Flu Vaccine Here for High Risk People

The State Department of Health has released a supply of Bivalent (Swine Flu) Vaccine to the Cranford Health Department for distribution to nursing homes and physicians.

This vaccine is restricted to the immunization of high-risk category individuals with such chronic health problems as heart disease, respiratory diseases, kidney failure, diabetes, neuro-muscular disorders and malignancies, who are home bound or non-ambulatory.

High-risk children between the ages of 3 and 12 years receive their shots from their physicians because they must have two shots, four weeks apart, to develop sufficient immunity. The clinic can only provide one shot which would not be a complete series.

Physicians may call at the Cranford Health Department Office for the vaccine.

The Election

The victory Tuesday of Raymond S. Molnar assures Cranford residents of a conscientious and capable Township Committee representative to serve them over the next three years.

The election of the Democratic candidate to the committee to replace Mayor Daniel J. Mason, who did not seek reelection, will probably result in the selection of Miss Barbara Brande, also a Democrat, as the township's first woman mayor.

It is customary for the committee's political majority to name as mayor its senior member, the point of service, member, Democratic Committeeman Ronald Marotta, Molnar, and Miss Brande constitute the next committee majority, and of the three, Miss Brande enjoys seniority and deserves the honor.

THE GOOD JUDGMENT of the local electors who have chosen a township with a conscientious mayor and committee to serve at least until the charter study mandated Tuesday is completed and its recommendations are adopted.

Approval of the charter study to evaluate the alternative forms of government available to Cranford under the state's Faulkner Act provides an opportunity to determine whether the existing five-member Township Committee, township administrator structure meets the present needs of the town.

PRESENT PROMOTIONS are something less than standardized, and firm guidelines should be set for the Township Committee without delay. As long as the voters have decided to leave personnel control entirely in the hands of the committee, its members must be held to the same serious responsibility that is.

Now that the election is over the committee can return to its business without distraction. The 1977 budget must be prepared with a state-imposed spending increase "cap" of 5 per cent in effect, so total concentration and hearty effort will be required.

Y.E.S. Jobs

The Youth Employment Service has found 8,000 jobs for local teenagers since its inception in 1963, but lately the service's effectiveness has declined. From Sept. 1972 to Sept. 1973 over 700 jobs were found, but for the same period of 1975-1976 only 600 jobs were discovered.

In the past, homeowners have often asked for help with outdoor cleanups, tuning baby sitting and similar jobs, but during the recession they have begun to do these things themselves.

Another reason for the decline in available jobs is the fact that because a few workers have done a poor job, many people are reluctant to hire teenagers. As Mrs. Y.E.S. (teenagers) can do a good job. Actually less than 10 percent of the work is done unsatisfactorily, and over 75 percent of the work is done well.

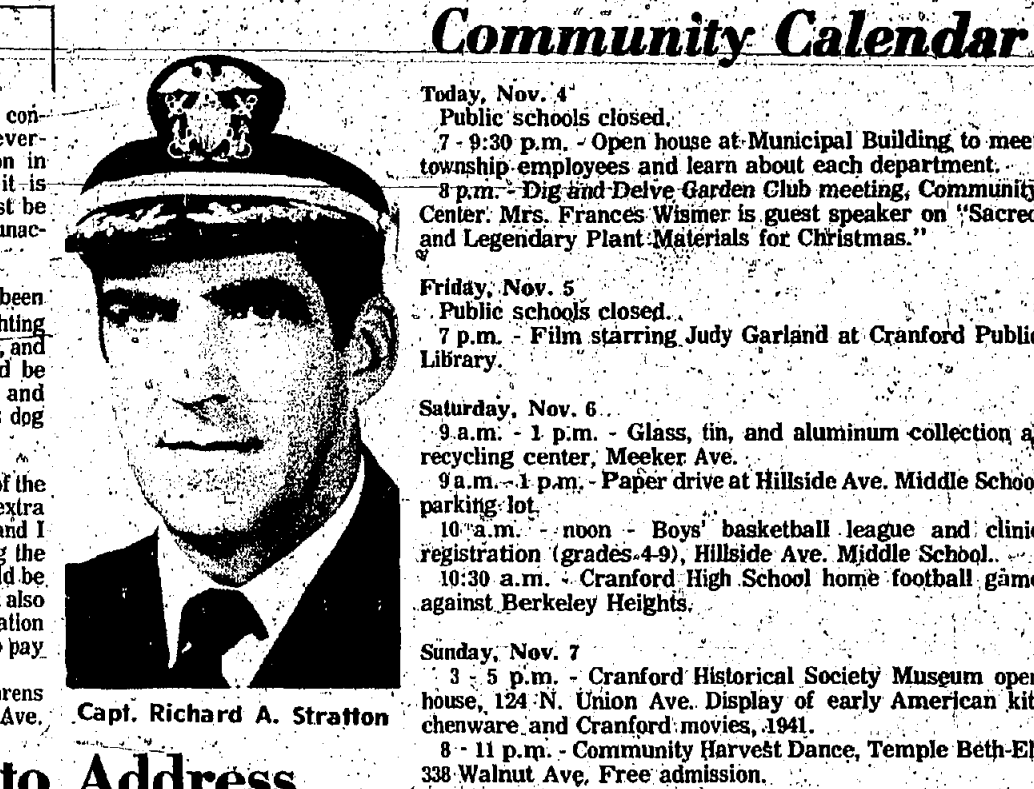

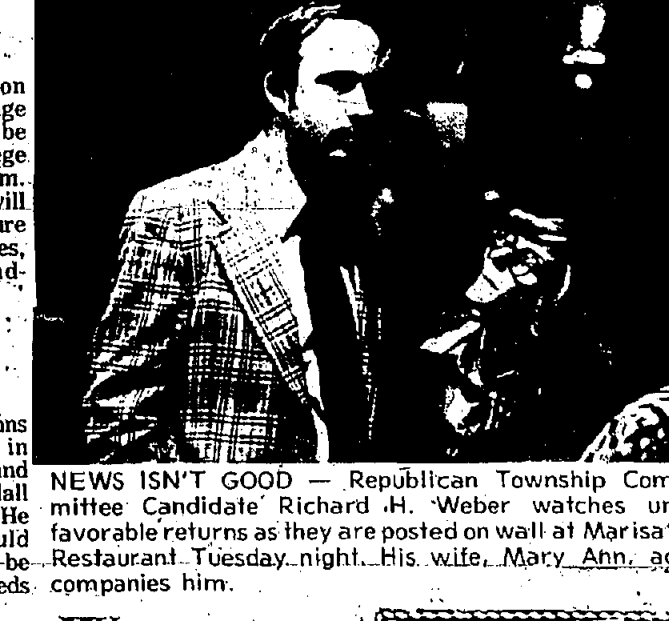
