Catholic civil rights league described to church society

At the 80th annual communion breakfast of the Holy Name Society of St. Michael's Church on May 20, Father Kenneth Baker, S.J., announced the formation of a national civil rights body, the Catholic League for Religious and Civil Rights, patterned after the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

The league was formed, now, Father Baker said, because indications of increasing religious discrimination are becoming more prominent in America.

He stated that to combat anti-Catholic action, regardless of the source, the league board members will employ all the methods acceptable to a democratic society - education, dialogue, negotiation and litigation.

Hearings switched back on

The state Public Utility Commissioners reopened hearings this week on the controversial construction of high-voltage transmission lines through Middlesex and Union counties, terminating at Cranford.

The Public Service Electric and Gas Co. proposal has met vigorous opposition from the dozen affected towns. Critics have cited potential dangers from the lines, and the aesthetic "eye pollution" of the steel towers.

PSE&G has stated that the lines will merely replace existing power transmission lines, and contends that burying the cables, as the critics propose, is too expensive. The cost would eventually be borne by the power company customers.

A spokesman for PSE&G estimated the cost of the overhead lines at \$15 million, but claimed that subterranean installation would cost \$85 million. Opponents dispute these cost figures.

The hearings are expected to continue throughout the summer.

Board discloses redistrict plan for grammar schools

In what was described as the first step to phase out Sherman and Cleveland Schools, the Board of Education yesterday announced the details of a partial redistricting plan for the 1973-74 school year.

The plan will affect 302 pupils. New district lines are shown in the accompanying map.

Enrollment in Cleveland School is expected to drop from 293 to 151 in September, while the student population at Sherman will decrease from 220 to 151 in the fall. Five of the other six elementary schools will gain in enrollment as students are shifted from Sherman and Cleveland Schools to other schools.

The Board of Education's redistricting plan for the elementary schools was criticized this week in a letter to board president George Stron from Mrs. Beverly Inchausti, president of the Association for Better Cranford Schools.

"The decision to keep Cleveland and Sherman open for another year necessitates the continued cost of their maintenance and operation of two schools which are grossly over-sized," she wrote.

In grades one through six there is now a ratio of one teacher to 23.3 pupils. This is expected to increase to an average of 24.4 pupils per class. Kindergarten class size is expected to drop from 23.5 to 22.3 children.

The number of classes exceeding the desired guidelines are 22 students per class at the kindergarten level, 25 in grades one through three and 27 per class in grades four through six.

It appears wasteful and unnecessary to discontinue fringe benefits of this additional space by vacating half of it at the same time, returning to a standard classroom use the additional special activities rooms which have accrued to other elementary buildings as a result of declining population," Mrs. Inchausti said.

She argued that four elementary schools will be limited to only one special activities room and Roosevelt will be left with no choice between providing a faculty room or an activity room.

As part of their study of the redistricting move, the board noted that elementary enrollment for the 1973-74 school year is expected to total 2,773, compared with a peak enrollment of 3,441 in 1964. By 1976-77 the student population is expected to level off at 2,600.

The board also contends that requirements for school facilities do not justify the expenditure of substantial dollars to rehabilitate Sherman and Cleveland Schools. There are, however, some questions.
