

'New' Christmas This Year For Nursing Student at UJC

It will be a different kind of Christmas this year for Miss Cissy Wong, who arrived in this country in September from Hong Kong, China. A student nurse at Perth Amboy General Hospital, Miss Wong will be spending her first Christmas in the West. As part of her nursing training, she is attending classes at Union Junior College, her first taste of college life.

One of the major differences between the holiday season in Hong Kong and the observance here, Miss Wong said, is the weather. The British Colony, located on an island off the China mainland, has a moderate climate, with temperatures ranging from about 36 degrees one or two days a year to a summer high of 92.

Until arriving here, Miss Wong had never seen snow, which she described as "very pretty." There is a rainy season in Hong Kong, but no snow.

Although some people in Hong Kong exchange gifts at Christmas time, the Yuletide season is not generally a time for family get-togethers there as it is here. Instead, there are many parties, night clubs do a bustling business.

There is a Santa Claus—called by his Chinese name—but he does not hold court in department stores. Christmas trees are decorated by many families, but the custom is not as widespread as in this nation, Cissy reported.

However, despite the differences, there are many similarities. Cards are sent, people visit old friends, and even some Buddhist families have trees and exchange gifts.

Cissy plans to spend her first Christmas in America with friends of her family in New York. She is looking forward to enjoying the many pleasant aspects of Christmas—some familiar, some new and different—in the Western Hemisphere.

Born in Shanghai, Cissy moved with her family at the age of 10 to Hong Kong after several years in Canton and the Portuguese colony of Macao. She has never lived under Communist rule, having left the China mainland while Chou Kai-shek was still in control there.

In Hong Kong, she attended a school operated by the Anglican Church. This is called an "English school," because classes are conducted in the English language. There are also "Chinese schools," where the basic language is Chinese.

She described Hong Kong as a "crowded city," with thousands of refugees from Communist China living in cramped quarters. Conditions are slowly improving, however, she said, because a number of new apartment houses are being built and only persons with

Given if you move within the town. These permits will not be issued until all personal taxes are paid. No personal tax can be charged there until the following year.

"Permits are obtainable, with out charge, at tax collector's office. Moving without permit is punishable by a fine of up to \$50."

Victims are exempt from personal taxes up to \$500 worth of property, but they must obtain a permit to move. The tax collector's office has and have them filed with photostatic copy of discharge of the property.

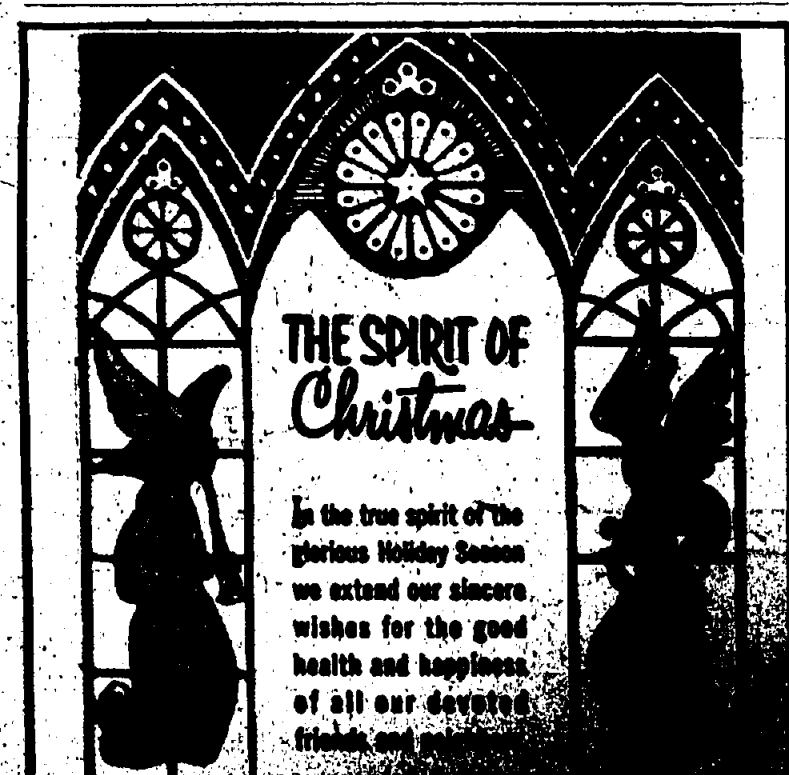

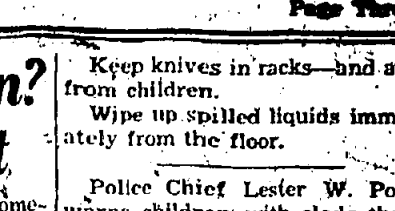
