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Resource recovery plant for area reported moving ahead

The long-delayed waste-to-energy project is now moving forward in the county, he said, but the proposals to take solid waste from all of the 21 municipalities, a county planner reports.

Joe Kazar, county solid waste planner, estimated that construction could begin in January in a year and the plant could be operational by 1988.

A town-by-town waste quantity study done earlier this year (see related story) showed that early estimates of need were too high, he said.

A 1979 study led designers of the first project to anticipate it serving only ten communities including Cranford and Kenilworth but not Garwood. A 1981 study revised the waste generation estimate downward. The latest one makes it appear that all towns could send their waste to the facility, Kazar said.

The concept involves dumping solid waste including garbage. Instead of being buried at landfills, waste would be burned, with the heat recovered and sold.

The City of Rahway has reaffirmed its commitment to the plant and Kazar said two potential energy markets exist. One is to Public Service, for electricity, and the other is to Merck & Co., for industrial steam.

Negotiations are underway for the site and soil bearings and appraisals are being made, he said.

The plant is expected to cost in excess of \$100 million, but exact figures won't be known until companies respond to the request for proposal in mid-1984.

A State Department of Environmental Protection requirement of air pollution devices called "scrubbers" inhibited development of such solid waste recovery plants for a time, but Kazar said new and cheaper technology has been developed to contain air pollution.

DEP regulations on clean air discharge are the sticking point in the county, he said, but the proposals to take solid waste from all of the 21 municipalities, a county planner reports.

Landfill closing which will force the nine local collectors to go to another and possibly more expensive site.

The facility also would be about four miles from Cranford, one fourth the current distance.

Ed Robinson, mayor, said a number of mayors are concerned about the situation.

Edward J. Murphy, township administrator, suggested that the governing body should use the county to move ahead with resource recovery.

The first proposal founded when the Swiss company engaged in it backed out and the DEP air regulations became a matter of contention.

The average resident in Union County generates 2.58 pounds of solid waste per day. When commercial and industrial waste is factored into the equation, the per capita daily figure is 4.33 pounds.

The figure comes from a study by a consulting firm last spring. It puts Garwood and Cranford close to the top in waste generation, with residential garbage of 3.21 and 3.19 lbs. per day per person, behind Roselle Park, Springfield, Mountaintide and Fanwood. When

residential waste is merged with commercial and industrial waste, Garwood's 6.49 lbs. and Cranford's 6.43 lbs. per person per day rank only behind Roselle Park's 7.23 lbs.

According to the study by Reutter Anderson Schor Associates of Camden, Kenilworth's residential average is 2.43 lbs. per person per day, and its total waste generation is 3.56 lbs. per person.

Joe Kazar, county solid waste planner, cautions on the town-by-town figures. He thinks the total

county figures are more accurate than those reported in earlier studies, but says the local poundage could be skewed because some collectors mix commercial with residential waste and some serve several towns. Waste generation is still an "inexact science," he reports.

The survey covers six days in late winter and included weighing of all trucks from the county at ILR and Edgeboro landfills, where most waste from this area goes.

The stationary compactor is now in place and will cut waste disposal costs. The Conservation Center that houses it has received paving and an earthen berm shield from homes. The township's recycling efforts netted money to the town.

Resourceful recovery

The county's on-again, off-again approach to garbage disposal is getting on again. Plans for a resource recovery plant in Rahway needed a recovery themselves, and that seems to be happening. By most professional accounts, the future of solid waste disposal financing, said in her recent talk here that the Rahway plant is back on track, and Joe Kazar, the county solid waste planner, confirmed that the municipalities will be able to comment on the request for proposals starting next month.

It's going to be expensive, at more than \$100 million, and it's going to take time, probably to 1988, to build. But this is the device to get rid of solid waste instead of piling it around. The dead-end road to the burrows required to keep the burn-off from polluting the air has been resolved. There is new technology to making the scrub-

Meter feeders beware: the number of parking tickets issued in Cranford is escalating faster than you can ask, "Brother, can you spare a dime?" Reason: the town has had two consecutive meter men who have been enthusiastic about the job. The percentage of tickets issued has jumped 53 percent in five years.

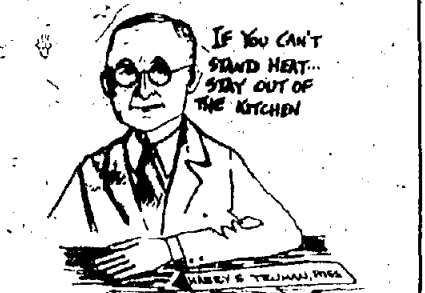

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Emergency MICU will now bill patients

Patients who utilize the services of Memorial General Hospital's Mobile Intensive Care Unit (MICU) will now be charged for this service, according to Patricia Lynch, hospital vice president.

"In compliance with a recent ruling from the Federal Health Care Financing Administration and the New Jersey Department of Health, all hospitals with MICUs must now add the cost of this service to patients' hospital bills," said Lynch.

"Previously, the cost of this care had been included into the overall hospital inpatient charges, where the costs were absorbed by all patients."

The decision to bill for MICU care was effective November 1 of this year. Basically, the new procedure will work as follows: Patients who are treated by an MICU and admitted into the hospital will have this charge added to their bill. Insurance should cover all or most of the cost.

However, patients who receive MICU care and sustaining equipment to be brought to the emergency department for examination and are not admitted into the hospital will be billed paralysis, convulsions, heart attack and other directly to patients when an illness and trauma.

Emergency MICU will now bill patients

MICU responds to their home, and leaves without treating the patient. Lynch emphasized that these new charges will originate only from hospitals such as M.G.H. which have MICUs, and not from ambulance, police or rescue squads. These squads, which work in conjunction with MICU paramedics, operate on a strictly volunteer basis.

One of the first operational MICUs in the state, Memorial General's MICU averages over 5,000 emergency calls annually. The unit has been cited as the busiest in New Jersey and is actually comprised of two vehicles.

Often referred to as an emergency room on wheels, the unit, popularly known as METS (Medical Emergency Treatment Service) is equipped with vital life-supporting equipment to treat those in need of immediate care due to emergencies such as the stroke, electrocution, hospital will be billed paralysis, convulsions, heart attack and other directly to patients when an illness and trauma.

Council wraps up '83 with police contract still unsettled

Borough Council wrapped up its end-of-year business in a brief meeting Tuesday, marked mostly by reports of progress.

Walter Maszcak, chairman of the police committee, had advised council that no further word had been received from the arbitrator regarding the 1983 police contract.

His committee has begun 1984 negotiations with the Policemen's Benevolent Association but progress will be slow until the 1983 settlement has been approved.

Department heads have begun work on budget needs for the new year, Frank Spira reported. He informed mayor and council that the finance committee is attempting to organize budget plans early for 1984.

Two ordinances were unanimously passed on final reading. Both ordinances refer to the creation of a deputy court clerk/violations clerk position. Jack Schmidt, councilman, had abstained from introducing one of the ordinances at council's last meeting because he said he wanted more time to look into the possible future costs. He said Tuesday that he voted to approve the ordinance because he found the position is state-mandated and all communities have been ordered to create the new job.

Schmidt added that a number of municipalities have objected to the mandate because of the costs and he feels the state may modify the order to require a deputy court clerk/violations clerk only in the case of indigible of fence.

The clerk would be required to escort prisoners from the local jail to the county facility at any time of the day or night. Schmidt said this could cause increased costs to the borough to have someone available around the clock.

Council also unanimously voted to table a board of assessors report concerning assessments for sidewalks and curbing on Myrtle Avenue. The report will be acted on at the Jan. 10 meeting. The report was tabled until the new year because the borough's books currently are being closed by the auditors and introduction of the assessment would have caused bookkeeping problems.

Council to name new attorney at New Year's Day meeting

The Borough Council is expected to hire a new borough attorney at the New Year's Day organization meeting.

Livio Mancino, who will be sworn in for a third term as mayor, confirmed Tuesday that he will recommend that the council appoint the Kenilworth law firm of Buynak and Burger to replace Terry Zuckerman as the borough attorney. Zuckerman has held the job two years. Mancino told The Chronicle that while Zuckerman has "done a commendable job, too often he has put us in embarrassing situations."

The attorneys in the Buynak and Burger firm, Michael Buynak and Howard Burger, represented the council this month in suits by two builders after Zuckerman refused, stating he felt the council's position was wrong.

Mancino said the council has given "a straw vote approval" to the appointment of Buynak and Burger.

The organization meeting takes place at 1 p.m. Sunday. In addition to the swearing-in of Mancino, Phyllis Baldachini will be seated for a second three-year term on the council and newcomer Victor Korman will be sworn in. Korman is the son of the councilman who succeeded Vivian Keenan.

An appointment expected to cause some dissension is the council appointment of its representative to the Planning Board. Mancino said he will recommend that the council appoint John Filipek and George Harms. There have been one vacant seat.

Mancino also sounded the themes for 1984 at the council's last meeting of the year on Tuesday. He said that areas which must be rectified include the traffic light at Scherling-Pough and a flooding problem at Boulevard and 31st street. The mayor said poor synchronization of the light at Scherling has caused "many accidents." He will bring the Boulevard flooding problem to the attention of the freetholders tonight.

Mancino also foresees "serious money problems" in 1984 with a budget cap figure of 6 1/2 percent, a percentage point lower than the increase allowed this year.

Inspector's term raises questions

The appointment of an interim building inspector for a 60-day period was the subject of a question raised by councilman, at the Borough Council's year-end meeting Tuesday.

The council two weeks ago had appointed George Harkin of Woodbridge as interim inspector until a replacement is found for John Rusniak.

Construction Code enforces four-year terms for building inspectors. Rusniak's term would have expired Dec. 31, said the councilman, an interim inspector should have been appointed only until that date. His suggestion that council invalidate the 60-day appointment was rejected to gain a second for introduction.

Livio Mancino, mayor, said that state law allows the appointment of a 60-day interim inspector and criticized Uelthoeffer for failing to inform council of his opinion prior to the meeting. The council agreed to determine the legality of a 60-day interim appointment which overrules the expiration of an inspector's term.

In a related matter, a second building contractor has sued the borough over the moratorium on construction through Dec. 31. The suit was filed by Vincent Paparato for a lot at Michigan and Richfield avenues. However, the hearing has been scheduled for Jan. 4, when it is after the moratorium is lifted and the procedure for building permits gets underway again.

An earlier suit by Peter Palmadesso was settled since it was determined that the moratorium went into effect.

The school board approved the program at a meeting Dec. 20.

The program, which will be supervised by the school district's Chapter I grants. The Chapter I program provides funds also for the pre-kindergarten program and reading and math remediation.

The after-school program will be aimed at students who are below average in basic skills or who are falling off during the first half of the school year.

In other action, the board granted tenure to two teachers who have been with the district for three years. They are Veronica Conrad, a second grade teacher, and Charles Mott, junior high school science teacher.

Traffic lights in center out twice

The traffic light at the borough's main intersection, South Avenue and Center Street, stopped working twice over the holiday weekend. The malfunctions could have caused dangerous situations which helped avoid accidents.

The traffic lights first went out at 2:30 a.m. Christmas morning. School board okays budget, hearing

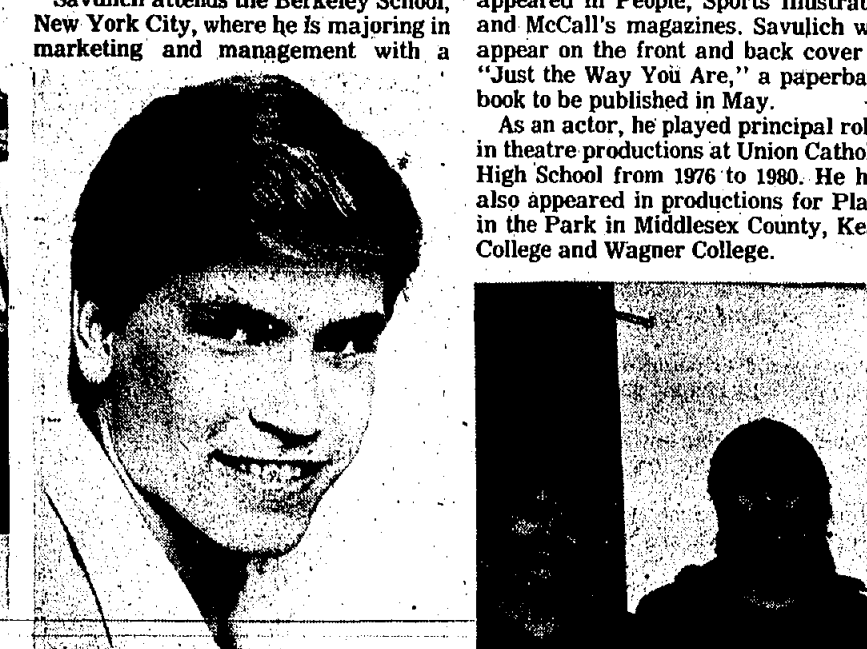

Livio Keenan, in farewell remarks as he leaves the Borough Council after six years, urged residents to "get involved in local government."

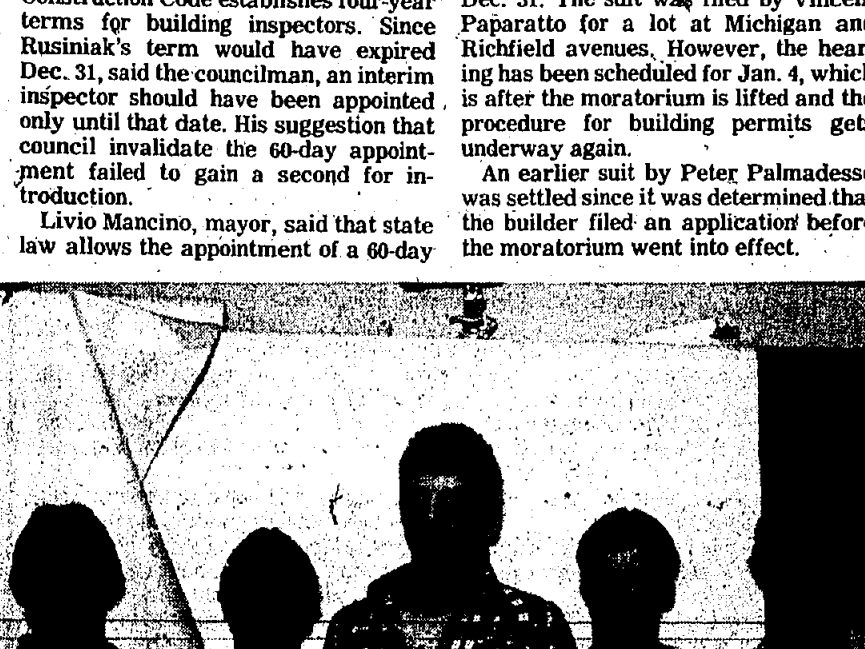
Speaking at her last council meeting Tuesday, Keenan advised residents to "be visible and voice your opinions."

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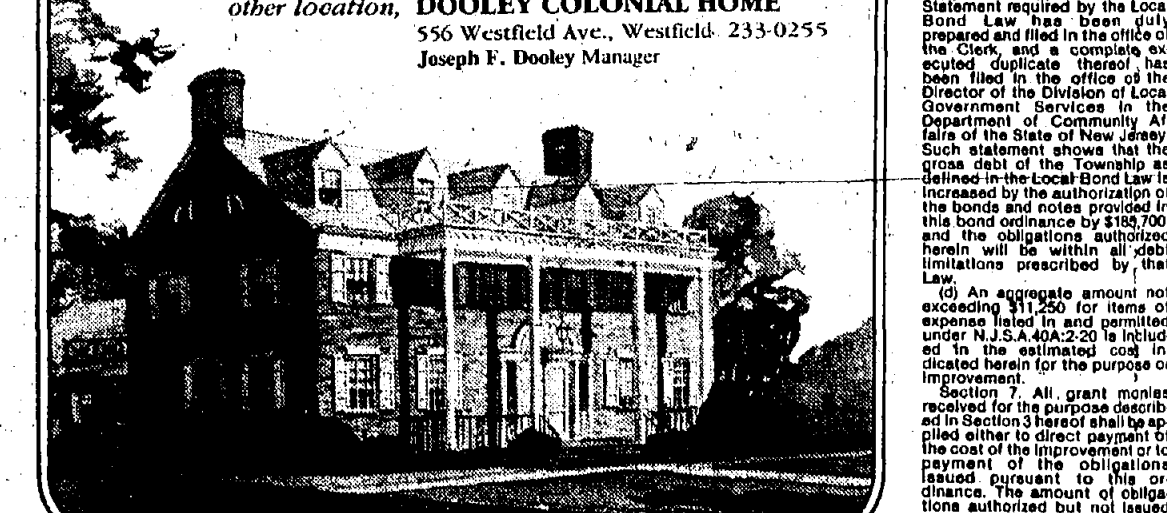
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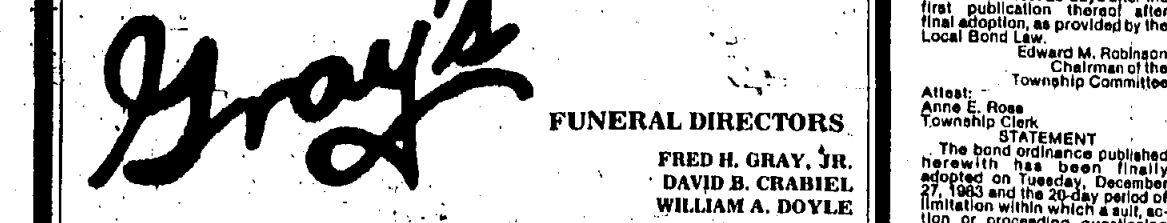
