Cranford High School's varsity basketball team lost its first place standing in the Watching Conference as it dropped its first conference game, 54-52, in a last-minute "surprise" to the Rams of Roselle High Tuesday in the CHS gym.

It was sweet revenge for the Abraham Clark cagers, who over the past five years had lost 13 straight contests to Cranford teams. The Cougars led until the early part of the fourth quarter when four consecutive foul shots tied it up for Roselle at 41 all. With less than 30 seconds to be played Cranford behind by one point, Reggie Smith made two from the foul line to put Roselle ahead by three. A field goal by Talafiero and a free throw by Ed Jones of Roselle brought the game to its final score.

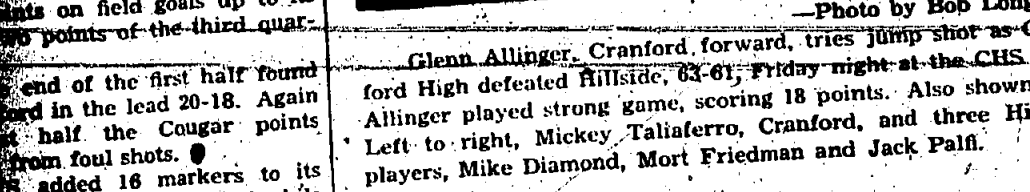

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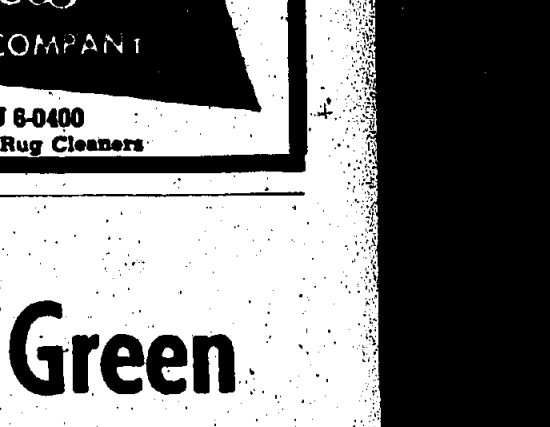

Winter's Worst Weather Still to Come

This week's snowfall was hardly deep enough to cause any great inconvenience, but there was enough of it to serve as a warning that, although we have been fortunate thus far, we're bound to wake up one of these mornings soon to find things covered with a deep blanket of that traffic-snarling white stuff.

But no matter how complete its preparations or how prompt its start in attacking snow removal problems, the Public Works Department invariably finds its work slowed up by inconsiderate motorists who have left cars parked overnight in the streets or municipal parking lots.

It's probably a good thing we received a warning at this time, for the relatively mild and storm-free weather we have had thus far may have lulled some into a false sense of security. We would do well to remind ourselves right now that the worst of our winter weather is still ahead of us.

One of the most important contributions local motorists could make toward easing community tribulations when the snow flies in earnest would be to refrain from parking cars overnight in the streets or municipal parking lots between now and the end of March.

Your Public Works Department, under guidance of Township Engineer Patrick J. Crall, has made all possible preparations to cope with the expected storms and has a weather eye out at all times so that street-clearing and snow-removal operations may get under way promptly when conditions warrant.

UIC Offers Two More Courses in Chemistry

In response to demand, Union Junior College will offer two additional courses in chemistry during the evening session of the Spring Semester beginning Tuesday, January 31, according to an announcement made today by Dr. Kenneth C. McKay, president.

The courses are quantitative analysis, with laboratory work in gravimetric and volumetric analysis, designed especially for pre-dental, pre-medical, chemical and engineering students, and introductory chemistry, covering the study of principal metallic and non-metallic elements and their compounds, with emphasis on descriptive chemistry.

The quantitative analysis instructor will be Dr. Elford S. Durbin of the department head at Merck and Co., Inc., Rahway. Dr. Durbin, a former instructor at the University of Maine, received his bachelor of arts degree at Clark University and his master of arts and doctor of philosophy degrees at Princeton University.

Instructing introductory chemistry will be Dr. Elford S. Durbin of 200 Oak Lane, who is employed as a chemist with the Celanese Corporation, Summit. A graduate of Union Junior College, he taught as a graduate fellow at Princeton University and the University of California. He received his bachelor of chemical engineering at Cooper Union and his master of arts and doctor of philosophy degrees at Princeton.

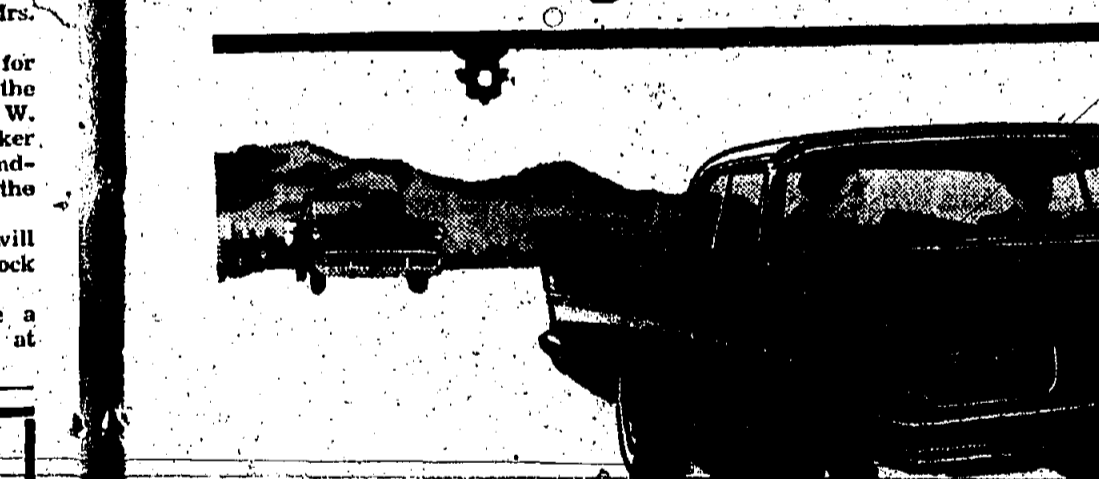

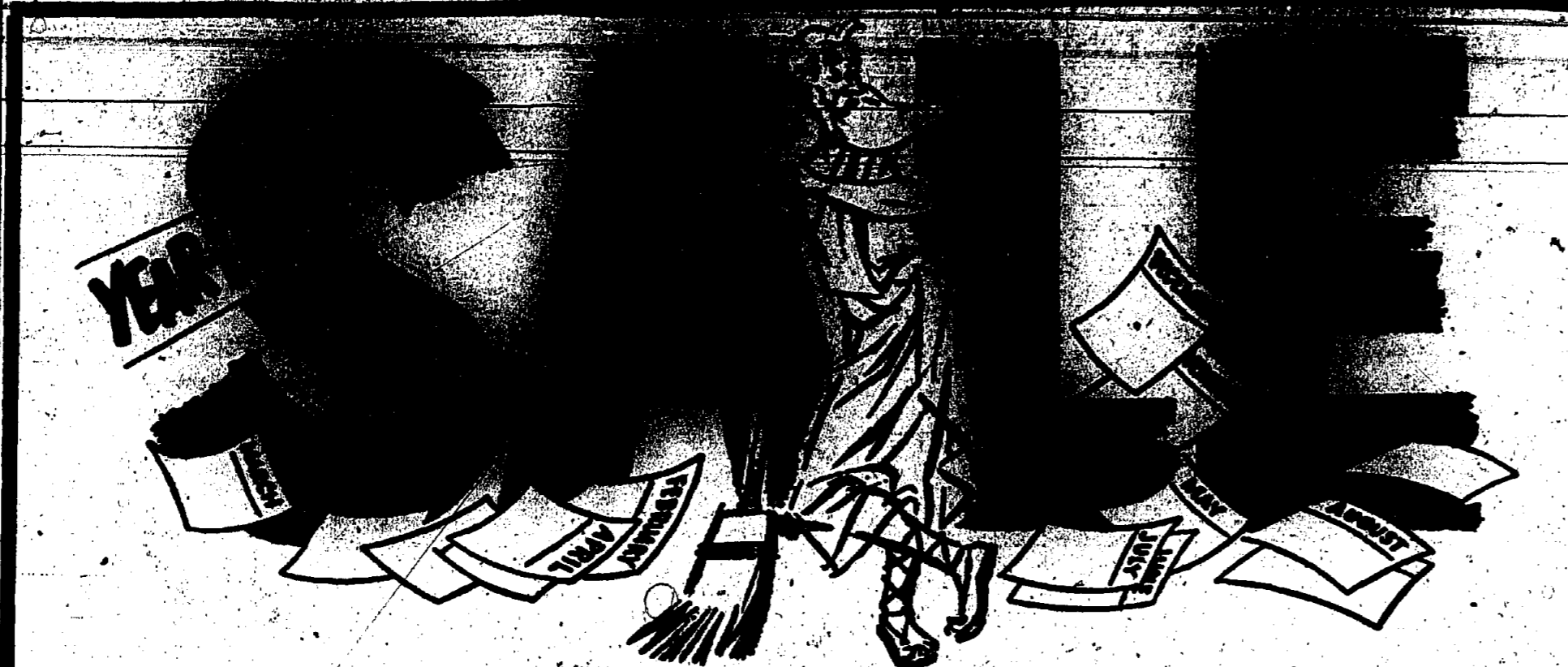

Coordinating Group Named for Town Plan

A special committee to coordinate the recommendations of Community Planning Associates, Inc. of Princeton for the rehabilitation of the business center was appointed Saturday morning at the reorganization meeting of the Planning Board in the Municipal Building.

Township Engineer Patrick J. Grall and Howard M. Siegel were named members of the special committee, and a third member will be announced at a later date.

This group, it was said, will work with other groups in the community to endeavor to carry out the recommendations made by the Princeton planners several weeks ago following a three-month study of the business center.

E. Duger Reeves was reelected chairman and Mrs. Jacob Zarecky was named secretary of the Planning Board. John L. Blach was named alternate chairman.

Mr. Grall, Public Affairs Commissioner Ira Dorian and Mr. Reeves were appointed members of the minor sub-division committee.

A vacancy on the committee, caused by the resignation of Donald R. Creighton, new township attorney, is expected to be filled at next Tuesday's meeting of the Township Committee. Mr. Creighton will attend all meetings of the Planning Board in his new capacity as township attorney.

New Optical Tooling Plant Opening Here

To expand its production of precision equipment for optical tooling, the Keuffel and Esser Company is opening a new factory at 42 North Avenue, East.

The new plant was constructed by the Keuffel and Esser Company, which has been operating in the sixth and final building on the North Avenue industrial tract near the Garden State Parkway which has been developed during the past two years.

Estimated building cost at the time the permit was issued here last September for the building was \$45,000.

The Cranford plant will be the sixth modern factory that Keuffel and Esser has added to its manufacturing facilities during the last few years.

The 100-year-old engineering company maintains its general offices and largest factory at Hoboken. Branch plants have been previously established at Cape May Court House and Chatham, N. J., and at New York, N. Y., Lakeville, Conn., and Kennebunk, Me.

Optical tooling, which started in aviation with the alignment of the huge jet used to make airplane wings, has been successfully used in the fields of atomic energy, electronics, guided missiles, building construction, shipbuilding, stationary power plants, automobiles, and quality control, as well as for basic research. Cranford's new plant will be used for the production of optical instruments for many industries and for military purposes.

Schools' Budget Rises \$259,840

A tax rate of more than 37¢ per \$100 assessed valuation this year for Cranford appeared a certainty today with the Board of Education's announcement of approval of a tentative 1957-58 school budget of \$1,758,024, up \$259,840 from the current figure. The increase for school purposes will be about 70 points.

The increase in the amount to be raised by taxation is \$220,435, or a rise from \$1,537,589 for the current year to \$1,758,024 for the coming school year. Board members pointed out that the difference between these figures is the result mainly of state-source funds and increased balances from previous years.

Main factors in the increase are raising of salaries, provision for increased enrollment, debt service and other costs associated with the two new elementary schools and one school addition now under construction.

Public hearing on the budget was set by the Board at Tuesday night's meeting for 8 p.m. next Thursday in Cleveland School.

Teacher's salaries are increased in the budget by an average of \$500 per teacher. In the current budget, this amounts to about \$400 a teacher. Coincident with this, the board announced the salary range for teacher positions is to be set at \$1,800 to \$2,100. Corresponding changes are being made for other grade levels.

Total cost of increased salaries for teachers and other employees is \$105,635 under the proposed budget.

Provision for the estimated 7 percent increase in enrollment amounts to \$89,185. This is largely a matter of adding 15 new employees. Twelve of these will be teachers, the board announced.

Costs associated with the additional school construction now underway are \$68,531. The largest part of this, \$55,000, is for the payment of interest and amortization on borrowed funds.
