### Scholarship Aid Offered By Jaycees

The growing list of scholarships available to Rahway High School students is being augmented this year with the addition of a \$250 grant being made by the Rahway Jaycees.

### Rahway Rotary Club is Mar. 31, 1967. The scholarship is good for three years and represents a total of \$750.

An amount up to \$900 will be paid as required by the Women's Auxiliary to Rahway Hospital for nursing education for a girl in the graduating class who shows evidence of qualifications for making a contribution to nursing. Mar. 30 is deadline for application for this grant.

The Rahway Junior Service League Inc. once in four years offers a \$300 a year grant for four years open to any boy or girl who has attended Rahway Schools for at least four years and has been accepted by an accredited college or university.

# Murray The K Easter Show To Run Mar. 25-Apr.9

A novel mixed media format will be introduced by Murray the K in the presentation of his Easter show, "Music in the Fifth Dimension." # Rahway Mayor Appears On Television Newscasts

Rahway Mayor John C. Marsh took to the air this week...in more ways than one.

The Mayor's views on the "thickening and sickening problem" of air pollution were beamed over the television networks in interviews conducted by CBS, NBC and ABC correspondents.

The national network noted the presence of the Mayor of a New Jersey community in a motorcade highlighting Staten Island residents' complaints against pollution caused by New Jersey industry.

In a statement issued after the motorcade, Mayor Marsh pointed out that, "We don't have to be fortune tellers to predict the succession of events regarding air pollution."

"It's a hot potato that will happily be passed around until the number of deaths directly attributable to air pollution demand action."

"The individual communities will make an effort on their own to see that in-

dustrial uses modern waste disposal and filtration systems. But these are meaningless token gestures unless there is concerted, determined effort on an inter-community and inter-state basis."

Mayor Marsh pointed out that Merck & Company in Rahway is spending over \$1,000,000 on a waste disposal system that goes one step beyond pollution elimination. "The Merck program is pollution prevention," the Mayor declared.

"But the potential benefit from forward steps of this kind will be lost in that cloud of yellow sulphur unless other industries in other communities do the same thing."

"It's just a matter of time before the federal government steps in to clamp down on the offenders. I'd like to urge all of the communities in northern New Jersey to meet with their industrial leaders to see what action can be taken immediately before it becomes a federal mandate."

Asked about the contribution of city incinerators to the air pollution problem, the Mayor said that the city is inspecting a modern incinerator system which may eventually result in a joint program involving several communities in the area.

"As soon as we complete our study," said Marsh, "I plan to go into the subject with other mayors in the area individually, and then to introduce the subject at the next Union County Mayors Meeting."

"We promised an Inter-Community Council to the people of Rahway. Now that it has been established, we mean to demonstrate its usefulness."

"If a joint incinerator plan can be worked out, it will not only go a long way toward preventing air pollution but will represent a substantial savings to the taxpayers of the individual communities."

"However," Mayor Marsh pointed out, "there are many problems to be worked out before joint incinerators become a fact of life. The important thing is that we begin to take appropriate action now...before our state slogan is changed from 'The Garden State' to 'The Garbage State'."

### Rahway's Route #1 To Be Re paved

Middlesex Concrete Products & Excavating Corp., Woodbridge, this week was low bidder at \$333,522.45 for resurfacing nearly 2.2 miles of Route U.S. 1 & 9 from East Grand Ave., Rahway, to just north of West Brook Drive, Linden, in Union County.

The project, which will be furnished entirely by the State, also calls for revision of the center island in this area.

Concrete pavement was installed on the highway in 1930 and in 1940 when 20 feet was added to its 40-foot width. Pavement on this heavily traveled artery, which now has an average daily traffic volume of nearly 55,000 vehicles, has become worn and smooth. This has produced a surface that is slippery, particularly during periods of rain. The pavement will be resurfaced with bituminous concrete.

The higher curb also will provide an added safety factor, a Department spokesman said. Left turn slots

also are to be improved to permit easier traffic movement.

During construction, traffic may be restricted to two lanes in each direction. Where this is done, the contractor will be required to provide emergency towing service for vehicles which may become disabled within the limits of two-lane traffic. The disabled vehicles are to be towed to the nearest location where they may be parked without interfering with traffic or construction. Bids will be reviewed before award of contract.

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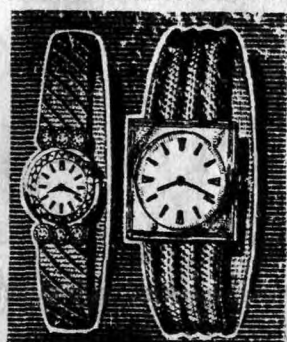


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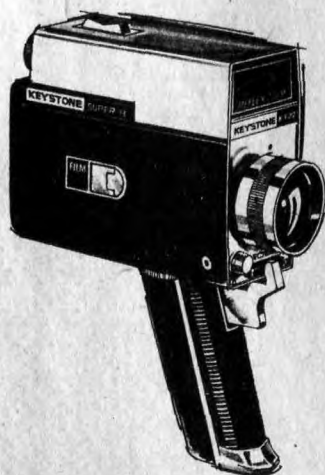
