





I believe that the creation of county boards of health would be a waste of the taxpavers' money and an invasion of home rule. Many small municipalities like the Township of Clark that are well managed would be forced to join and become members of the larger city units whose poor manage-ment has long been apparent if Assembly Bill 783 is adopted.

A previous attempt was made under Senate Bill =14 (State Health Act of 1966) whereby grants were made to local units merging under one health unit. However, Assembly Bill 783 seeks to do by force what Senate Bill 14 failed to do by offer of money.

I therefore strongly urge that this Bill be officially opposed by the Municipal Council of the Township of Clark and that a resolution to this effect be adopted.





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

Softball will be included for the first time in the coming Pan American Games in Winnipeg.


