(The growth of the state of California Oregon-California Trail.) After Texas became independent, attention was attracted toward the land west of the Rocky Mountains. These mountains which before contained only an occasional adventurous fur trapper and a few roaming Indian Tribes would soon see wagon trains by the scores crossing through

Oregon and California. Untouched for years by white men since the Lewis and Clark expedition, quick and thorough settlement was bound to happen once attention was drawn here. An exploit was made to California by John Fremont. which started much controversy over the settlement of the land west of the Rocky Mountains and helped to start the settlement of California by people who lived nearly 2,000 miles away. In spite of the fact that California belonged to Mexto at the time it was considered wide open and free for anybody to settle there.

Wagon Trains In 1841 a wagon train under the direction of John Bidwell, known as the "Prince of California" Pioneers," started out from Missouri to what was known as the promised land. The party suffered greatly from thirst, hunger, and the territic heat encountered on their journey, but despite this, they led the fundamental way for other wagon trains. In 1848 the Donner wagon train also journeyed to California, but unfortunately a division of the wagon train became trapped high in the Sierras during the winter. Many of them died before they were rescued by a party from a settlement in California. After Captain Fremont heroically raised the Bear Flag and proclaimed the Republic of California and after Polk announced to his Cabinet that Califormia was to be annexed, war broke out with Moxico. Although fighting in California was on a small scale our victories there were of certain importance. Scott's and Taylor's victories in Mexico ended the war and by a treaty with Mexico in 1848, California, Arizona, and New/ Mexico were coded and the annexation of Texas



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
