Perhaps it would have been easier for Americans to accept an accident in outer space than a flash fire on the ground. But somehow, it's even more significant that death chose this way. The astronauts died during the final test before their mission. They were performing the daily, routine tasks of their jobs. Despite the glamour of a space shot and the mystery of walking in space -- our flight to the moon will be the result of just plain sacrifice and hard work by each of those involved.

Our sympathy and gratitude goes out to the family of each man -- first of all for their courage and vision in accepting the challenges of space -- and, secondly, for placing so much emphasis on "getting the job done right."

Happy Birthday! to the Boy Scouts of Clark and of the nation. The Scouts celebrate their 57th birthday on February 8 -- and all of the township joins in wishing them well.

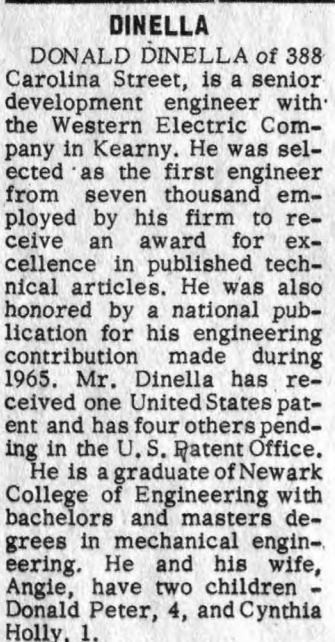

Clark Little Leaguers Register February 4-11

All boys interested in participating in Clark Little League team, must register between the hours of 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. on Saturday, February 4 or Saturday, February 11 at the Brewer School Cafeteria, it was announced by league officials this week. This registration is for beginners and last season's Minor League players who wish to play Minor League ball again this year.

To be eligible to play, boys must be residents of Clark and at least eight years old prior to August 1, 1967. They cannot register if they will become 13 years old prior to August 1, 1967. Specifically, boys are eligible to register and play during the 1967 season if their birth dates are between July 31, 1955 and July 31, 1959. Both dates are inclusive.

The boys must be registered by a parent or guardian. Birth certificates must be brought along to confirm birth dates. The registration fee is \$3 for one boy

and \$2 for each additional boy registered in the family. Any parents with questions about registration or eligibility should call Ed Muchmore, President at 382-2046.

It is expected that the Spring Production will be announced. Also on the evening's agenda will be films of the last production, "The Women", by Claire Booth Luce.

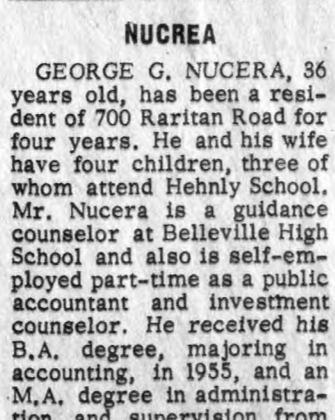

First Lutheran Church Service Set For Clark

Rev. Joseph Kucharik, pastor of the Zion Lutheran Church of Clark, announced today that weekly worship services and Sunday School sessions at the Frank Hehnlly School, Raritan Road, would start on Sunday, February 5.

Located formerly in Newark, the congregation is having constructed a church and educational unit at Raritan and Oak Ridge Roads in Clark. Ground-breaking ceremonies were held last November and completion of construction is scheduled for the fall of this year.

The new church will seat 300. An educational wing, providing classroom facilities for all age groups, will be connected to the church by a lobby area and lounge. Paul Miklas Jr., chairman of the building committee, has established the total cost at \$462,000.

During the construction period, the church office and meeting room will be located at 165 Westfield Avenue, Clark.

Concerning the church's relocation, pastor Kucharik stated: "The congregation looks forward to taking its place, along with other church groups, as a beneficial moral and spiritual force in the Clark area. In turn, we cordially welcome and invite the community to take part in our service and activities.

Clark Lodge Joins In Elks Seal Drive

Determined to increase its contribution to the annual Elks Seal Campaign this year, members of Clark Lodge No. 2327 B.P.O. Elks under the leadership of Exalted Ruler James A. Smith, opened its phase of the campaign this week with the mailing of hundreds of appeals to the public to augment donations from individual Elks members. Victor Nemeth is chairman of the Clark Lodge Crippled Children's Committee and in charge of the local drive.

The State Elks association is seeking a \$200,000 goal this year, an increase over past goals because of the continuing increase in population and the corresponding numbers of crippled and handicapped children in the state. Donations from a local area are returned proportionally to the area lodge for use in its work for crippled children.

The assistance includes: examination, treatment, therapy, instruction, operation, braces, shoes, wheelchairs, crutches, artificial limbs, etc., in all types of institutions and clinics. Over \$7 million has been spent by Elks of New Jersey on crippled, cerebral palsied and retarded children since the statewide projects started in 1923. Full college scholarships are also accorded nine handicapped young men and women in the state annually.

Assisting in the drive this year is Timmie Jaeger, the first Elks Poster Boy who was selected to represent the crippled children fund raising project.

Timmie, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jaeger of Clifton, posed for the Elks 1967 Seal which are in the mails to more than 250,000 residents and firms in New Jersey.

The 1967 Elks Seal Fund Raising Campaign is conducted by the New Jersey

State Elk's Crippled Children's Committee a coordinating group for the 125 Elks lodges in the State.

In discussing the drive this week, Mr. Nemeth pointed out that there is but one paid staff member for the entire State, which means that nearly 100 cents out of every dollar donated goes for the benefit of those in need of the services offered by the Crippled Children's Committee.

It wasn't really like "being in school" but there was a lot to learn all around. With classrooms that boasted three groups, each working with different teachers on individual projects...a new "alphabet" with 44 symbols instead of 26 letters...and library fines in days instead of dollars -- the recent Board of Education tour of the Clark Public Schools was certainly "a day to remember".

The tour, which was arranged for the Board by Mrs. Arthur Purdy, featured tours of each of Clark's five public schools. Under the direction of the principal of each school, different areas of the curriculum were highlighted in order to present a composite picture of the school system.

Board members, Robert Salvesen, president; Manual Dios, and Mrs. Purdy accompanied the group of interested citizens; many Board candidates for election on February 14, the wives of township officials, and the officers of many Clark organizations.

Boarding the shiny new bus recently purchased for the school system, the group "learned a lesson" about each school as they approached, were greeted by the principal and student guides in each building, and visited classrooms amid the eager glances of juvenile audiences.

Although most of the schools "put into practice" the new techniques and teaching facilities explained on the tour, specific areas were highlighted in each one. "Would you believe...a school bus with no bells...fourth graders using a "tachistoscope"...and first graders reading on a fourth grade level?"

Those were just a few of the "surprises" in store for the visitors as they walked quietly down corridors and walked slowly into classrooms that day.

First (and last) stop was the new Mildred Terrace School in which the women members of the group "ooohed and aaahed" at the shiny new equipment in the home economics lab where future homemakers practiced cooking skills which they will present as a final exam in the form of a breakfast for school officials. The "men of the house" of the next few decades were busy at work in the school's shop -- and other students were learning in groups in a large classroom in which three teachers were "team teaching" the individual needs of the groups.

Greeted by Principal John E. Conlin at the Frank K. Hehny School, the guests "peeked in on a small reading room" where students were receiving individualized reading lessons from Mrs. Kathryn Gambino and were introduced to the 1/t/a -- which stimulated most of the questions on the day's tour. The "initial teaching alphabet" a challenging new concept in education, utilizes 44 symbols instead of 26 letters -- and each symbol always has the same sound. In order to help the young learner begin reading -- the 1/t/a symbols always look the same -- so the child doesn't have to learn both capital and small letters --

and always sound the same so the child doesn't have to cope with all the sounds of "e" -- in "pie" and "easy" and "never" etc. (Because of the intense community interest in this new project, the "Clark Patriot" will feature an article on the 1/t/a in a future issue.)

While some of the advanced first grade students were progressing to a fifth grade level with 1/t/a reading methods, other students were having a hard time keeping up. Under the direction of remedial reading instructor

Mrs. Joanne Ridenour, students at Abraham Clark School were spelling out words on a typewriter with large, bold characters to help them use sight and touch in learning their words. These students were also using "tachistoscopes" to flash words in a small opening and see how quickly they were able to identify the words.

But words were hardly enough to explain the puzzled looks on many of the parents' faces when they

learned while touring the Charles H. Brewer school that "you don't hear bells all day long." The school, which serves seventh and eighth grade students attempts to help the students adjust from the grade school atmosphere of "learning as a class unit with one teacher most of the time." The students have an hour and a half "block" of time during which they've taught. They don't sit in classes for just 50 minutes and then hurry off to another subject

either -- the subjects are taught in "blocks" of time which vary. While the student sits in math class for 45 minutes, he'll have an hour and a half "block" for social studies or English to allow for better development of subject matter.

And the subject matter in the many books provided in the school libraries was of almost as much interest to the visitors as to the students who were doing research work in the libraries during the visit.

One bright young guide at Abraham Clark pointed out that when a student brings a book back late -- he's fined. But rather than paying in dimes or pennies -- the tardy borrower is fined the number of days he's late. If the book is five days overdue -- he must wait another five days before being able to borrow another book.

And books were certainly foremost in the minds of the kindergarten class of Miss Melinda Bloomfield at the Valley Road school. Reading teacher Mrs. Fred Ducatman held the class in silent suspense as she read one story and then moved them to animated enthusiasm during another. Mrs. Ducatman visits the class about every two weeks and while the older children enjoy her help in aiding their reading program -- perhaps it's the youngest ones who most look forward to the visit for their story hour.

And most of the visitors seemed to be "looking forward" to their next visit to the schools.



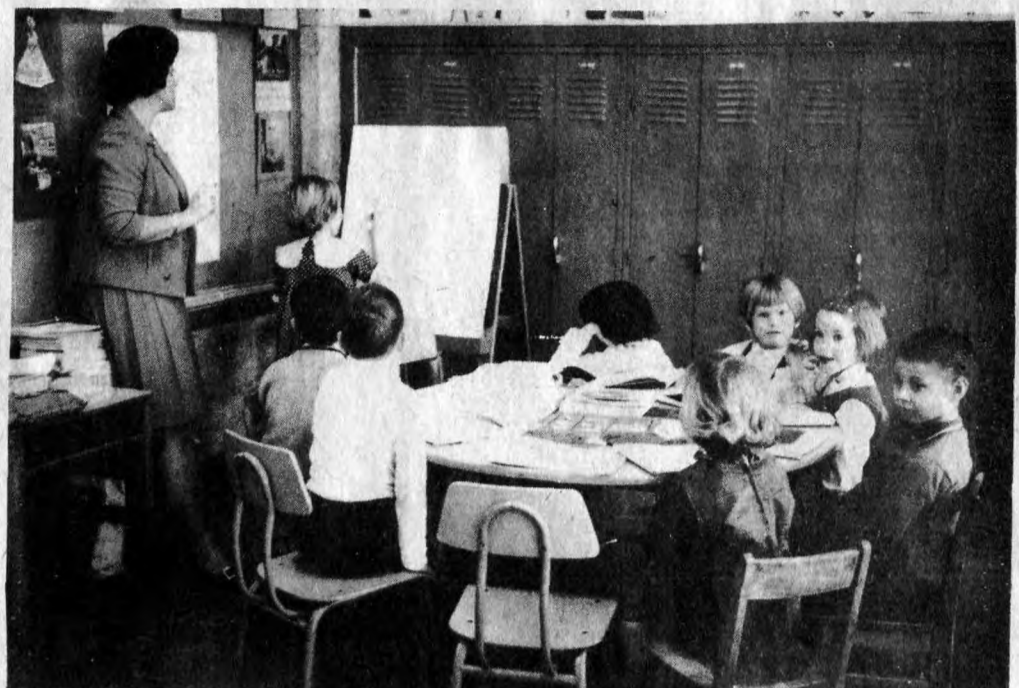

Clark, Rahway Residents Urged To Top Heart Totals

This is Heart Month, a period set aside to call to the attention of Americans the need for funds to help conquer America's number one killer. Scores of volunteers in Union County and many thousands of others across the country will be seeking the financial contributions of their neighbors.

The goal in Rahway is \$3,300, an amount only slightly in excess of the \$3,013 raised locally last year. The goal in Clark is \$1,500, an amount only slightly in excess of the \$1,172 raised locally last year.

This is a modest request when one considers the accomplishments of the Heart Association—and the work remaining to be done. Despite encouraging advances, diseases of the heart and cardio-vascular systems still are responsible for 52.6 per cent of all deaths. This, however, is nearly two percentage points lower than the figure of only a few years ago, a drop for which the Heart Association can justifiably claim credit. Since this is a disease that can affect more than half of us in Rahway and Clark, the odds are too risky not to make an attempt to do something about it.

The Union County Heart Association, which for 16 years has served residents of the county faithfully and well with research grants and information services, again is appealing for funds to carry on its worthwhile program.

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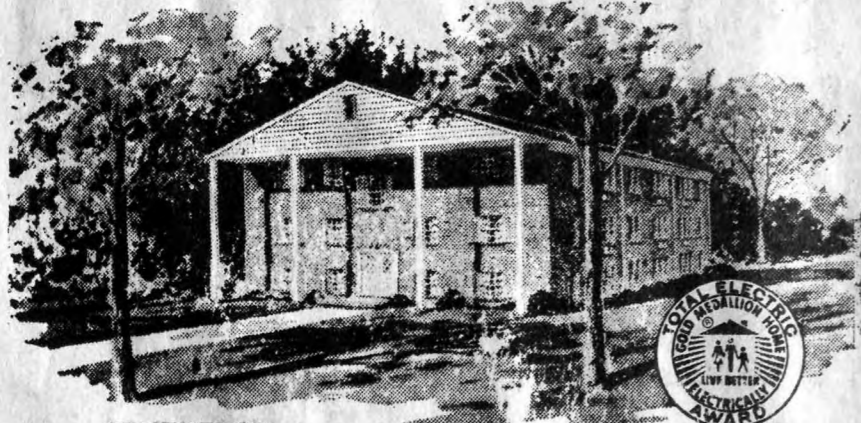

Health And Physical Education Required Of All Rahway Pupils

The health and physical education department of the Rahway Public School System has a staff of 16 teachers who instruct 5,602 students from two to four periods per week, according to grade level.

This program has been developed to conform with the accepted standards and policies of the State Department of Education and to satisfy the present and future needs of students through proper physical activities and health education. All students, unless they have a medical excuse, are required to participate in at least two periods of physical education each week.

Student leadership and self-direction are stressed through a program of calisthenics, dance, marching, individual sports activities, team sports activities and gymnastics. The physical education curriculum also includes a core of physical fitness activities designed to contribute along with the other activities in our program, toward the development of strength, speed, ability, balance, coordination, flexibility, muscular endurance, good posture and body mechanics, and organic efficiency.

PHYSICAL FITNESS
The Youth Physical Fitness Program consists of five exercises: pull - ups, push - ups, sit - ups, squat thrusts, and the 300 yard run. Each exercise is scored separately and provides a major challenge to a specific set of muscles. A composite score is then attained on each test.

An overall average score of 250 points is a passing score, though all should strive for 500. It is a rare individual that can reach the 500 mark. Although the score of 250 is not easy to obtain, most individuals can build up to it if they have the desire. The program is planned to include a broad scope and balance of physical activities that contribute toward desirable individual physical, social and intellectual development.
