Whether we can stomach it or not, the real fact of Christmasfrom man's side of it—is anything but beautiful. Behind it and looking at it from our perspective in 1958—before it lies a long history of man's disobedience and denial of God, his Creator Finally, God has no other recourse left to Him, loving us as intensely as He does, than to get into the world Himself. If only the rest of the story were that men received Him gladly. But they didn't, and we know this, too. And that has to be read into the Christmas story, which makes it even harder to bear. "Oh," but loday!" Wouldn't we? Speaking only for myself, I hope I am never put to the test. Perhaps the more realistic question is, "Aren't we?" There's little beauty in that! Of course, the exciting joy of it is that God did what He did

in spite of us. And because of His act in man's time we, miserable sinners, have hope. But, all glory be to God!
