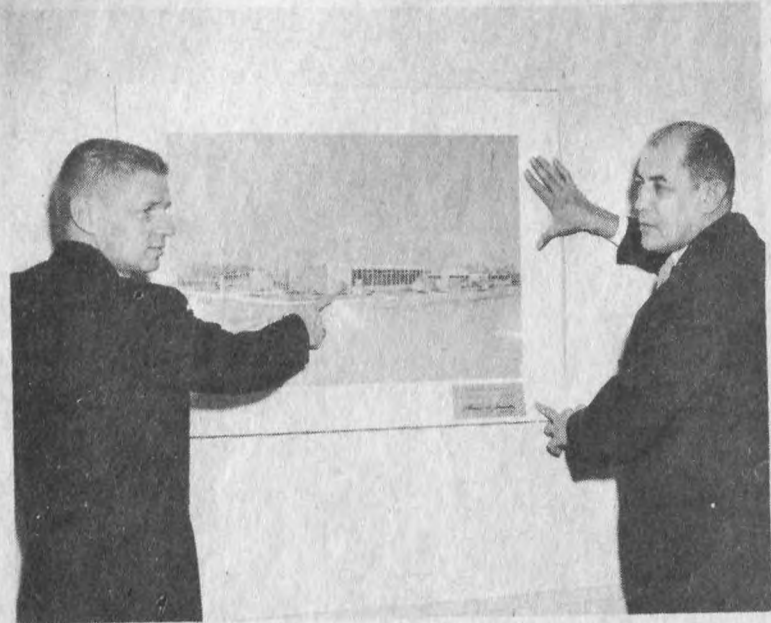


The Quill

Jaycees Support School Proposal

The Clark Jaycees voted to support the Board of Education's new school building program at a meeting held last Thursday. In a written statement to the "Clark Patriot," a spokesman for the group said:

"Each year our student enrollments increase, and we will eventually be confronted with overcrowded classrooms, lessening the educational opportunities of our children. The days of the one-room schoolhouse is a thing of the past.

"We, the citizens of Clark, elected the school board officials for the purpose of continuing Clark's high educational standards. Their proposal is to build a new school on Mildred Terrace and to add a gymnasium onto the existing Hehly School. Don't handicap your children by avoiding their proposals. Acquaint yourself with the facts of the issue and be sure you vote on May 16."

Board of Education Cites Reasons For Needing New School

The Clark Board of Education went under fire last week as Clark residents shot questions at the members concerning the proposed new school building. The public meeting was held at Charles Brewer School, and close to 75 townspeople attended the slide presentation and talk.

To accommodate the 3100 pupils expected to attend school in 1968-69, the Board has proposed a new school on the Mildred Terrace site along Brentwood Rd. It will have 12 classrooms, a cafeteria, library, gymnasium, a health room, a garage for a bus, two station wagons and snow equipment, and a wing (equivalent to two classrooms) housing 14 personnel members presently scattered in all five schools. They include the Superintendent of Schools, the Board Secretary and Business Administrator, School Psychologist, Director of Maintenance, etc.

In addition, the Board proposes a new gymnasium for Frank Hehly School. Currently the school has an "all purpose" room serving as an auditorium, gymnasium, and lunchroom, but since state law requires 150 minutes of health and physical education per week, this has proved inadequate. All the other schools have two separate rooms for these three functions.

The cost of the entire

package will be \$1,211,000, or spread on the tax roll, \$13.16 a year on a \$20,000 home. The referendum will be put to a vote on May 16.

The Board suggests building a new school on the site, rather than adding facilities to Mildred Terrace for several reasons. The most emphasized explanation for the need for a new school is that additions cost more per square foot than new construction does.

Most importantly, though, members said, is that by having two schools on that site, the Board would have the flexibility of separating the elementary school pupils from the seventh and eighth graders. And if, in future years, additional classrooms are needed for the elementary schools or the upper grades, they can easily be added.

C. Edward Hickey, the architect, displayed plans for the proposed building. Because of the slope on the property, the new school will appear as a one-story building from the street, but will, in reality, be a two-story building completely above ground. Mr. Hickey estimates that the school will cost \$20 a square foot, "but this is just an estimate. When the bids come in, there may be a difference." (Mildred Terrace cost \$21.25 a square foot to build, but this included special provisions,

such as science classrooms for the upper grades. Frank Hehly cost \$18 a square foot.)

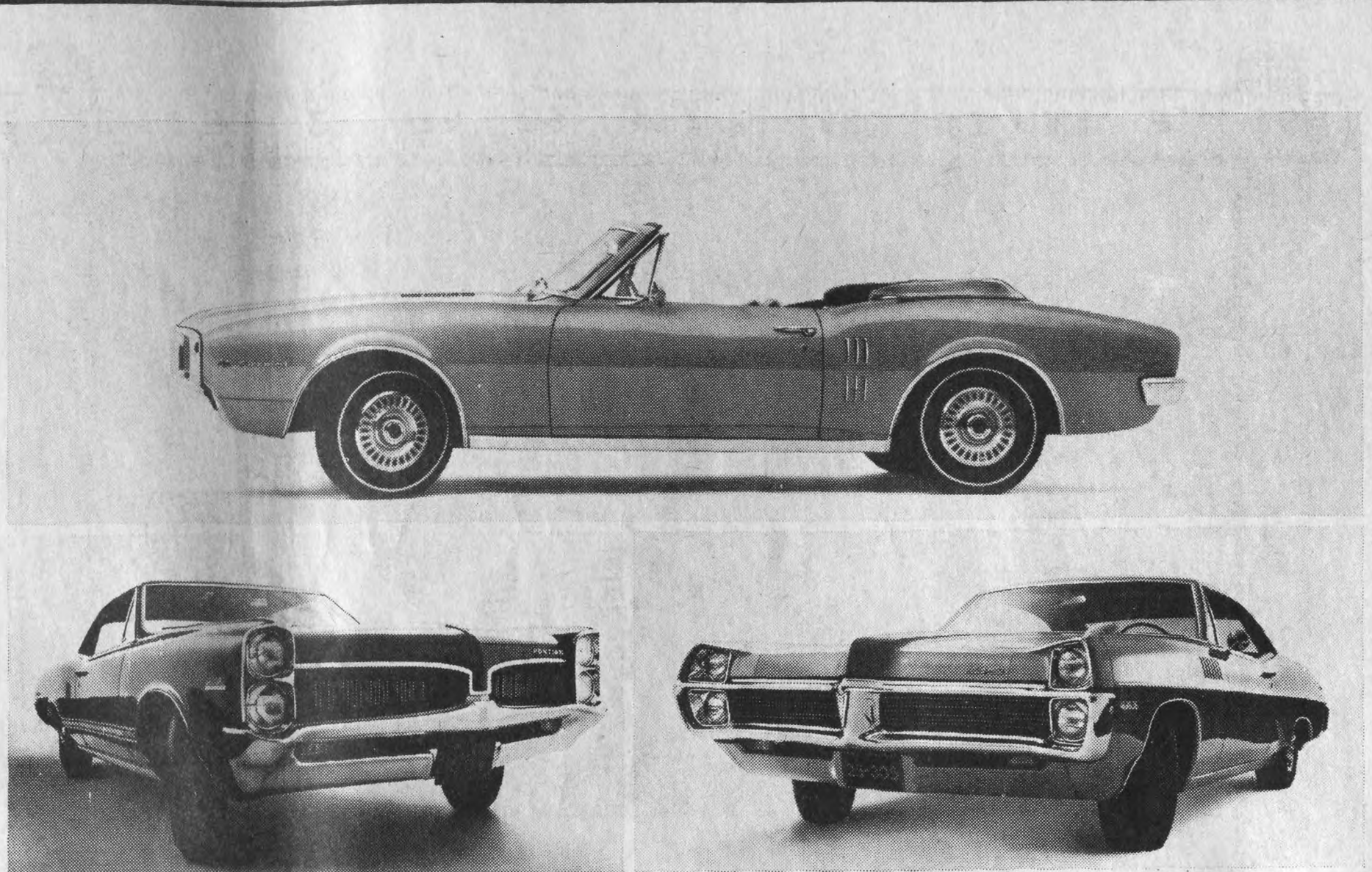

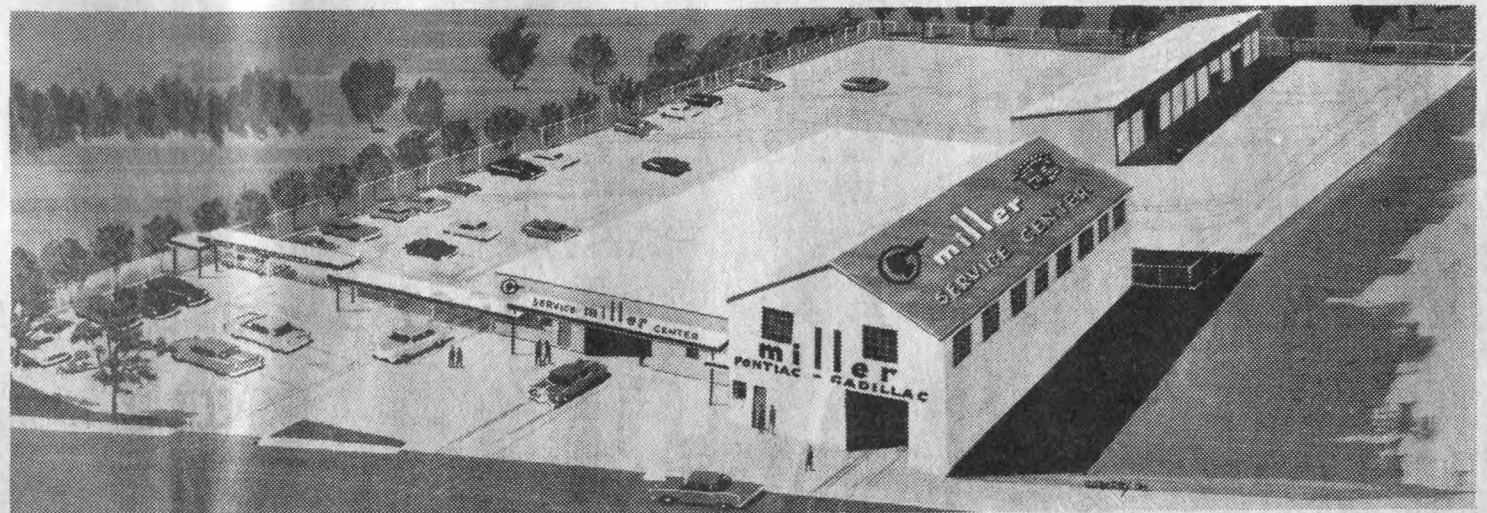

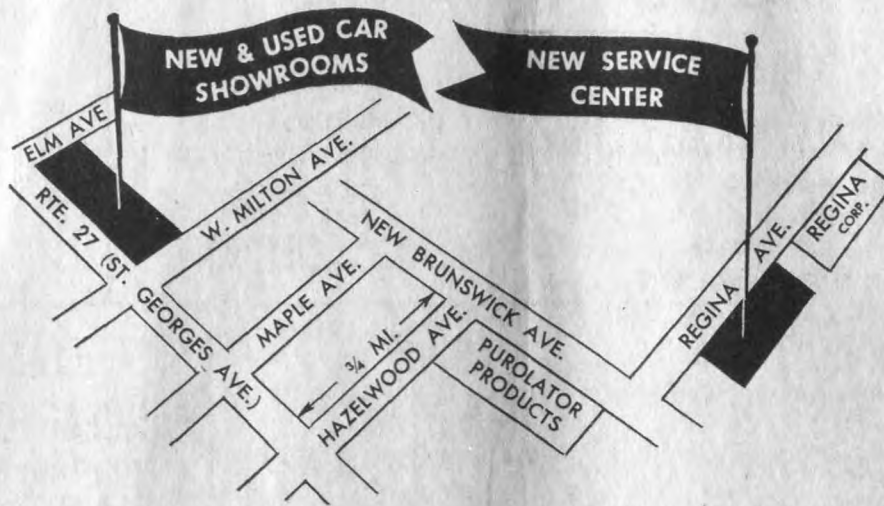

Jr. Achievers Planning Visit To Nova Scotia

The countdown in Junior Achievement's Operation Nova Scotia - Area of Achievement has begun. The 28 Junior Achievement companies in the Union County - Carteret, N.J. area are busily engaged in nominations of outstanding Junior Achievers from among the 800 high school students who have been vigorously competing for highly coveted spots in the award visit to Nova Scotia which climaxes the eight-month youth incentive project.

Nominees will be interviewed on Apr. 29, by an awards committee comprised of business and community leaders and Junior Achievement Board members and staff. The panel will conduct probing interviews of the nominees' performance in Junior Achievement and such areas as leadership, personal initiative and creative thinking, originally of the JA product, production and sales techniques, adherence to safety regulations, accuracy of company records. They will take into account appearance and grooming, ability to get along with young people and adults, record of attendance and punctuality. They will delve into the Junior Achievers' knowledge of the sponsoring company's activities, the values, workings and benefits of the Free Enterprise System, and knowledge of the culture, history and economic development of Nova Scotia.

Operation Nova Scotia is a three-pronged youth incentive, economic education and public relations project. It began in Oct. 1966 and has continued throughout the Junior Achievement program year. Its climax is the week-long visit to Nova Scotia, May 29 through June 4 by about 28 Junior Achievers and adults from the community and industry. In Nova Scotia, the Junior Achievers will have an opportunity to develop personal knowledge of the industrial, educational, scientific and cultural growth resulting from the Canadian Pro-

vince's Voluntary Economic Plan (VEP). They will return better prepared to assume their future responsibilities as voters, community leaders, employees and managers in a world where international relationships are becoming increasingly more important. The group will meet with American and Nova Scotian government leaders and educators here and abroad. Arrangements are being worked out in cooperation with the Nova Scotia Department of Trade and Industry, the Halifax Board of Trade, and Development Counsellors International, Ltd. Recently the Deputy Minister of Trade and Industry, V. Michael Knight visited the Junior Achievement Business Center in Elizabeth and briefed the young people on the history and industrial growth of the Province.

Nova Scotia was chosen as the site of this year's youth incentive award visit because Junior Achievement officials believe the Province offers one of the best current case studies of private enterprise in action. Today a confident, dynamic spirit prevails there and Nova Scotia is experiencing an economic expansion comparable, although on a smaller scale, to the economic miracles of West Germany witnessed first-hand by a Junior Achievement group which visited West Germany and Berlin in 1963 as part of the Operation Free Enterprise project that year, and in the 1965-66 Operation Free Enterprise climaxed by a visit to Ireland where the Junior Achievers witnessed the successful transition from an agricultural to an industrial economy.

In Nova Scotia there will be visits to industrial installations, educational and cul-

tural centers. Arrangements are being made for the Junior Achievers to meet with Provincial student groups and to be guests in the homes of industrialists and their families.

The most important phase of the visit will be meetings with industrialists who will discuss results of their Voluntary Economic Plan. VEP, pioneered in Nova Scotia, is the first attempt by a Canadian province to chart the course of its economic development with widespread citizen participation. VEP is designed to generate 3,500 new jobs annually and to double the annual rate of growth in capital investment by 1968. Ahead of its goal, 6,000 new jobs were created in the past year and other solid achievements in economic development are reported, with larger and more diversified industrial base proving to be a springboard to prosperity.

Kennedy Stamps To Be Issued On May 29

Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien made public yesterday the design of the John F. Kennedy 13-cent regular postage stamp in the "Prominent Americans" series, according to Postmaster Warren T. Moulton.

It will be issued May 29 in Boston on President Kennedy's 50th birthday anniversary.

The Kennedy portrait is based on a photograph by Jacques Lowe that appeared in "The Kennedy Years," a book compiled by the editors of The New York Times and The Viking Press, Stevan Dohanos, a member of the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee, designed the stamp. It is a vertical stamp and will be printed in brown. The denomination "13c" appears lower left, followed by "United States." Vertical right is "John F. Kennedy." All lettering is in roman capitals. It was modeled by Robert J. Jones and engraved by Arthur W. Dintaman (vignette) and Howard F. Sharpless.

A 13-cent John F. Kennedy aerogramme will also be issued May 29, with ceremonies a day earlier in conjunction with the COMEX exhibition in Chicago. Except for the denomination, this duplicates the existing design of the present 11-cent aerogramme. Increases in international mail rates, which become effective May 1, prompted the new denominations.

Collectors desiring first day cancellations for the aerogramme should address requests to the Postmaster, Chicago, Illinois 60607, enclosing remittance to cover the cost, which is 13 cents each. Plainly indicate full name and address, INCLUDING ZIP CODE. The outside envelope to the Postmaster should be endorsed "First Day Covers John F. Kennedy Aerogramme."

Clark Library Surges Ahead

Use of the Clark Public Library for the first quarter of 1967 increased over the same quarter last year, according to a progress report written by Edward Temkin, Library Director. The tally shows that circulation jumped 31.1%, assistance to readers went up 16.1%, and attendance made a 13.2% gain. Adult circulation continued to increase at a much higher rate than children's.

The month of March set several new records. Over 90 periodicals were borrowed for home use, and a record number of 528 books were circulated on March 23.

Six new titles were added to the police collection, bringing the number of books to 20. This is part of the library's policy of adding books and other library materials to meet adult needs for professional and self-improvement.
