There's a lot of interest in the building of a new school on the Mildred Terrace site. And here's where to get the answers to your questions!

A public referendum is scheduled for May 16 and the Board will hold a public meeting to discuss the proposal which would provide a school on Mildred Terrace and a gymnasium at Hehny School. The proposed referendum will cost about \$1.2 million.

Members of the Board and the architect who's planning the new school will be on hand for a public meeting on April 20 at 8 p.m. at the Brewer School, Westfield Avenue. They will discuss the new buildings and answer residents' questions. The public is invited -- no, urged -- to attend the meeting to have their questions on the referendum answered.

We understand that the Board has also sent letters to Clark civic and service organizations offering to address the groups, explain the reasons for planning a new school and answer questions on it. A list of the organizations which schedule talks by the Board members, to which the public is invited, will be published in the "Clark Patriot" as soon as the schedule is complete.

"Westfield Avenue is a mess -- why doesn't someone clean it up?" We've heard this many times from our readers and have commented on it editorially.

Now, we're happy to report, Fourth Ward Councilman Kaczmarek has been successful in arranging with county officials to have the street thoroughly cleaned. The county trucks will clear Westfield Avenue early next Monday. Residents are therefore asked not to park on the street from 6 a.m. to noon on April 17. Please co-operate! Even if you don't live there -- if you're shopping, please park around the corner.

When the announcement of the change was made, however, workers at the Hyatt plant who commute to work on the bus, objected to the long walk to the slant gate they'd have under the new route. Councilman Burger, working with Hyatt's union president, Vincent Tavalara, was successful in convincing Public Service to maintain the first two trips, early in the morning, on the old route. This would allow the Hyatt employees who ride the bus to work early each morning to get off near the gate -- and later trips along the new route would accommodate students and shoppers.

April has been declared Cancer Control Month in Clark by Mayor Maguire -- and he urges residents to support the cancer crusade through volunteer work and personal contributions.

We certainly hope they do.

We hope, too, that Clark residents are more generous during the cancer crusade than they apparently were during Heart Month. We realize that sometimes it seems as though "you can't keep ahead of worthwhile charities". But, would you believe that Clark's contributions to the Heart Fund Drive were \$0? Surely, with all other Union County towns contributing -- we could have contributed something.

Congratulations! to Mayor Maguire and Second Ward Councilman Burger for their work with Public Service in re-routing the #40 bus to accommodate residents who want to ride to Mother Seton and the Grant's Shopping Center. Inbound buses will travel up Raritan Road, turn left onto Walnut Avenue and turn right onto Valley Road. They will continue around the Parkway circle past the shopping center to Raritan Road and turn right.

The Mayor has been working on the project for "better than a year" but Public Service officials "have contended that this slight change would cost about \$90 monthly and, in view of the line's losses, it could not afford such a loss," the Mayor said. The Mayor brought the matter to Council's attention in March, he said, and asked that they request the Public Utilities Commission to consider Clark's request.

Public Service, since then, has agreed to begin a 60-day trial period on April 24. They will study the new route to determine if it is being used by residents.

Residents in the School St. area can at least take hope in one measure: Mayor William Maguire said today that Shop-Rite has ordered twice-a-day garbage pick ups and has doubled the number of refuse containers for the store. The problem is a complex one but is being worked on by many township officials. Next week, we hope to have some more answers on this.

Boyle Reveals Non-payment Of Sewage Fees

Councilman John Boyle today revealed that in working on cleaning up Jackson's pond -- he has discovered that payments for Winfield's use of Clark sewer lines have not been made in ten years.

The third ward councilman revealed that in checking engineering and financial records, he uncovered the fact that Winfield has not made a payment to Clark for use of sewage lines since 1959. At that time, Winfield paid Clark for use of the sewers from 1951 to 1957 and those payments averaged \$1,500 a year, the Councilman said.

He is presently working with Clark and Winfield officials to try to find out why the payments stopped in 1959, he said. Mr. Boyle has talked with Winfield officials who agree that payment is due to Clark, he said. He and Paul Greig, manager of the Winfield Municipal Housing Authority are working to arrange a

meeting early next week with members of the Clark Council and the trustees of the Winfield Housing Corporation.

Walter Olearczyk, Clark's representative to the Rahway Valley Sewage Authority said that nine communities cooperate in the sewer system, with meters operating along the line where the communities flow into the main line. The towns are billed for the sewage service on a proportion formula, based on the amount of liquid and solid flow which passes into the main lines from their community. Although Winfield is not a member of the authority, their waste matter does flow through Clark and through our meter to the main line and hence "it's safe to assume" that Clark should be billing Winfield for this use. Also to be taken into consideration, said Councilman Boyle, is the fact that the Sewage authority is going to construct a new bacteria-type

disposal facility and Clark will be assessed for this in proportion to its amount of waste flowing through the system. If this discrepancy had not been discovered, Clark would have been assessed for the new unit on the basis of flow waste from both Clark and Rahway, he said.

In checking through the files to try to find out why the payments stopped, Councilman Boyle said that although an agreement was made for Winfield to pay Clark for the use of the sewer, payments were only made until 1959. These only covered Winfield's use of the sewers up to 1957. He could find no record of a cancellation of the agreement, but apparently no bills were sent after 1959 and no attempt to obtain payment for 1958 and 1959 was made, Mr. Boyle said.

At that time, Jay A. Stemmer was serving as Mayor of the town, but he resigned effective July 31, 1959. Clark had a three-man Commissioner form of government and the other two commissioners were John O'Connor and Walter F. Lilley. Upon Mr. Stemmer's resignation, the other two commissioners voted to appoint William Maguire to fill Mr. Stemmer's unexpired term and selected Mr. O'Connor to serve as Mayor. At a special reorganization meeting in which each commissioner was given certain Clark committees to supervise, Mr. Maguire was selected to head the Public Works area, under which the sewage falls. He said that in his work in that capacity, he did not know Clark should have been billing Winfield.

"The Mayor doesn't send out bills", he said, and he indicated that during his term as a commissioner in 1959 and 1960 he did not know of an agreement with Winfield. He said that at that time Clark had only two full-time, permanent employees and that many records were "kept at home". He said that either the former township clerk, Andrew Boytos, or the former finance director, William Drout, should have known about the bills before 1960 when the form of government changed -- and that after that it was the responsibility of the present township Clerk Edward R. Padusniak to notify former finance director Joseph Tankel of the agreement.

Residents Gather Petition Against Two-family Houses

Residents of Picton St. today said that "more than 50 of us" are planning to attend the Board of Adjustment meeting Monday evening to protect two-family houses planned for their

area. The residents said that they had almost 100 signatures on a petition against the building of the houses and that they would present it to the board at Monday's meeting. The meeting is set for 8 p.m. Apr. 17 in the Council chambers.

At that time, the application of Anthony Ginesi will be heard. Mr. Ginesi requests a variance to erect, in a one-family residential zone, five two-family homes. The houses would be built on a continuation of Georgia St., which runs along the Lehigh Valley RR.

These houses would be built on one lot, which is now vacant -- but two other large lots remain vacant across from this site. If this variance goes through, then two-family houses will be built on the other lots, the residents fear.

A spokesman for the group said that "we're not protesting just to protect."

He said that he'd studied what the taxes would be on a two-family house as opposed to a one-family dwelling and that the difference was "about \$400". This, he emphasized would hardly compensate the township for the additional services which would have to be provided -- especially schools.

Freeholders To Build Catwalk Along Valley Road Bridge

Third Ward residents have been asking for a long time for a catwalk along the outside of the Jackson's Pond Valley Road bridge so the roadway could be widened. And now they're going to get it.

Freeholder Caldwell, who heads the county Roads and Bridges committee, and freeholder board president Frank T. Cuchie conducted an on-site inspection of the Jackson's Pond-Valley Road bridge at the request of Third Ward Councilman John Boyle. The Councilman announced today that he was successful in convincing the county freeholders to give the "go-ahead" to plans for a catwalk to be built along the outside of the bridge, along the northwest side. This will provide residents who walk across the bridge and fisherman who "bend their rods" there to use the catwalk area instead of standing on the narrow bridge. Freeholder Caldwell indicated that preliminary engineering studies of the bridge and roadway will have to be made but indicated that

the catwalk would cost "roughly \$75,000". He said that the narrowness of the bridge was one of the main reasons for approving Clark's request. The roadway on the bridge is now only 25 ft. and becomes especially dangerous when ice forms in the winter. With the catwalk installed, it's possible that the roadway could be widened to 31 ft.

"We have \$1,000,000 to spend on roads in Clark--and all we need is your co-operation," freeholder Hugh Caldwell said today while visiting Clark. He mentioned funds which could be allocated for Madison Hill Road and other areas if Clark residents approved.

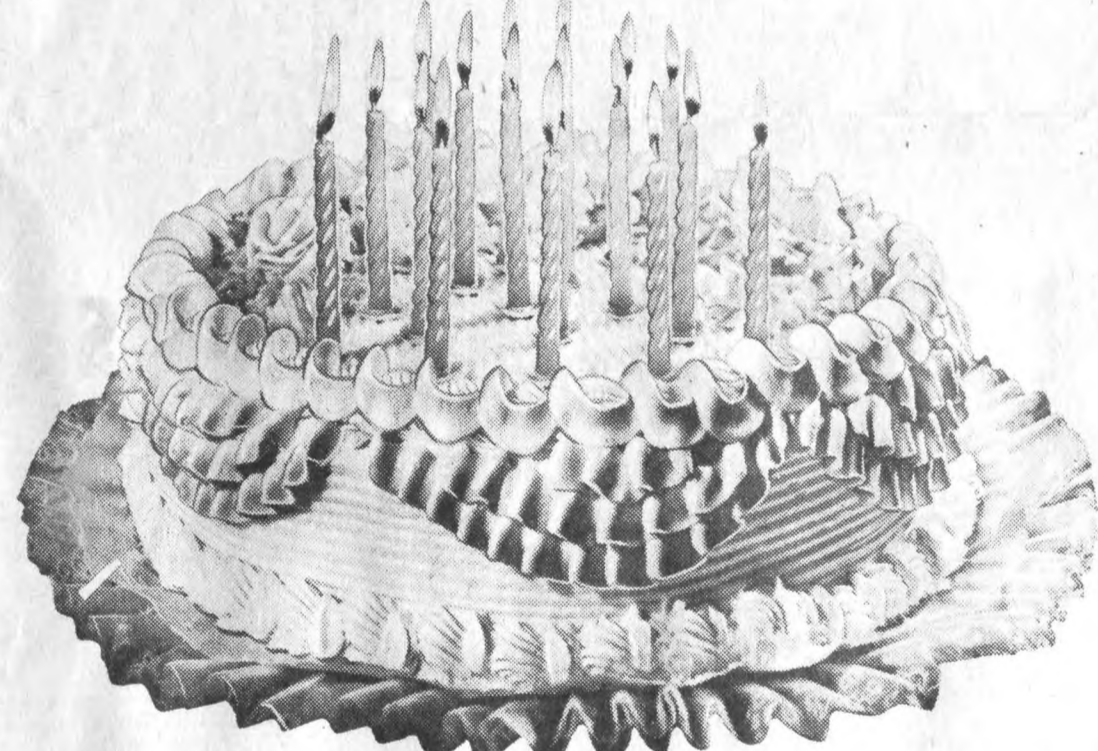
