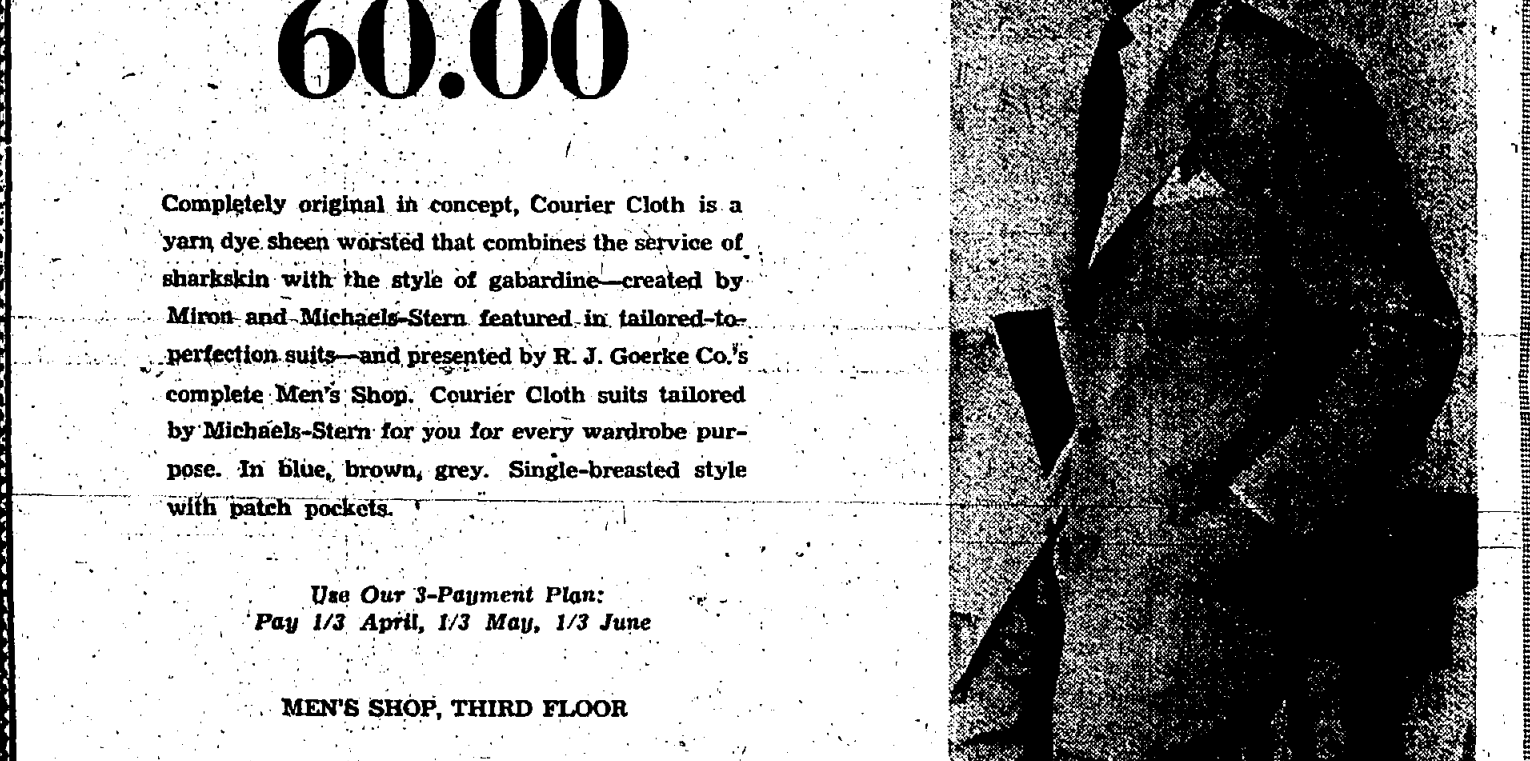

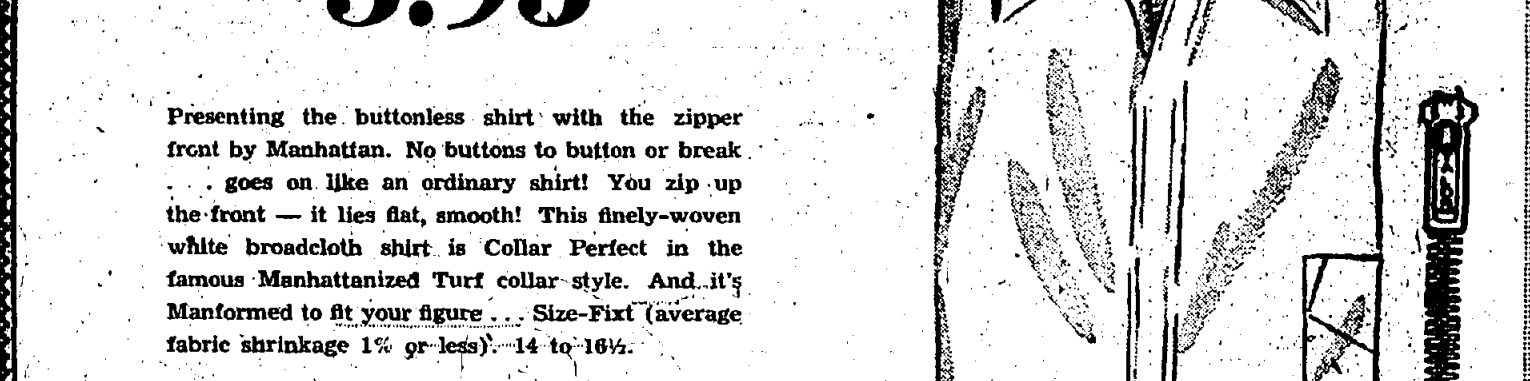

Date to Remember

March 31, a week from tomorrow, is a date for motorists to remember.

For those who want to operate motor vehicles after that time, 1950 license plates, registration cards, and driver licenses will be required. Many motorists have already taken care of the matter, but many others have not.

Beginning April 1, any New Jersey driver found operating a motor vehicle without this state's 1950 plates and credentials will be subject to arrest and trial on a charge of violating the law.

Motorists who wait until the last day or two this month to comply with the statute are likely to find themselves in long lines at a motor vehicle agency office and complaining because of the time they must waste waiting.

The wise motorist will find a way to pay a visit to the motor vehicle agency office NOW in order to avoid the last-minute rush and inconvenience.

Here in Cranford, where the agency office is operated by Harry R. Heins at 17 North avenue, east, motorists may get their plates, drivers licenses, and registration cards during the regular hours in effect for the month of March: from Mondays through Fridays between 9 a. m. and 6 p. m. The Saturday schedule calls for the office to be open between 9 a. m. and 12 noon.

A little planning early will save wasted time later.

Dear Sir: I read me to note the adverse reaction to Cranford's proposed parking meters. Not that this reaction is not a barrier to make this trip less attractive. Bus schedules become slower or more difficult to meet. Because Elizabeth and other towns red-light themselves from the frying pan into the fire, must we blindly follow? If you seem an unthinking robot, you would need controls at every intersection. If we behave like unthinking (and speechless) robots, we may get free from the unnecessary traffic signals which are the bane of the motorist's existence. Now it seems to follow the lead of so many small towns which apparently felt, like a reckless officer, that their importance or prestige would somehow be increased in relation to the amount of interference they could cause to traffic flow.

Traffic regulations and signals should expedite traffic, not impede it. Where interesting traffic is heavy enough to cause frequent jams and delays, a light will assist traffic flow. Otherwise it is itself an impediment, destroys respect for traffic rules, and invites violations. It is not a cure for traffic problems. A few days after Cranford's new lights were installed, an article by a safety expert in metropolitan papers pointed out that traffic lights were installed in an area where they were not needed, and that they were a source of danger to motorists and pedestrians into a false sense of security, and that they were a source of danger to motorists and pedestrians who violate other rules may also disregard light signals. Many accidents have been noted because of accidents they would not have had.

"Nobody will argue that all traffic signals are unnecessary. No one should argue that necessary signals are good, any more than unnecessary regulations or unnecessary taxes. For a traffic signal is a tax. Three or four feet as much as a home, and electric power and maintenance is a substantial yearly cost. But unlike the parking meters which tax the motorist to repay the town, the traffic signals tax him both individually and collectively, in time, gas, stop-and-go maintenance, and on his property tax bill. The cost to motorists and truckmen is far greater than any visible cost, for such unwaranted traffic lights. Particularly in icy weather do these lights create artificial bottlenecks.

The light at Walnut and Lincoln avenues was unjustified by the traffic flow, and was allowed over state highway minimums only by a log-rolling—a "triumph" for loyal to France first and Moscow second. Probably no other government official ever had to wait more than the thirty seconds for traffic to clear French Embassy in New York, this intersection. YOUR GARDEN This Week

By FRED D. USMAN
 County Agricultural Agent

The influence of soil temperature on the growth of plants is a well-known fact. Normally, for example, tend to start active root growth when the soil temperature is above 40 degrees.

If the air is warm, top growth may start. This happened this year, before the latest cold snap. It is advisable to prune roses before they make top growth.

This year the pruning should be done rather promptly. There is always the possibility of a drop in temperature low enough to freeze the tops after they are pruned, but we shall have to take a chance.

This high soil temperature has had an effect on the growth of bulbs. In January I saw a snow-drip that had been picked in the garden a week or so ago. I saw a whole group of crocus that had bloomed, only to be killed back by frost. These were in a favored situation, near a house foundation facing south.

In the open garden, leaves of narcissus and tulips are 2 or 3 inches above ground. When these bulbs develop normally the leaves stretch up, but the flower bud remains pretty well down in the bulb. These were in a favored situation, near a house foundation facing south.

However, if you are fearful we suggest a light mulch of straw, or if you have them evergreen boughs, put on when the soil is cold. This will help to retard the growth.

Whatever mulch is put on should be loose to allow air to circulate and to admit light. If mulch is too deep or dense, the result will be that the new green leaves may become yellow. That will mean more careful treatment later.

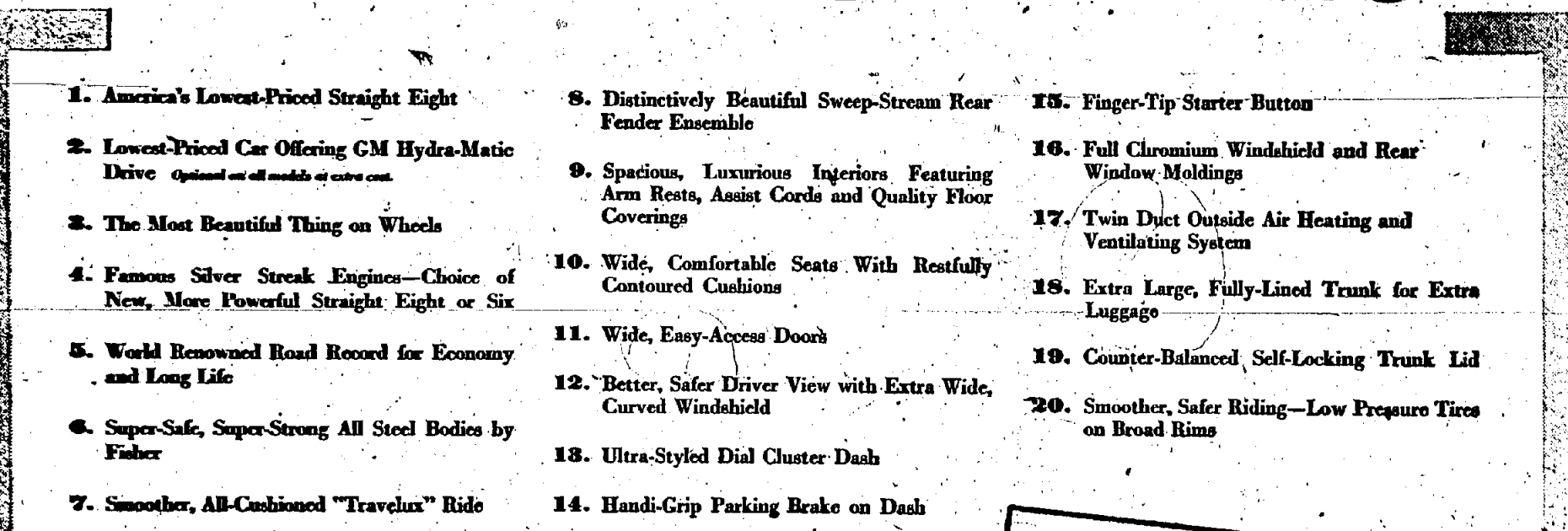

Thought for the Week

By the Rev. Frank V. R. Carthy, Rector, Trinity Church
"IS LEVY NECESSARY?"
"To everything there is a season and a time to every purpose under heaven. . . ."
Many many education has advanced; we know more about more things than our fathers knew. But knowledge is not the same thing as wisdom and whether we are wiser than our fathers is doubtful. Many customs have come down to us hallowed by the wisdom of ages, and we may be quite sure that whether they appear to us or not there is good reason for their observance. Lightly to dismiss these customs is unwise. The Church is an ancient foundation and in the course of its long history it has accumulated much knowledge of human nature. Its rules and customs are the result of considerable experience of man's needs and failings.
One of the oldest Christian Church rules is that of Lenten observance. The word "Lent" derives from an old English word meaning "spring," and it may be said that Lent is a spring-cleaning of one's religious life. Of course, this may be done any time but we know that Lent is a time for serious reflection. The familiar saying "there's a time for everything," has truth, and the Church has fasted the 40 days preceding Easter for special observance. Just as the athlete needs the eight months of training from meat and luxurious foods, but if it were only that, Lent wouldn't mean much to many of our brethren in the world for whom life is presently a continuous fast.
Lenten observance means "something more" that matters where religion is concerned. In addition to fasting, Lent asks us to mark self-examination, amendment of life, prayer, and almsgiving as rules. This is not to be taken as a time for public display, a well-kept Lent will mean more frequent public worship, more time in private prayer and serious reading. Many of us live in a whirl of engagements, business, and amusements. Some are afraid of their own company; they must be entertained. The inner life of the spirit is starved.
I believe that there can be no solution of world problems which does not take account of spiritual values, we must also realize that the subtle needs of the spirit are often more important than the physical needs of the body. Lent does help us clarify our beliefs and leads us to lives of greater purpose.

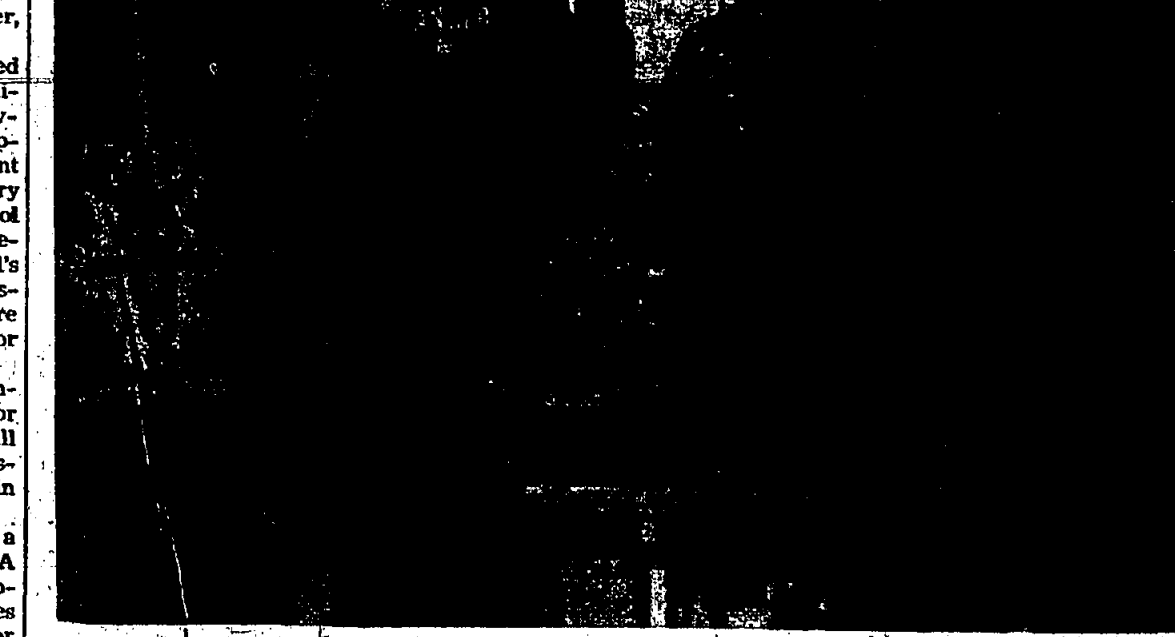
