Council Votes On Gas Stations, Police Salaries, Road Base

Golden Gloves Champs To Box At Johnson High Gym Tonight

Fistic fireworks will be popping on Thursday evening, Mar. 30, in the auditorium of the Johnson Regional High School, in Clark, when the Columbian Club of the Bishop Justin J. McCarthy Council, Knights of Columbus, Clark, present their Inter-State boxing show, featuring Golden Gloves winners of the New York tournament opposing the New Jersey winners.

Six of the 12 scheduled bouts will have division champions from the two states trading punches. In the light heavy weight bout George Watkins of New York will meet the sensational DeLolis Bozeman of Newark. In the lightweight class the three time state champion Eddie Parks of Paterson will meet New York's undefeated champion James Campbell. The Skeeter state champion, Adolphus McClendon, also of Paterson, will be hard pressed to come out victorious in his bout with New York's featherweight champion, George Barnhill. In other championship bouts Levon Sessions, welterweight champ meets John Bell; Flyweight Elijah Cooper opposes Jesus White and middleweight Mike Palardy will oppose John Burnside.

In a special heavyweight contest Bill Rooke of Summit and Harry Fannell of Trenton will swap punches. Lenny Harden, Billy Beam and Harvey Fair, promising Elizabethan's in the boxing trade will appear on the card.

as will Linden's fast rising middleweight, Tommy Stevens and Newark's middleweight star, Richard Winfield.

Joseph LaVista, Director of the New Jersey A.A.U. Boxing Committee, is serving as Matchmaker with Tony Orlando, leader of pugilistic activities in the Elizabeth area. At a recent meeting with the Co-chairman of the Columbian Club's committee William Bergstedt and Anthony Maffe, LaVista and Orlando assured the representatives of the Columbian Club that the card of bouts arranged for the Mar. 30 show will present more leading lights of the pugilistic world than has appeared at a show in this area in the past several years.

In a well-attended meeting marred by charges of "suppression of information" and demands for "the right to know" Monday evening, Clark Council voted 7-0 in favor of final passage of the \$400 salary increase for two years for Clark patrolmen. The measure, which was overwhelmingly approved by public referendum last fall, provides that minimum salary for a patrolman in 1967 will be \$3,850 and maximum will be \$7,450; in 1968 the minimum patrolman's salary will be \$6,250 and maximum will be \$7,850.

The Council also voted 7-0 to provide a third detective on the Police force. In another unanimous vote the members adopted a zoning ordinance amendment which specifies that gas stations must be 1,500 ft. apart. In a vote in which, if you believed every Council member who spoke, four members of the Council were against the ordinance--the Council voted 7-0 to pass a salary ordinance which provides a raise for the Mayor to \$1,700 yearly; a raise for the Council president to \$1,500 yearly and a raise for the Councilmen to \$1,300 yearly.

CIVIL LIBERTIES CHAPTER FORMED The American Civil Liberties Union of New Jersey has announced the formation of a Union County Chapter with Jacques Sichel, 1024 Sayre Rd., Union Township being elected to the post of Chairman of the Board of Governors. Any complaints regarding civil liberties should be reported to Dr. Alexander Soss, 411 Poe Ave. Westfield, at 232-1385.

In a measure aimed at avoiding another controversy involving families moving into homes before a proper street base in down-town Council voted 7-0 in favor of requiring a 2" road sub-base on all roads before final approval.

In other moves, the Council voted unanimously to request that the County install an "enclosed catwalk" type pedestrian walk along the outside of the bridge over the Rahway River on Valley Road. They also moved to request that the freeholders undertake the widening of two county bridges at Oak Ridge Rd., and Featherbed La.

Following the relative calm of Council's discussion, the public portion of the meeting was sparked by repeated questions to the Mayor from Mrs. Rose Wozniak of 24 Kathryn St., a fourth ward Democratic committee member. Mrs. Wozniak challenged the Mayor's intention in issuing a letter which required that most information from city hall be cleared through his office.

The letter, dated Jan. 19, was signed by the Mayor and stated that "I am fully cognizant of the responsibility and work load that you, as a department head, have in your office. Unlike private enterprise, statutory requirements add to this responsibility, making it difficult, if not impossible, under certain conditions to meet your time schedule when requested for information out of the ordinary. I am, for the reasons stated above, directing you to spend no time preparing information for any group, councilman, committee, etc. without first clearing the request through my office."

Council President Catalano attempted to answer the questions by saying that he didn't think any Councilman had incurred trouble in obtaining any information so far. He later contradicted by Councilman Boyle who stated that he had asked for a report on engineering costs on Mar. 13 and wanted the information by Mar. 18. He said that he received a letter saying that his request had been noted by letter to the Mayor and that it was impossible to obtain the information in that short a period. Mayor Maguire retorted that he knew nothing of such a request. Business Administrator Walsh later said that the letter had not been received until Mar. 16 and the information was requested by Mar. 17. When Councilman Boyle denied this, the Business Administrator said he wouldn't engage in a debate about it.

Mrs. Wozniak, in persistent questioning, asked whether or not she, as a private citizen or her Councilman would have trouble obtaining necessary information. The Mayor said that his measure was intended not to suppress information but to avoid duplication.

WHY SAP ASCENDS

What makes sap rise in plants, even to the tops of tall trees? Is it pushed, or is it pulled?

Walter Haldeman of the Pennsylvania State University says you get a good explanation of why sap ascends in plants from their correspondence course Plant Lifting to the Penn State course, sap is pulled by a force applied at the tops of plants. As moisture evaporates from plants' leaves, more water is pulled up the plants' tubes to replace that evaporated. Just like ink is absorbed into blotters, or water is lifted from wells by pumps.

Moisture is lost from leaves by transpiration, a special kind of evaporation. The pull on replacement water is exerted by cohesion of molecules. Have you forgotten your high school science? Cohesion of molecules means attraction between water particles.

Water moves inside plants through the vascular systems, which are networks of tubes. The vascular network which carries water upward is mostly in the wood of plants' stems.

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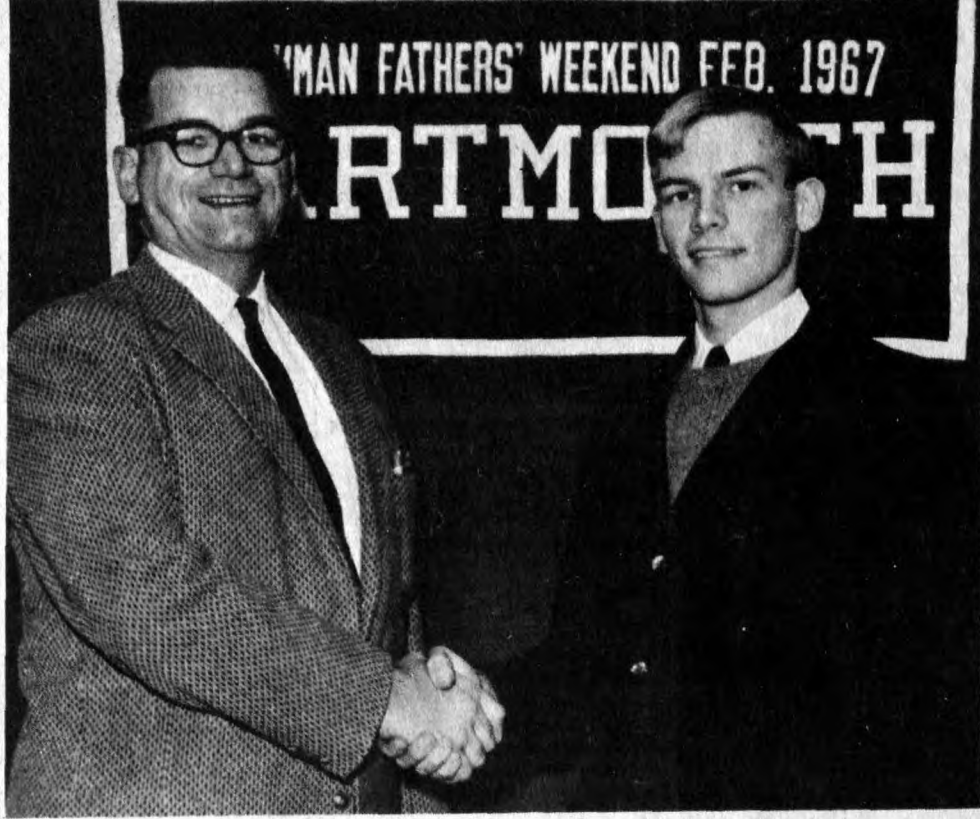

UJC Students Favor Draft Deferments

Although President Lyndon Johnson favors a debate concerning draft deferments for college students, the proposal needs no further discussion in the view of undergraduates at Union Junior College.

An informal survey showed that nearly all of them favor deferments for undergraduates. There was a mixed reaction to calling younger men first, but most UJC students favored elimination of deferments for graduate students. There was considerable support for some system of universal service for all young men.

"I think as of yet the government hasn't come up with a satisfactory proposal," Miss Lindlaw said. "I think that we should have a universal draft of all high school graduates for two years with assignment to the type of service that suits them best, taking into consideration their health status and religious beliefs. everyone could use the GI Bill."

Among other suggestions was that of Miss Dawn Skouboe of 896 Raritan Rd., Clark a sophomore, who said it is "definitely unfair" to draft students.

"Those who are taken by the draft before they enter college will lose much of their incentive to learn that they would have maintained had they entered college," Miss Skouboe said. "To draft students is actually discriminating against them. If one of the prime needs of our country is educated men, and if you take them out of college you are saying education doesn't mean very much at all."

AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING ZONING AND AMENDING SECTION 25-3 OF THE "REVISED ORDINANCES OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CLARK" TO BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF CLARK, COUNTY OF UNION, NEW JERSEY, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 25-3 of the Revised Ordinances of the Township of Clark is hereby revised as follows:
Gasoline filling station means any area of land, including buildings and other structures thereon that are used to dispense motor vehicle fuels, oils and accessories at retail, where repair service is incidental, where no storage or parking space is offered for rent, and where storage of dismantled or wrecked motor vehicle parts is prohibited. No gasoline filling station shall be any nearer to another filling station or to any public or non-public educational institution than 1,500 feet, where such station is located on a public street, or on an intersecting street. Such distance shall be measured in a radius of 1,500 feet from any part of the lot or plot on which such station is to be situated from the lot line of another gasoline filling station or of a public or non-public educational institution.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after final passage and publication in accordance with the manner prescribed by law.
