

### Post Office Receipts Up \$7,000

Postmaster's Fiscal Report Discloses \$138,520.15 Income

Except for a slight dip in the final quarter of the fiscal year ending last Saturday, sales at the Cranford Post Office surpassed, in each quarter, receipts of last year for a total increase of almost \$7,000. Postmaster Arthur F. Metz revealed Tuesday.

Receipts from June, 1950, to last were \$138,520.15, while in the previous year, the post office took in \$131,673.56.

Postmaster Metz said the March-April total receipts were nearly \$1,500 lower than in the same two months in 1950, because of the loss of some permits, or non-renewed mail by the local post-offices.

General stamp sales have risen correspondingly, the postmaster added, offsetting somewhat the loss incurred by reduction of the permit mail. He explained that non-renewed mail is usually by private concerns to centralize periodic mail output.

Last year's total, an increase of \$10,000 more than in the 1948-49 fiscal year, also was recorded as a new high, and attributed by the postmaster to increased influx of industry to the area.

Greater increases of quarterly sales were during the period ending December 30, which included the national Christmas campaign in retail business. This year, sales amounted to \$46,228.80 from September to December, or \$5,524.94 greater than the 1950 receipts of \$40,703.86 for the same period.

For the first fiscal quarter, receipts were \$37,118.76, or \$2,803.82 more than sales for the same period of the previous year, or \$2,215.14. In the third quarter, ending March 31, this year, sales were \$32,209.34, or \$800.19 more than 1950 sales of \$31,409.15.

### Cranford's First Directory Issued Half Century Ago

Cranford's first street, house and business directory was issued just half a century ago, in recognition of the fact that Cranford has outgrown the condition of a hamlet in which each resident has at his tongue's end the name, home and occupation of every fellow townsmen. When it is stated that the township's population exceeds 3,000, it becomes apparent that there is a field of usefulness for a work of this character.

This was the introduction which appeared on page 3 of the 56-page paper bound directory published in November, 1901, by the Cranford Chronicle. The booklet is now the property of Tim Collector A. B. Caldwell, who long ago has been a collector of old newspapers.

Fifty years ago, Cranford was governed by a three-man Town Committee with J. C. W. W. Frank serving as chairman and W. F. Hall as clerk. Mr. W. Frank, R. C. Plume was president of a nine-member Board of Education.

The township's police force numbered two men—E. J. Blumenthal and A. J. Hennessy—while in the fire department F. W. Wood was the only fireman and A. F. W. Wood was the only fireman.

Incomplete surveys indicate that today there are 546,000 children and adults in the United States who were born with cerebral palsy, and each year 10,000 more babies are born cerebral palsied. The average is one every 33 minutes.

Added to this, there are inestimable hundreds of thousands of adults of all ages who became victims of the dread disease as a result of severe illness, strokes, automobile and industrial accidents.

This age-old, mysterious malady, which has been a curse to man since biblical times, results from injury to the "motor section" of the brain. When this section of the brain is injured, the inevitable loss of muscular control, the terrible trademark of the disease, sets in.

The large majority of persons afflicted with CP have normal to superior intelligence and practically all the cerebral palsy can be aided through proper diagnosis, treatment, care and education.

However, facilities in the United States exist for proper treatment of only four out of every 100 children. And an estimated 504 of Union County's children have cerebral palsy.

This is where you, the people of Cranford and Union County, come in. A start in the battle to provide the tools to treat victims and find a cure for the dread disease has been begun. But much more remains to be accomplished. It cannot be done without funds.

Cerebral palsied persons have been ignored and misunderstood for centuries. Left to live out their broken lives in insane asylums in many cases; when they were mistakenly considered feeble-minded. They need and deserve the assistance of trained personnel, working with the tools of modern science.
