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Town asks state to examine Boyle Midway waste disposal

The Township Committee has asked the state Department of Environmental Protection to investigate waste disposal at the Boyle Midway plant here. Ed Robinson, mayor, said in response to a question at this week's meeting, from Lewis Coe, a local attorney, that "we have contacted DEP and they're on their way. It's important that they come here quickly. We'll give them one more week, then intend direct action to bring them out quickly."

Gene Martino, public safety commissioner, said the impetus for the town's request came from an anonymous letter. Township officials said the letter allegedly detailing the presence of hazardous waste materials at the South Avenue plant site was received several weeks ago from a writer who claimed he worked there and had detailed knowledge about the situation.

John Bernardi, manager of the Boyle Midway plant, said yesterday that the firm uses toxic chemicals but "we think we are handling them properly." He said the plant is visited regularly by inspectors from various agencies including the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration and from the federal Environmental Protection Agency. He said he was unaware of the township's request for a DEP visit.

Mark Portney, Democratic candidate for Township Committee, suggested in late October that the government should look into the site and he and his running mate, Mary Lou Farmer, called for "a thorough environmental investigation of the site including test borings for hidden and illegal dumping of toxic waste."

This week Coe referred to Portney's statement and told the governing body that one of his clients who works at Boyle Midway and "is in a position to know what's going on" gave him a list of chemicals produced by the company. "I have reason to believe some toxic chemicals are to be found there," Coe

The three houses built by Santiago Porcella Sr. in the late 1890s still stand on Holly Street. In fact, all of the three houses were built by the same man — by a member of the Porcella family. Mrs. W. Porcella celebrated her 90th birthday last week and with it marked almost 70 years as a resident of Cranford in that house.

A slight woman, with clear eyes and a sharp mind, Mrs. Porcella has seen what has happened to the houses of Cranford. From the days when cars were a scarce sight on Cranford roads to the days when the sight of a modern day which she says is "kind of over sent," she has watched Cranford residents enjoy the river festivals of the past and the new ones that have been held out to 1955 before buying a television set.

Her husband, Santiago Porcella Jr., was born on Christmas Eve at 203 Holly Street which was occupied by a member of the family until its sale to Dr. Thomas H. Oesterheld.

Her husband served the Army. Mr. Porcella remembers the many who "paid the price of the war and then found themselves in a new world. The world was lucky," she says. "He was originally sent overseas but was sent back to attend to his mother. He knew it all right, but he didn't come back." Among the dead was Frederick Helms, son of former mayor John Helms, who was the next door neighbor of the Porcella's.

Cranford was a commuting town. The men had formed a certain type of organization and they had to travel into New York City on the train. Her husband worked for and eventually owned the Porcella Machine and Tool Co., a Vicini, an importing-exporting company, holding the post until he died in 1959. Her daughter-in-law, Betty, still lives in the house.

Another family of a former Cranford mayor were also friends of the Porcella's. The family of Dr. Thomas G. Oesterheld who served the township as its mayor from 1937 to 1951,

their house at 207 Hollis as newlyneds in 1914. Although Santiago's father had built the house, it was owned by a brother, and he had to leave it to Porcella after he graduated from the University of Philadelphia.

The coming years would bring seven children, and eventually to the Porcella household, all of whom are graduates of Cranford High School. Santiago Jr., their father, had graduated from the old Cranford High School at the corner of Hollis and Springfield.

Mrs. Porcella describes those early years as "a lot easier. We were able to get along on a lot less money than we do now," she said. "I would also get a head them from Potts grocery store or K & J groceries asking me if I needed anything for the house."

Potts used to be located across the street from the former Cranford Trust Company, now Fidelity Union Bank Building, and he came to the store many times during the early years, she says. However, there was hardly any reason for her to go downtown.

After her husband "went homebody," she and her husband preferred to stay at home and not involve themselves in community activities or clubs. Reading and watching the news on the radio were the only things that kept them busy when he nine children had settled for the night.

On those few occasions when they did go downtown, Porcella remembers the annual New Year's Eve dance at the Casino.

"It was a town affair," she said, "like the one I went to in 1914. It was on the 31st of July. The dances were wonderful and the festivals were beautiful with the tents hanging on the houses along the beach, and canoes paddling up and down."

Those "earlier" times would soon end with the coming of World War I in which

was one of Mrs. Porcella's closest friends.

Shopping for clothes and other necessities other than food was done out of town. Mrs. Porcella would take her children to the Newark and B. & A. Altman's in New York for clothing. She would drive the family car, a Cadillac, that she owned to drive five families in town that learned a car.

During World War II, Mrs. Porcella worried briefly inspecting bazookas in the basement of the house. She had a year a number of her family members had come back to live at the house at 207 and they occupied most of its three floors.

Reluctantly, she and her husband agreed to buy a television set in the mid 1950's but only under the pressure of a salesman who said that he would interest her, he said. "I had to read, cook or do some gardening."

Mrs. Porcella, a native of Texas, attributed her interest in the television to the "Lord." "We've been rich in the things that matter," she says. "I have a wonderful family that has been healthy and happy."

Most of her 9 children, 39 grandchildren and 30 great-grandchildren were on hand Saturday to help her celebrate her 100th birthday. More than 60 people attended a six-day dinner at the hall of the Alliance Church. She saw many of her great-grandchildren for the first time.

Her house here has been her life's stage, and she would not have wanted it any other way. And describes herself as "a very happy person" and someone who was content to stay at home and watch her family grow.

"I love it here," she says, "the friends of the people make it the perfect place to go. For me, it will always be home."

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The Mayor's Committee on Commerce will be conducting a business retention and expansion study.

The first part will be a survey to be distributed in December to all commercial and industrial businesses in Cranford. A separate survey will be conducted to pinpoint the small sector.

Ed Robinson, mayor, said that "over the past two months, the committee has been developing the study to fit certain objectives."

- (1) Improving cooperation with the business sector through better communication.
- (2) Ascertaining business expansion or relocation plans; and
- (3) To provide businesses with the opportunity to make constructive comments about township services.

Dan Aschenbach, Commerce Committee chairman, said the study will be conducted through a mail survey. Follow-up will be done through the telephone. It is of Cranford's retired executive business executives.

Any Cranford resident who can spare a few hours to help are urged to call Mayor Robinson at 276-8800, he said.

The survey will be kept confidential and conducted by the Union County government. The survey will be completed by January 15.

In a related development this week, Edward J. Murphy, township administrator, made a presentation on potential local prospects for participation in "Mainstreet, New Jersey." This is a program sponsored by the National Trust for Historic Preservation which provides technical and staff assistance to communities interested in fixing up, rather than redeveloping downtown.

Murphy said the approach could dovetail with the retention and expansion of businesses and possibly fit in with the pending design and implementation program for the downtown.

Fitness Facts

Pupil writing skills
above state average

Cranford public school's ninth graders scored an average of 7.8 in a new state essay test. The state average is 6.9 on a scale of 2 to 12.

The 30-minute essay designed to measure students' ability to express themselves in writing was given for the first time to 94,000 ninth grade students last March. The essay is being used for two years as preparation, but will become part of the Minimum Basic Skills reading and math tests in 1985 which must be passed in order to graduate. The average of 7.8 for Cranford's students here took the essay test.

On a multiple choice portion that measured students' knowledge of various subjects, Cranford students scored 87.4. The state average is 81.3.

Commentary

Darts and laurels

Laurel: to anybody who can come up with a centralized public rest room facility downtown. The old Community Center provided public access but its move ended that service.

Mixed blessing: dart to the Port Authority for raising the tolls on bridges and tunnels, but a laurel for spending the revenue on the facilities and infrastructure. Companies take note: you can leave New York for free, but you have to pay to get back in. The higher tolls should be another boon to attracting high techers and low techers to the Garden State.

Laurel: to the township government to getting something formal underway, at last, on business retention and expansion. Starting with a survey of enterprises. It's always better to know and act on business prospects before they evaporate and on company problems before a firm upsets and flies.

Local trend: more people are "in the swim" around the calendar. The idea of annual instead of seasonal memberships at municipal pools is proving more popular. Last year at this time there were 234 annuals, now the total is up to 428. It saves money for swimmers and provides a solid starting base for seasonal pool memberships.

The episode didn't affect the election that he won, but let's hope he drew the correct lesson from it that a political leader can't always have it both ways and that it pays to stick to one's views especially if they coincide with one's voting record.

A paper chase

Courts in New Jersey from the municipal to the supreme level have antiquated manual records processing. Doing it by hand sufficed when case loads and fines were smaller. But trial and appellate courts handle more than 700,000 cases a year and more than \$370 million in court-related transactions, and by 1990 the caseload is expected to reach a million a year. "The existing system is a paper chase, generating millions of pieces of paper a year and frustrating delays for members of the public involved in cases, attorneys, judges and other court personnel," said Stewart G. Pollock, assistant Supreme Court justice, who chaired a committee that came up with a new Judicial Master Plan designed to save an estimated \$4 million over the next nine years by computerizing the paper work.

The plan focuses on the big courts, but it should be noted that municipal courts are expected to handle 5.7 million cases by 1990, or nearly six times the volume of the state courts. The pattern evident locally. Last year the local court

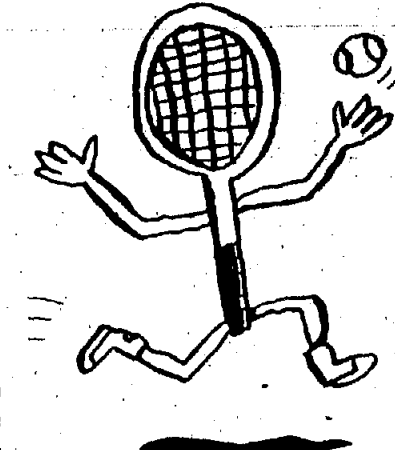

During the Christmas Season, according to a traditional yuletide melody, a partridge somehow appears "in a pear tree." Partridges, a family of birds that includes the Bobwhite, also dubbed quail by many of us, particularly "sports people," are chunky ground-dwelling birds about the size of a robin. Groups (coveys) of these birds favor the edge of a woodland, particularly locations where farmland abuts a stand of trees basked in sunlight. Why the songwriter placed a partridge in the pear tree has always puzzled me. Maybe you can tell me why some appropriate perching bird, perhaps a robin or a sparrow, wasn't placed in the tree. Can you? Quail spend their life bobbing around the fields, but a perching bird sits a large part of its life on a limb.

I've seen the popular painting of a Bobwhite sitting on top of a fence post whistling its name. "Bob-white or Bob-o-wit," emphasis on the last syllable in both cases, but I have yet to see the bird assume this pose in the wild. I expect that a stray bird might make its way to the top of a post and whistle, but I don't ever expect to see a Bobwhite in a pear tree.

Could it be that the artist is confusing the "Quail" with the Meadowlark? Nearly the same size as the Bobwhite, and rubbing elbows with it on the farm, this bird wears a bright yellow vest with a black "V" neck. It loves to whistle from the top of a post. You can see plenty of Meadowlarks during the late spring and early summer gamboling about rural communities situated in Central New Jersey townships where farming for profit is still a common practice. 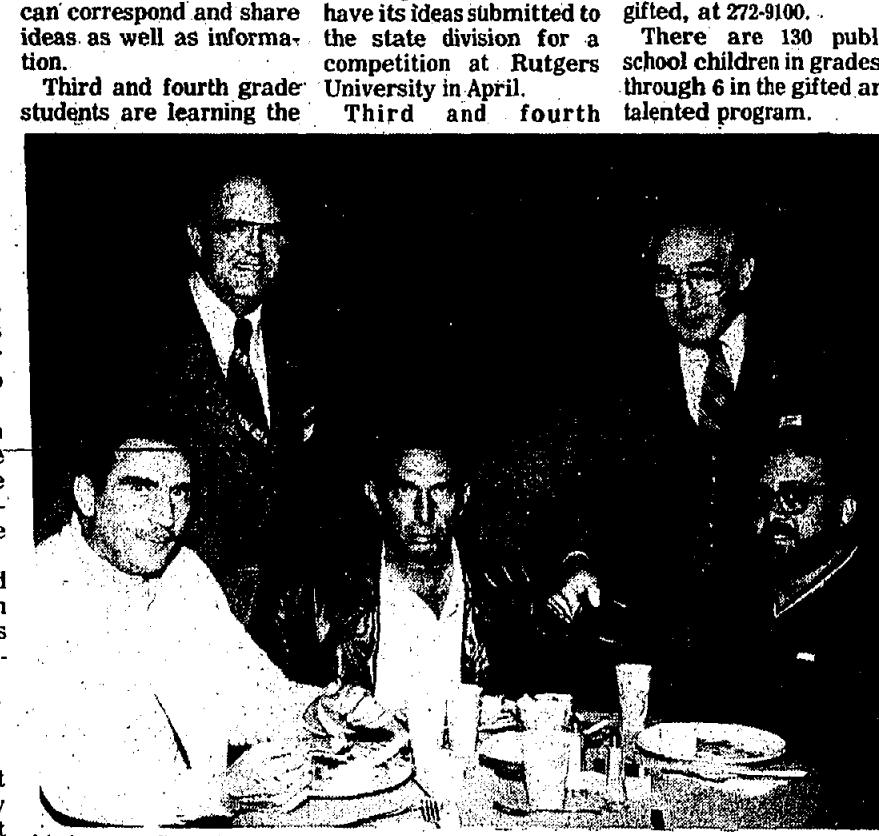

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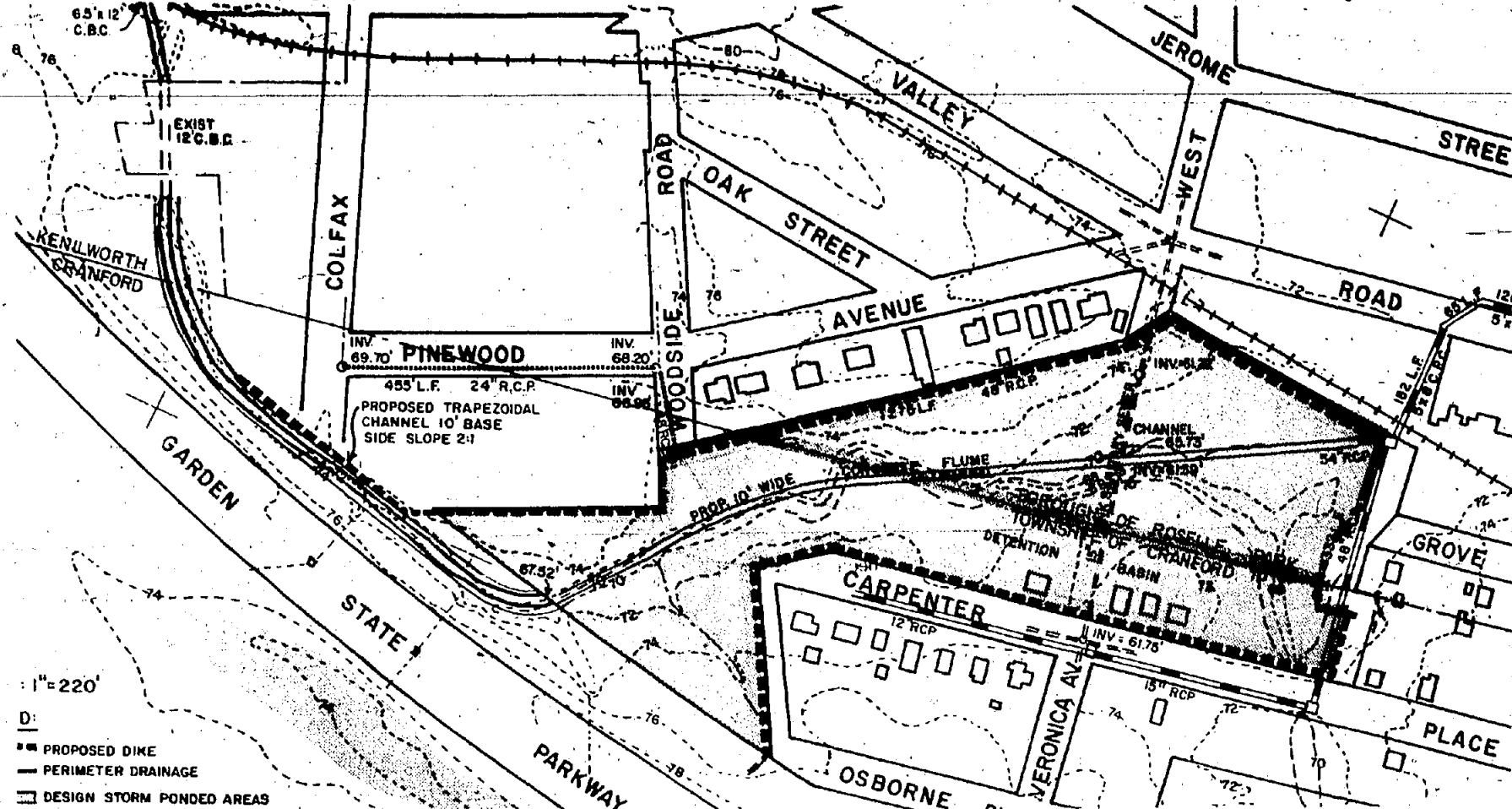

Fearing boiler explosion, town votes emergency repairs

The Township Committee has moved to correct a boiler problem at the new Bloomingdale Community Center which it called an emergency. The governing body declared in a resolution that failure to replace the relief valves and boiler blow-down valves could result in over pressuring the boiler and run the risk of an explosion.

The failure of relief, or safety valves, is believed to have caused pressure to build up in the boiler that exploded in the basement of the center last month and local officials wanted to act quickly to avoid even the prospect of a similar event at the new recreation facility.

The emergency declaration enables the government to act immediately on repairs without waiting for a bidding process on the estimated \$5,000 worth of repair or replacement items.

The emergency outlay is in addition to a refurbishing of the boiler itself. A.J. Celiano Co. of Ludlow Avenue was awarded the work for the refurbishing at a cost of \$25,455.

Work proceeds on Myrtle, Elizabeth

Reconstruction of portions of Myrtle Street and Elizabeth Avenue is proceeding. Work on the Myrtle section near the Garden State Parkway under construction started late last month. Essex Paving Inc. of Fairfield received the contract for a low bid of \$21,425.

The construction of Dorchester Avenue will cost more because the builder discovered a spongy sub-base and had to dig it out and put in about 200 tons of stone. The affected area was along the southern portion of road. This could cost an extra \$3,000 to \$5,000.

The construction is nearly complete.

Schifano Construction Co. of Verona received the contract for the basic work at a low bid price of \$38,168. Part of the cost of the project will be borne by homeowners in the area through a formula to be established by an assessment commission.

Essex Paving Inc. of Fairfield entered the lowest of three bids for the work, at \$9,370.

Prosecutor finds no Sunshine violation

The county Prosecutor's Office has ruled that the Township Committee did not violate the Open Public Meeting Act, known as the Sunshine Law, in its deliberation of the lease of the downtown Community Center to Union County College.

In a response to eight merchants who said the intent of the law was violated, Thomas P. Simon, assistant prosecutor, said that there are ten exceptions which allow a public body to hold a closed session to discuss or act upon certain matters. One concerns matters related to the purchase, lease or acquisition of real property with public funds, he said.

Boys Club topic

Russell Triolo of the Boys and Girls Club of Union described its activities to the Cranford Rotary Club at the Cranford Inn last week. The 28-year-old non-profit club has 1,300 members, including 75 from Cranford. It provides 131 recreational programs and has a \$350,000 annual budget.
