

The Mayor was castigated for allegedly forming a committee for political purposes.

"It should be noted that the committee is a bipartisan group which is evidenced by the respective resumes of each committee member," Mr. Gordon said.

The committee is comprised of William Jones, President of the Southwest Civic Association; John O'Hare, past president of the Clark Taxpayers Association; Michael Ginesi, a prominent local contractor; Robert Taylor, an executive with Morey LaRue Laundry; Fred Wray, currently President of the Clark Jaycees, who has been active in local civic organizations and Mr. Gordon, a local businessman who has served on various local and civic committees.

"The Mayor recognized the need for additional re-

presentation at a County level in order to insure Clark's fair share of the County tax dollar. Several local pending improvements which have been detained for a number of years such as Central Ave., Madison Hill Rd., and Pumpkin Patch Brook, will become a reality in the near future. These, and other projects, are being discussed daily with the County Engineer," Mr. Gordon said in emphasizing the need for a liaison group.

Stonewall Plans Colonial-Style Raritan Road Office

A.F. Krutzner, Jr., President of Stonewall Savings and Loan Association, announced the start of a new colonial building to house the branch office in Clark. Dan McCarron and Son, general contractor, and Mel Silberstein architect for the new building cooperated on the Linden Office located at 701 N. Wood Ave. Mr. Krutzner said that it's anticipated that the new building will be ready for occupancy this November.

Mr. Krutzner said that the Board of Directors, realizing that the present Clark Office located at 1083 Raritan Rd. had outgrown its present quarters, authorized the purchase of the building site diagonally across the street. With three acquisitions during the past five years, the lot has a frontage of 175 ft. and a depth of more than 300 ft.

The new Colonial-style, pillared building will provide

a friendly atmosphere and enable Stonewall to expand its services to Clark residents, the President said. With dimensions of 60 by 35 ft. there will be about 2,300 sq. ft. of space on the main floor. In addition to off-street parking, drive-in and walk-up windows will be added. Service will be increased by extending the business hours to 6 p.m. daily and 9 p.m. on Fridays at the drive-in window. Both walk-up and drive-in windows will be open until 12 noon on Saturdays.

Mr. Krutzner also said that a public meeting room in the basement will be available to civic groups and non-profit organizations after 6 p.m. A separate entrance is being built for this room to allow local organizations to make reservations and use the meeting room independent of banking hours.



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



A newspaper clipping from a 1927 issue of Hospital News has been discovered in the hospital files. It reproduced a prize-winning essay by Margaret E. Sadler of St. Paul's Episcopal School as follows:

"WHY RAHWAY NEEDS A NEW HOSPITAL"

"In days that are long since past the sick were uncared for and neglected. There were few good doctors, no nurses trained for the work, and no hospitals. Now we have systematized a method for the care of suffering people. We are very happy in the city of Rahway today because we are just beginning the big task of building a new hospital. Since the city has increased in population and since so many people are driving cars there is, of course, a large percentage of accidents which need the medical care that can only be properly given in a hospital.

"Our present building is not large enough to give the required service, nor has it been equal to the task

"The present hospital is in what used to be a private house. There is no elevator; patients have to be carried to and from the operating room. In order to have light, the operating room has been placed on the top floor and patients still under ether have to be carried down a long, steep stairway - surely not a very safe arrangement. There is no upper porch for sick people to enjoy, away from the street, where people passing cannot stare at them.

"The big reason why a larger hospital is very necessary is that Carteret, Woodbridge, Avenel and Clark Township simply must use the Rahway Hospital for the good reason that they have no hospital of their own and cannot afford to build one.

"Any one of us might at some time need to use the hospital; THEREFORE, every citizen should do his or her part to erect a new hospital. The most necessary of all public buildings is a good hospital; it is open to rich and poor.

"There are some wonderful workers in Rahway, the ladies of the Hospital Auxiliary, who make bandages and other things for the use of the doctors and nurses; they also help by giving a large minstrel show each year, in which well known people take part to try to make funds for the hospital.

"There were no hospitals before Our Lord came and He said: 'Whatsoever ye would that men should do unto you; do ye even so unto them.'
