You know, next Tuesday is Valentine's Day. So have a heart -- get out and vote.

The people of Clark will go to the polls next Tuesday (for information on the time and place see story on this page) to select three members of the Board of Education and to evaluate the budget prepared for the township's

Although we've had an opportunity to hear the candidates at meetings throughout the town -- we cannot single out "the three best". It's up to you to decide which candidates best reflect your views.

But on the school budget -- "the best" is a clearcut answer. The best thing for education in Clark is to PASS THE SCHOOL BUDGET.

There's been much question about the money Clark received last year from the sales tax. Let's face it. When the Governor pushed his tax lots of people -- including this paper -- tried to explain that the tax wasn't going to solve all our problems. The tax is giving the state \$222 million -- but only a small amount is going to schools to help ease your tax burden.

In Clark, we received \$90,890 from the state last year from the sales tax. By law, \$60,593 of that was used to reduce local taxes LAST year. That leaves \$30,297 to be applied to the 67-68 budget which you'll consider on Tuesday. For 67-68, a new formula for state aid has been worked out and Clark will receive only 11.2% of its school budget from state funds.

No one wants to pay more taxes -- we aren't too happy about paying the ones we have now. But defeating the school budget isn't the way to avoid higher taxes. Complain if you will to the politicians -- on local, county and state levels. But cutting the school budget is not

The Clark school system is one in which we can place pride and confidence.

The children of Clark are putting the question of their education squarely up to you -- will you have the right answer? The only place they can get a passing grade is at the polls on Tuesday.

We understand that an ordinance will be introduced at the February 27 Municipal Council meeting for a Legal Department for Clark. The ordinance will provide for a "salaried attorney". We are glad that the question is being studied - and we hope that all the facts are available for public consideration before a decision is made.

The Municipal Budget will be introduced February 10 at 8 p.m. in the Council Chambers. The public may attend but there will not be a public hearing at that time.

days. Some of those patients had problems other than their medical ones. In 480 such instances, our Social Service Director furnished compassionate, intelligent assistance and advice.

Progress in 1966 was not of a spectacular or dramatic nature. One can't see education or new concepts in accounting and nursing, but such/factors do contribute to improved patient care.

The Nursing Department received almost unanimous praise from patients regarding the caliber of its staff and services. Not content to rest on its laurels, it abandoned or adapted outmoded methods with great flexibility and experimented with new techniques. Aware that more people must be attracted to the nursing field and that skills of those already in the field must not become obsolete, Rphway Hospital employed a highly qualified Clinical Instructor in 1966. She immediately recruited students for a very rewarding pre-employment nurses aide course. In addition, the hospital affiliated with Rahway High School on a pilot nurses aide program, with Union County Vocational Technical School on a licensed practical nurse program, and with Middlesex County Community College on an obstetrical nurse program.

In September, George A. Van Gemert resigned as Director after nine years of service and John L. Yoder assumed leadership of the Hospital. He continued the hospital's policy of high quality patient care at lowes mented some internal organization and method changes in line with his personal philosophy of hospital management.

Twice as many pink and striped uniforms were apparent throughout the hospital as the result of an ambitious volunteer progrem. Sixty veteran volunteers wear with pride the pins and bars awarded to them if recognition of their service. Volunteers fill the need for extra service to patients as well as in vital areas not concerned with direct patient contact.

Another group of dedicated, industrious community residents working for the benefit of the hospital comprise the Woman's Auxiliary. Their fund-raising services provide financial support of their Building Fund pleage earmarked for airconditioning of patient rooms and other areas, as well as nursing scholarships, now numbering three. Of the 60% enrolled members, 145 devoted 16,535 hours in 1966 to taking the "Shop on Wheels" to patient rooms, taking orders for pictures of newborn, and to operation of the Hospitality Shop, the only one in New Jersey operated entirely by unpaid workers Parts of the Auxiliary called "Twigs" conducted service and fund-raising projects. The Juniper, Holly Wreath, Hawthorne and Pine Needlas Twigs prepared towels and wrappers for hospital use. The Holly Wreath Twig sold Christmas wrapping paper and cards and the Colonia Oaks Twig made puppers for Pediatric patients and created ceramic pieces for sale.

One out of every eight residents in our service area is likely to be a patient at Rahway Hospital during 1967. What changes can be expect to find?

The extremely busy Pediatric Unit may be expanded. A Coronary Care Unit fully equipped with specialized equipment and staffed by specially trained per-

sonnel may be established. Further expansion will take place in the ancillary services. The X-Ray Department will speed up film processing from 7 minutes to 3½ minutes and open

the new radioisotope unit, incorporating use of the magna scanner as an additional diagnostic tool. An electroencephalograph machine will be used for diagnosis of neurological disorders. The laboratory will carefully study further automation of its facilities for more accurate studies of specimens without using additional

Automation will also occur in the Medical Record Library and microfilming activities will increase there with the purchase of new equipment. Personnel and accounting records will also be microfilmed to keep them from becoming too bulky

Following establishment of a centralized dictating system and a stenographic pool, it is hoped that doctors will be relieved of much handwritten paperwork so that they can devote more time to their patients. Key hospital personnel will also find the innovation an efficient time-saver.


The business office will become involved in a cooperative electronic data cocessing program geared to the specific needs of hospitals. The first application will be to payroll/personnel requirements and eventually to accounts receivade, medical records, and inventories. The basic theory is that computers can accurately and rapidly monitor voluminous amounts of data and the program promises many exciting applications in the future, including preventive medicine.










Each symbol represents 100 admissions





## Hospital Profile

Rahway Hospital is a non-profit (voluntary) hospital serving the municipality of Rahway and the surrounding areas that lie within an approximate 10 mile radius. Incorporated in the year of 1917 the present large and modern hospital had its inception in a modest frame house that still stands at the original Jaques Avenue address.

With construction of a new brick building in 1929 the hospital was moved to the present location. This followed the foresighted acquisition of a large tract of land bounded on the west and east by Madison and Jefferson Avenues and on the south by Stone Street. The new structure housing 60 beds represented, for the times, the ultimate in modern facilities. It comprised the nucleus for the existing complex and is now part of the west wing. The newer hospital served the needs of Rahway for nearly 30 years without major expansion and then burgeoning population demands suddenly changed the complexion! In less than a decade the hospital experienced phenomenal growth as manifested in a rise from 60 beds to 221. This was achieved through a major \$3 million development program concluded in 1958 and followed by a one and one half million dollar expansion project in 1964.

The hospital is served by a medical staff numbering 150 members and it employs 340 other persons. Fully accredited by the Joint Commission Accreditation Hospitals it is licensed by the State of New Jersey. A member of the American Hospital Association and the New Jersey Hospital Association it is managed by a Board of Governors which is comprised of community minded, public spirited citizens who serve without pay. This board appoints the Director who being the chief executive officer is responsible for the general operation of the hospital.
