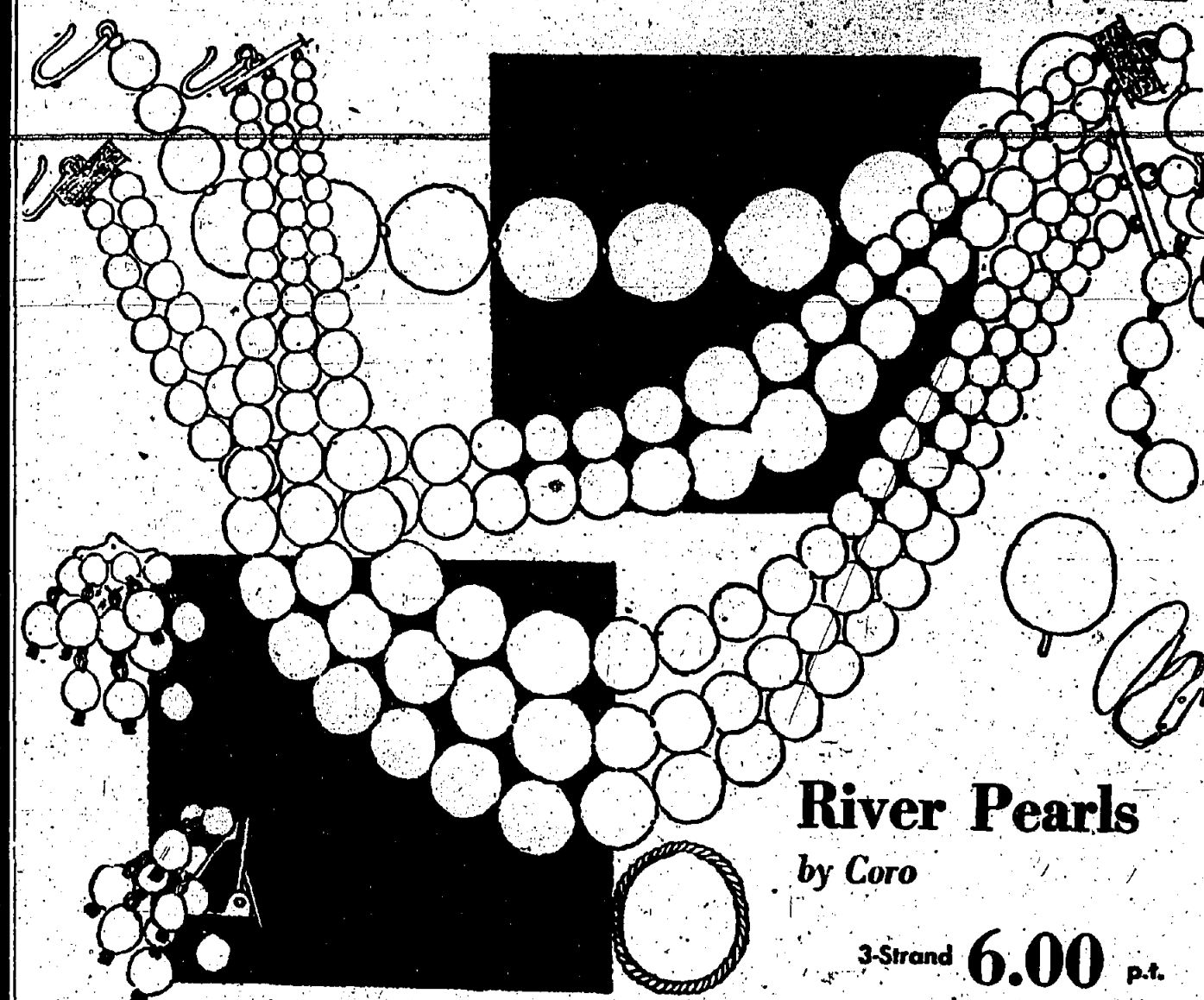

Detective Bureau Shift Condemned by Dorian

Mayor Ira D. Dorian sharply criticized the action of Police Chief Lester W. Powell in removing Lt. Ralph J. Koury as head of the department's detective bureau at Tuesday night's meeting of the Township Committee.

The matter came to the committee's attention when Charles Koury, 30 Burghfield avenue, made inquiry concerning rumors of a reorganization in the police department and asked whether Public Safety Commissioner Nicholas St. J. LaCorte would elaborate on the report.

Commissioner LaCorte stated that several reassignments had been made among the executive staff of the department which, in the opinion of the chief, would lead to a more efficient operation. He said no officer had lost any rank or money and that the reassignments were "merely a personnel move."

Following Mayor Dorian's statement, which appears in full in an adjoining column, and which was applauded by several residents attending the meeting, Commissioner LaCorte declared that "the matter had been thoroughly discussed and there was no reflection on Lt. Koury and no cause for turnover or gossip."

The committee held two conferences concerning the matter. It was made final on Monday night. Lt. Lawrence T. Bonnell, Sgt. Louis L. Gaurin and Sgt. Vincent L. Brinkerhoff also were re-assigned and no complaints were received from any of them, Commissioner LaCorte stated.

As a result of the shift, the committee said, Lt. Koury has been able to conduct in-service training courses for which he has been specially trained. He noted that several municipalities and police departments have been unable to do this.

One of the benefits of the in-service training program, he said, is to school policemen to know what they can and cannot do in line of duty.

Lt. Koury, the committee continued, has never questioned the right of Chief Powell to transfer him to other duties nor has he ever complained to the public safety commissioner.

"This is no reflection on any individual," Mr. LaCorte declared. "We have a good police department and we hope to keep it that way."

Mr. Koury asked whether Lt. Koury was being removed from the bureau of investigation, including criminal investigation. One of the benefits of the in-service training program, he said, is to school policemen to know what they can and cannot do in line of duty.

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"This is no reflection on any individual," Mr. LaCorte declared. "We have a good police department and we hope to keep it that way."

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Cost of Relief In Township Drops 40%

Net cost of relief in Cranford decreased 40 percent in 1959 according to the annual report of the Department of Public Welfare submitted to Mayor Ira D. Dorian and the Township Committee recently by John F. Kunze, director of welfare.

Disbursements during 1959 were \$91,518, the report reveals, and there were refunds from the state and other municipalities totaling \$4,509.82, leaving a net cost for the year of \$86,998.18. The figures for 1958 were: Disbursements, \$131,711.07; refunds, \$5,000.20; net cost of relief, \$126,710.87.

The 1958 total for expenditures handled by the department during 1959 were 101 cases involving 38 persons, as compared with the 1958 totals of 133 cases and 566 persons.

Largest factor in the decrease in relief costs was the decrease in the number of cases handled by the department. The 1959 figures show a decrease of 33 cases from 1958. The largest item was shelter, with a total expenditure of \$2,022 last year as compared with the 1958 figure of \$2,882.

Other expenditures last year were as follows: Fuel, \$193, compared with \$222.35 in 1958; clothing, \$1,042.47, compared with \$1,043.33; electric, \$128.75, compared with \$108.16, and scavenger service, \$162.55 (no expenditure in 1958).

Of the total, 156, 35 more than last year, are taking 14 advanced subjects including Algebra I and II, Plane Geometry, American History II, Latin I, French I and II, Spanish I, German I, College Biology, and Chemistry.

Other subjects being offered are: Mr. Zimmerman said the Driver Education course has an enrollment of 15, the maximum for the course.

Advanced credit subject classes meet the entire morning while regular or make-up classes meet two hours daily allowing enrollment in two subjects.

A total of 256 students are taking 321 regular or make-up subjects. Enrollment in personal use typing or reading climbed to 75 students, the principal reported.

Fellowship to Study Slovak Awarded UJC Instructor

Sevel Kendall of 1066 Helby street, South Plainfield, a modern language instructor at Union Junior College, has been awarded a one-year, full-time fellowship to study Slovak philology and linguistics at Stanford University, Stanford, Calif.

Mr. Kendall, who will study in Stanford's department of Modern European Languages, will be among the University's first students in a new doctorate program in the Russian language.

A graduate of the University of Chicago, Mr. Kendall taught off-campus Russian language courses for Union Junior College at Merck & Co., Inc., Rahway; Union Carbide Plastic Co., Leonards Brook, and the Warner-Lambert Pharmaceutical Co., Morris Plains. He also taught Russian at the University of New Brunswick.

At the conclusion of World War II, he established and directed seven DP camps in Germany and supervised the subsequent repatriation from these camps. Following his discharge from the Army, he joined the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration as a displaced persons supply officer.

Mr. Kendall joined the UJC faculty in 1938 to teach Russian. He also taught English and French undergraduate courses.

The Russian instructor studied Russian and Czech history and language at Charles University, Prague, Czechoslovakia, on an exchange fellowship.

While in Prague, he was arrested by local police on charges of espionage. American officials arranged his release and he returned to the United States.

Mr. Kendall also has studied at the University of Iowa under the Army's Specialized Training Program and at Columbia University.

An Army veteran of World War I, Mr. Kendall speaks French, German, and Czech as well as Russian and English. He previously was a member of the New Brunswick.

Show Flag Respect by Proper Display

In connection with the adoption of the new 50-star flag, which becomes official next Monday, Independence Day, and in response to several requests, we reprint herewith a resume of regulations for display and use of the flag by civilians contained in a booklet, "How to Display the Flag of the United States," made available by the Navy Recruiting Station at the Union County Court House in Elizabeth.

"It is the universal custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagstaffs in the open, but it should not be displayed on days when weather is inclement. The flag may be displayed at night upon special occasions when it is desired to produce a patriotic effect.

"The flag should be hoisted briskly and lowered ceremoniously.

"The flag should be displayed on all days when the weather permits; especially on national and state holidays and such days as may be proclaimed by the President of the United States. On Memorial Day, the flag should be half-staffed until noon.

"The flag should be displayed daily, weather permitting, on or near the main administration building of every public institution; during school days in or near every schoolhouse, and in or near every polling place on election days.

"No disrespect should be shown to the flag of the United States of America.

"The flag should not be dipped to any person or thing. Regimental colors, state flags and organization or institutional flags are to be dipped as a mark of honor.

"The flag should never be displayed with the union down save as a signal of dire distress.

"The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water or merchandise.

"The flag should never be carried flat or horizontally, but always aloft and free.

"The flag should never be used as drapery of any sort whatsoever, never festooned, drawn back, nor up, in folds, but always allowed to fall free.

"The flag should never be displayed with the blue above, the white in the middle and the red below, should be used for covering a speaker's desk, draping the front of a platform and for decoration in general.

"The flag should never be fastened, displayed, used or stored in such a manner as will permit it to be easily torn, soiled or damaged in any way.

"The flag should never be used as a covering for a ceiling.

"The flag should never have placed upon it, nor on any part of it, nor attached to it, any mark, insignia, letter, word, figure, design, picture or drawing of any kind.

"The flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying or delivering anything.

"The flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever. It should not be embroidered on such articles as cushions or handkerchiefs and the like, printed or otherwise impressed on paper napkins or boxes, or on anything that is designed for temporary use and discarded, or used as any portion of a costume or athletic uniform.

"Advertising signs should not be fastened to a staff or halyard from which the flag is flown.

"The flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning."

Well, you get the general idea. We think you will find all the "suggestions" are good ones if you follow them conscientiously - in reverse.

5 Years Ago
