

Hoag Only Mounted Cop In County

A former Cranford man has the distinction of being the only mounted policeman in Union County.

Now a resident of Berkeley Heights, "Patrolman" Charles S. Hoag of the Union County Park Police covers about 30 miles of trails and open fields of the Watchung Reservation.

Patrolman Hoag is a native of Cranford, N. J., but spent 1948 after residing here since 1936.

It is the job of the 35-year-old patrolman to guard the safety of horses and riders, which includes riding trails and peaks to guard against abuse to horses and wild game, being in charge of the horse and rider safety program.

While serving for six years with the Essex Troop, a pre-war cavalry unit based at Westfield Army Reservation, Hoag learned to ride and entered Federal service as a sergeant in 1941.

The former Cranford man has been on the park force for ten years and served as a motorcycle policeman until he was assigned to mounted duty. He joined the park commission after being employed as a maintenance man for E. C. Post, a local contractor.
