promise. The Councilman revealed that he had received from the township treasurer's office figures for 1966 legal fees totaling \$61,387.87.

Councilman Kaczmarek said that he had investigated the amount paid by Clark in legal fees because he had promised the facts to his constituents. He noted that since 1961 the town has paid approximately \$182,000 in legal fees. The costs break down by years as: 1961--\$16,985; 1962--\$17,714; 1963--\$36,420; 1964--\$28,614; 1965--\$21,375; 1966--\$61,387.

This is just too expensive for us, he said. "I'd like to compare it to driving to work in a Cadillac or a Chevrolet. I can't afford a Cadillac -- so I ride in a Chevrolet -- but it gets me there," he said.

The Councilman said that "this is phase one" and he intends to look into other municipalities to check the costs of their legal fees.

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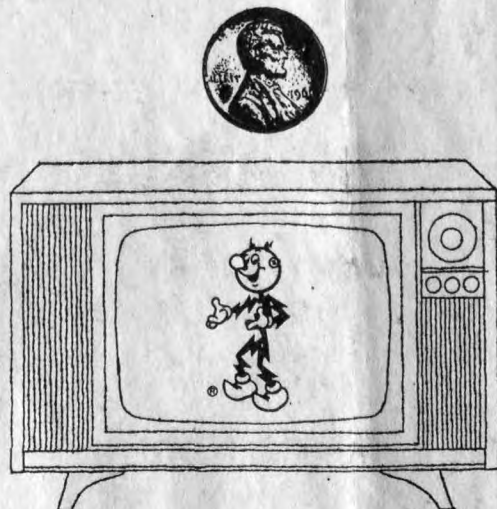

Mrs. Walter Samples, chairman, reported 5 volunteers gave 21 hours of service and netted more than \$120 taking baby photos last month.

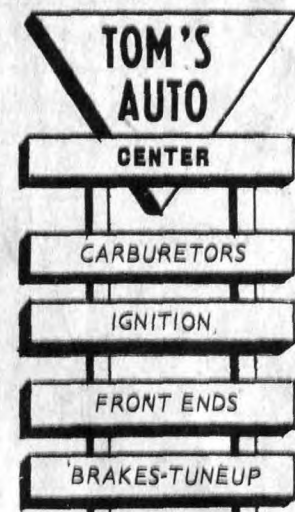
Squires Visit

Americans died of heart and blood vessel disease, according to the Union County Heart Association.



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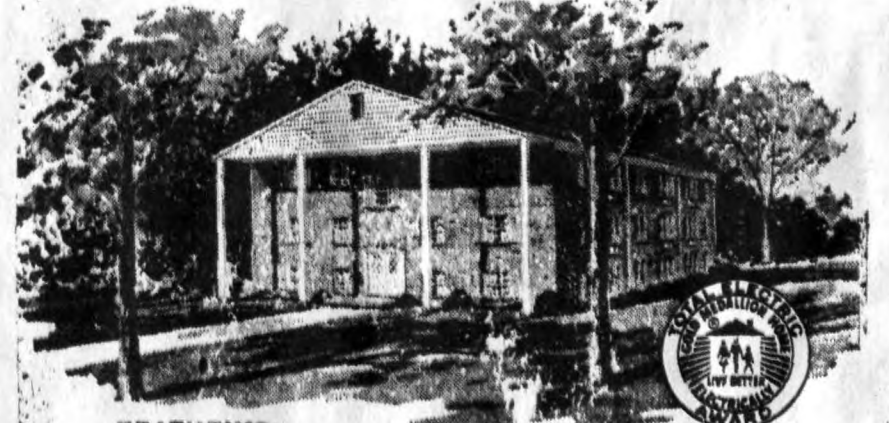
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
