

Board of Education Cites Reasons For Needing New School

The Clark Board of Education went under fire last week as Clark residents shot questions at the members concerning the proposed new school building. The public meeting was held at Charles Brewer School, and close to 75 townspeople attended the slide presentation and talk.

To accommodate the 3100 pupils expected to attend school in 1968-69, the Board has proposed a new school on the Mildred Terrace site along Brentwood Rd. It will have 12 classrooms, a cafeteria, library, gymnasium, a health room, a garage for a bus, two station wagons and snow equipment, and a wing (equivalent to two classrooms) housing 14 personnel members pre-sently scattered in all five schools. They include the Superintendent of Schools, the Board Secretary and Business Administrator, School Psychologist, Direc-

tor of Maintenance, etc.
In addition, the Board proposes a new gymnasium for Frank Hehnly School. Currently the school has an "all purpose" room serving as an auditorium, gymnasium, and lunchroom, but since state law requires 150 minutes of health and physical education per week, this has proved inadequate. All the other schools have two separate rooms for these three functions.

be put to a vote on May 16. The Board suggests building a new school on the site, rather than adding facilities to Mildred Terrace for several reasons. The most emphasized explanation for the need for a new school is that additions cost more per square foot than new

construction does.

Most importantly, though,
members said, is that by having two schools on that site, the Board would have the flexibility of separating the elementary school pupils from the seventh and eighth graders. And if, in future years, additional classrooms are needed for the elementary schools or the upper grades, they can easily be added.

C. Edward Hickey, the architect, displayed plans for the proposed building. Because of the slope on the property, the new school will appear as a one-story building from the street, but will, in reality, be a two-story building completely above ground. Mr. Hickey estimates that the school will cost \$20 a square foot, "but this is just an estimate. When the bids come in, there may be a difference.' (Mildred Terrace cost \$21.25 a square foot to build, but this included special provisions,

Robert Salvesen, president of the Board of Education, predicted that the new school should accom-modate the growing number of pupils through 1972. "In fact, if the Oakridge Golf Course remains a golf course, this should be the last school building built in town, although we may have to add some facilities to ex-

isting schools."

The meeting was turned over to questions from the floor and immediately, one citizen asked why Mildred Terrace, opened six months ago, was not built to accommodate the increased student population. Dr. Salvesen reminded his listeners that Mildred Terrace was originally proposed as a 32-room building, but that the proposal was defeated at the polls. A 20-room school was built instead, and at that time, the Board predicted that as soon as the building was completed, the town would need a new one. Generally, the town has a record of voting down long-range

building plans. Another citizen asked why more pupils were not added to the classes already operating. Dr. Carl Kumpf, Superintendent of Schools, explained that the State Board recommends 25 students per class. Currently, the average in Clark schools is 29 students, whereas some classes number as high as

One resident said that he read that the proposal would mean taxes would be increased \$1000 a year. Dr. Salvesen denied this figure and proclaimed \$13.16 as the more accurate cost. But, he warned, this was only an estimate and did not include increased salaries for the new school's staff. The new school will have to have its own vice-principal, teachers and custodial staff.

The Board was questioned on the feasibility of building an office wing to the new school. Dr. Salvesen said that they have looked into office buildings in town, but none were adequate. The old Abraham Clark building would require a complete renovation of its heating and plumbing facilities, costing up to \$80,000 Dr. Salvesen said, and this would not include the needed garage space. The office wing in the new school would be 3200 feet and would conform to office building regula-tions, which are less stringent than these for classrooms. Mr. Hickey explained that the space could never be turned over into permanent classrooms.

If the school referendum is not passed on May 16, Dr. Kumpf said that there is a possibility that the lower grades would have to go on double sessions. The last time the schools were on double session was in 1963-64 when first and second graders attended morning and afternoon classes.

Clark Library Surges Ahead

Use of the Clark Public Library for the first quarter of 1967 increased over the same quarter last year, according to a progress report written by Edward Temkin, Library Director. The tally shows that circulation jumped 31.1%, assistance to readers went up 16.1%, and attendance made a 13.2% gain. Adult circulation continued to increase at a much higher rate than children's.

The month of March set several new records. Over 90 periodicals were borrowed for home use, and a record number of 528 books were circulated on March 23.

Six new titles were added to the police collection, bringing the number of books to 20. This is part of the library's policy of adding books and other library materials to meet adult needs for professional and selfimprovement.

The library was also the meeting place for a six-week Reference Workshop for librarians and library assistants who have had no experience in reference work. Library employees from three New Jersey counties
