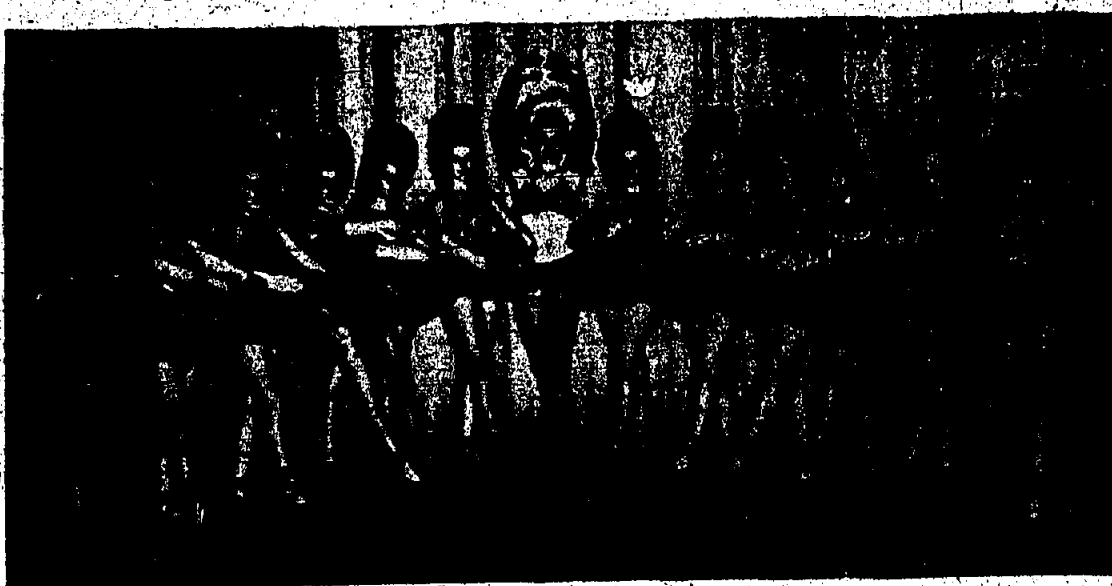


Lois Wicks Recital Here This Saturday

Youth Consultation Service Work Described for Guild

The work of the Youth Consultation Service in Union, Somerset, Middlesex and Monmouth counties was described by Mrs. E. C. Earhart at the regular meeting of Trinity Guild on Monday evening at the regular meeting of Trinity Guild in the guild room at the Shellock Hall.

The agency is a part of the nationwide Episcopal Service for Youth, Inc., which the church has sponsored for over 100 years. The local office, located at 84 Elm street, Westfield, was organized 30 years ago, and is staffed by an executive, a full-time case-worker and an office secretary.

Service is available to young people aged 12 to 26 who need help in solving their personal problems, without regard to race or religious affiliation. Mrs. Earhart said. The agency is able to handle up to 50 cases a month, with fees based on a sliding scale. However, the estimated cost of serving each case is \$120, the speaker said.

Mrs. E. M. Doran, retiring president of the guild, presented the report of the speaker, Mrs. E. C. Earhart, who conducted the meeting. Mrs. W. W. Kennedy, secretary, supply chairman, announced that she will provide members with wood to knit mittens, scarves and caps for mission parishes in northern Japan, to be taken by the Rev. Harry Hansen on his return to the mission field in August.

Judge Upholds Drunkometer Use in Township Case

Cranford's conviction of a Linden man on a charge of drunken driving based on use of a drunkometer has been upheld by County Judge John E. Barger.

Judge Barger fined Adam Wolf, 44, of Linden \$200 and revoked his driver's license for two years.

The county judge ruled that the drunkometer evidence in the case was admissible because he was satisfied the testing was done properly. He had ordered a demonstration of the device during the hearing.

In the demonstration, Police Sgt. Louis Guertin used a jar of diluted alcohol and a rubber bulb to simulate "alcoholic breath."

Wolf was arrested in Cranford on February 8, 1957, and was convicted by Magistrate Charles J. Stevens on March 23 of that year. John E. Barger, defense counsel, attacked the drunkometer readings, which indicated intoxication. "He argued that the device was not fully proven as a scientific instrument."

Judge Barger said the law permitted the use of other evidence in the case. He said the instrument was operated by trained technicians in accordance with outlined procedures. He added that he was satisfied this was the case.

There also was "considerable other evidence" to support the state's claim in the Wolf case, Judge Barger stated.

Famed British Explorer Replies To Student's Letter

Sir Edmund Hillary, noted British explorer, enjoyed traveling in the Himalayas more than in the Antarctic because there is a greater variety of scenery, and you meet so many interesting people in the mountains.

"It was very nice to receive a letter from you over a year ago, but as I have spent the last 12 months in the Antarctic, I have been unable to reply to you," Mr. Hillary wrote.

"It is quite a long way from Mt. Everest to the South Pole but living in the Himalayas is not a great deal different from living in the Antarctic. There is a lot of snow and ice in both places and, of course, the temperatures are fairly cold."

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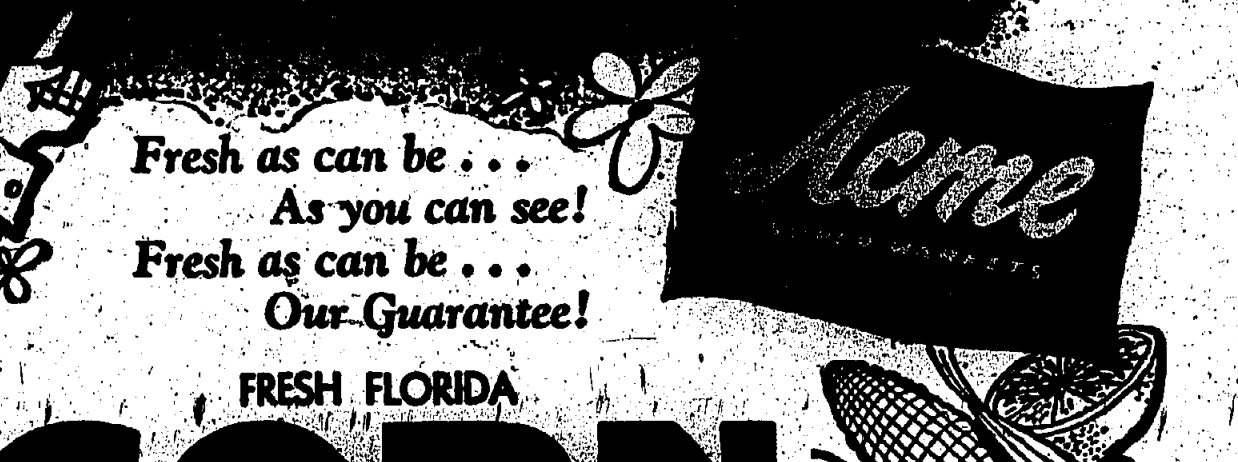
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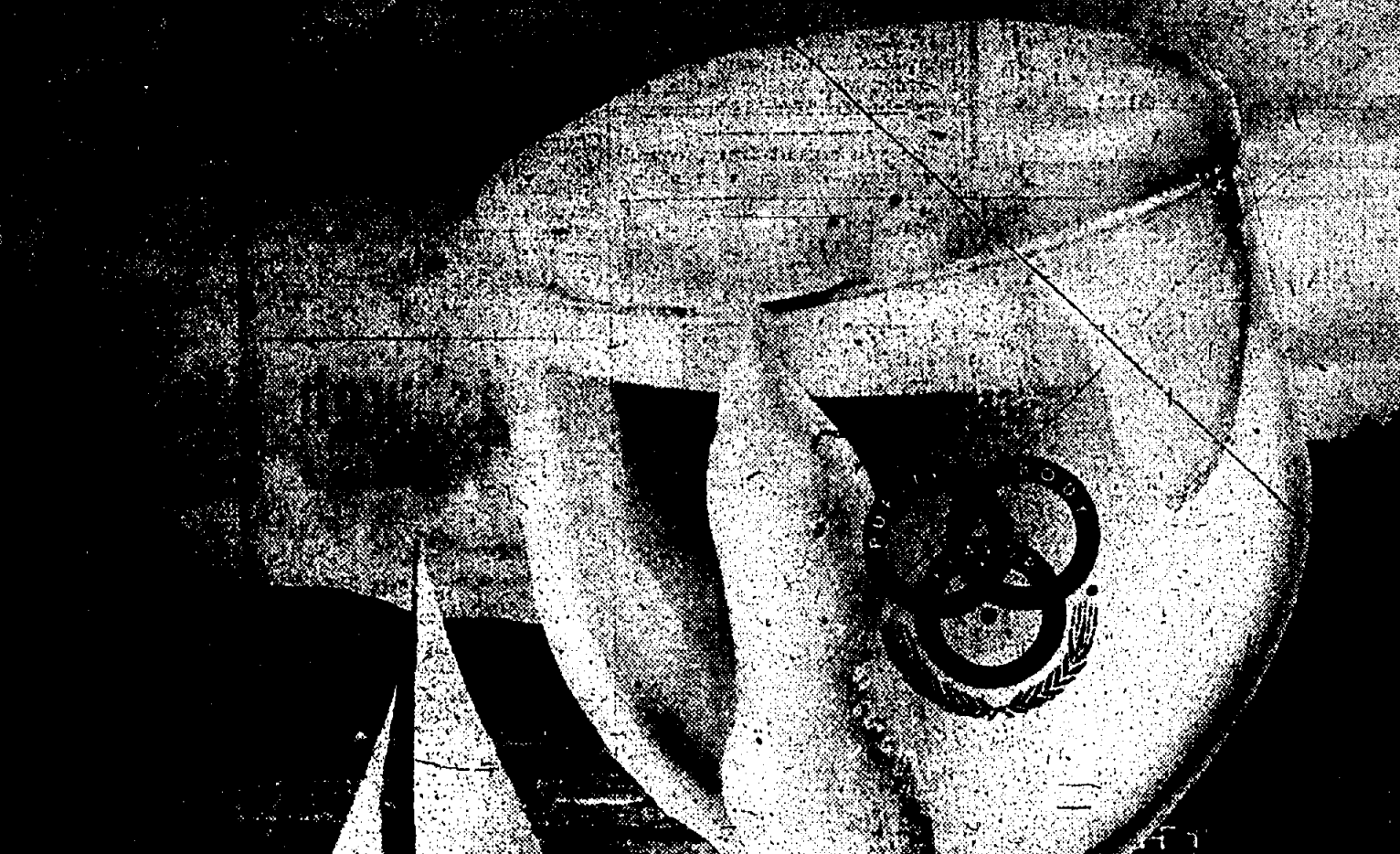
