Dramatic Club: Dream Into Reality

One of the community's most outstanding organizations passed another milestone yesterday, for it was on May 27, 1919, that a meeting was held here which resulted in the formation of the Cranford Dramatic Club.

The reasons behind the formation of the club and the aims which have been carried out with such success in the ensuing 40 years are set forth in the following historical sketch adapted from one written by the late Mrs. John W. Banker for use in the June, 1924, program of the club.

"Inspired by the success of an original play presented by the Wednesday Morning Club of Cranford, seven women organized in May, 1919, the nucleus of the present Cranford Dramatic Club.

They recognized that there was dramatic talent already evident in town and much latent talent that could be developed. They had a strong belief in the power of self-expression as a vital factor in growth and hoped also through the medium of drama to create an active community spirit which would include those of all ages and varied talents.

"The object of this organization met with that general approval that in October of that year, the association, greatly enlarged, began meeting monthly in the homes of its members. Each evening two short plays were presented, one read and one acted. The final meeting of the season was made guest night with the production of a three-act play in the Cleveland School.

"After one year's work the Dramatic Club had become assured of a firm foundation, owing to the generous service and much personal sacrifice on the part of many of its members supported by the interest of the whole club. The second year opened with a crowded membership, the standards of study and of artistic work raised and the scope enlarged.

"The entire work is amateur with no professional assistance. It should be added that unquestionably an important factor in the success of the plays has been the high order of accomplishment in the work of the many active members of the club. The ambition and policy of the club, while constantly striving for finer achievement in dramatic art, has been to discover and develop the talent of its members; this has yielded surprising and most encouraging results.

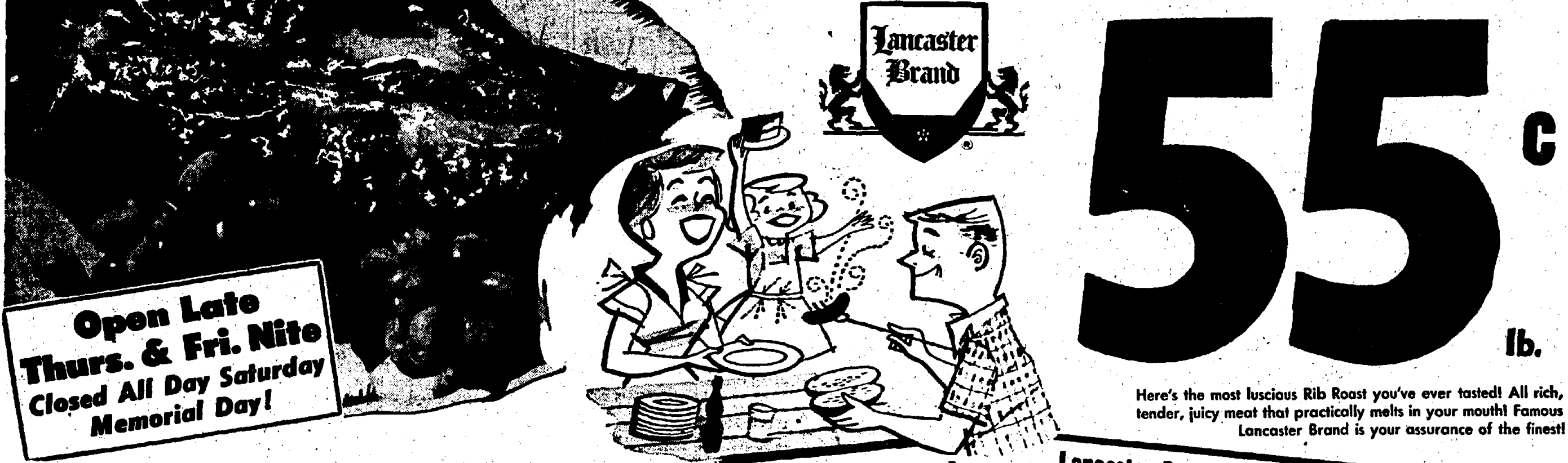
